
At the regular weekly luncheon I the Rotary Club yesterday in the commodore Cafe with J. J. Little siding, Victor Basso-Bert gave in interesting exposition of Fascism as it pertained to Italy. He said the novement had been usually misrepresented. It was a new conception of statecraft and was fundamentaily opposed to the individualism and liberalism of the past. The law of supply and demand had failed and the corporative state was being established to regulate the affairs of the country in the best interests of the whole state.

under Fascism, as exemplified in Italy, the country was divided for government purposes into categories. There were 22 of these representing all the different factors in the state. The people were represented in their local organizations. organizations and the corporation represented.

The executive organization was the grand council of which Mussolini was the presiding officer, rewas also a senate appointed by the king on the recommendation of the graund council.

ership and initiative but these had to be directed in the interests of the state. At present the organization was only beginning to function. There was no dictatorship. If anything happened to Mussolini his successor would be recommended by the grand council to the king

Speaking of the Nazi movement in Germany, the state capitalism of Russia and other governments, Mr. Basso-Bert said they had no very settled policy. There was not the spiritual power that moves. Politicians were imbued with the idea of feathering their own nests whereas in Italy the interests of the state were supreme. There were no parties but all were one party and the state was above all.






