# FISCAL STATEMENT FOR PROVINCE LAST YEAR PRESENTED

## Gale and Snowstorm on Atlantic Coast is now Followed by Cold Snap

Cost New York City No Less Than Two Million Dollars to Dig Itself Out-Transportation Still Tied Up-Newfoundland Buried

NEW YORK, Feb. 21: (CP)—Yesterday's gale accompanied by heavy snow gave way today to intense cold on the Atlantic Coast. The blizzard was the worst in forty years, twenty-five deaths being recorded with many towns still isolated today. Transportation is still badly! tied up.

It cost New York City \$2,000,000 to dig itself out of the snow.

Some parts of Newfoundland are reported to be under snowdrifts from six to twelve feet deep.



## Eight Million Dollar Deficit Reported In Victoria Legislature

Loss on Current Account Was \$2,836,377 With Sinking Funds \$1,440,652 Short and Relief Charged to Capital \$3,648,407, House is Informed

VICTORIA, Feb. 21: (CP)-British Columbia's deficit on current account in the fiscal year 1932-33 was \$2,836,-377, it was shown by a statement of public accounts tabled in the Legislature yesterday. Shortage in sinking funds of \$1,440,652 and unemployment relief charged to capital expenditures amounting to \$3,648,407 brings the total deficit to \$7,925,436. Revenue of \$20,389,951 was \$4,453,815 less than the estimated \$24,843,766. At the same time estimated departmental expenditures of \$24,693,671 were cut \$1,467,342 to \$23,226,329.



### ENCOURAGING PROSPECT

Evidently Premier Bennett is planning some popular legislation before making an appeal to the country. He declares he has been negotiating with the United States with a view to arranging a reciprocity treaty and that he is planning to carry on the negotiations in a more concrete \$1000. form as soon as the president is given power to bargain.

The Prime Minister stresses the desirability of being fair to both Canada and United States. That is the only kind of treaty that can stand the test of experience and we are glad that the head of our government is alive to the situation.

Prince Rupert has everything to gain by reciprocity.


