SILVER STILL ADVANCING IN LONDON

CRAZED COAL MINERS' MASS STRIKE CONTINUES TODAY

Ten Per Cent. Export Tax Is Placed by China Upon Exports of White Metal

Present Price of Silver is Highest Reached Since 1929 Due To Purchases by Speculators Following Imposition of Tax

LONDON, Oct. 15.—Silver advanced a halfpenny an ounce today to a price equivalent to 54 5-16 cents an ounce, the highest price since 1929. Strong speculative demand was caused by China's new export tax and the belief that the price would "go higher" was responsible for today's advance.

SHANGHAI, Oct. 15.—Claiming that China had received no satisfactory reply from the United States in regard to its silver policy, the Nationalist government has placed an export tax of ten percent on all silver exports with a view to safeguarding China's economic interests and protecting its currency. A \$20,000,000 shipment for London and New York this week will be subject to the new tax.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—Silver advanced in price today to 55 1/4 an ounce.

WORK STARTS ON HIGHWAY

Thirty Men Commenced This Morning and Number Will Be Doubled Soon—Trail Being Built

Thirty men started work this morning on highway construction and the number will be increased until the full crew of sixty is complete. That is the capacity of the camp which has been erected at the end of the present highway.

In addition there are eleven or twelve men working on the trail up Mount Oldfield. They are making good progress with the trail which is about four feet wide and will be a great convenience for those who like to enjoy a hike up the mountain.

GANG IS BLAMED

Mrs. Alice Stoll Still Held Despite Payment of Ransom

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 15.—The kidnapping on Thursday of Mrs. Alice Stoll was attributed by the authorities on Saturday to the notorious "Purple Gang" of Toronto which, it was said, decided to take Mrs. Stoll after having failed to abduct her father-in-law, C. C. Stoll. Hope of Mrs. Stoll being returned safe and alive is beginning to fade as time goes on without word being received despite payment of the \$50,000 ransom which was demanded.

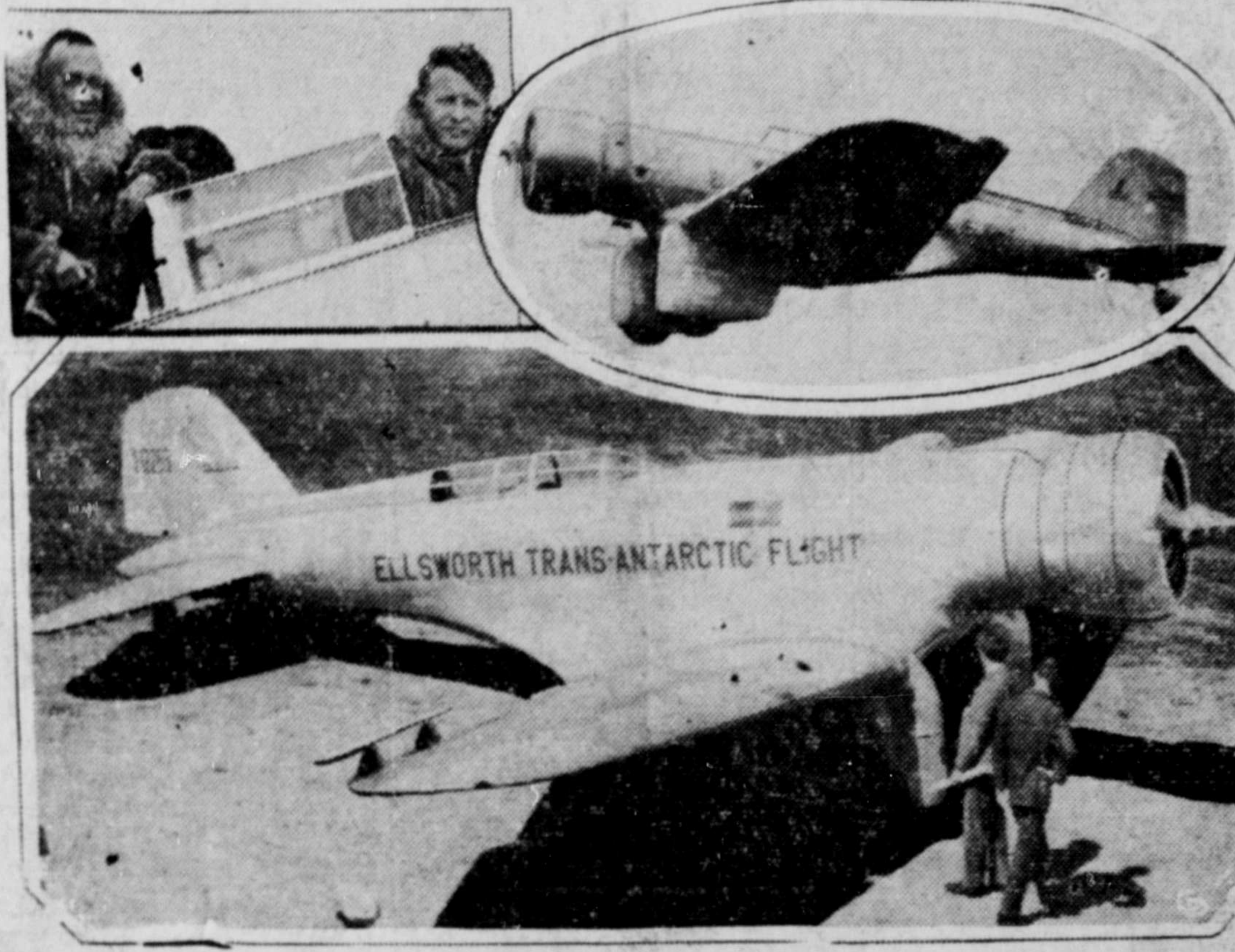
SNOWFALL IN MAINE

Roads Blocked and Wires Down—Football Games Have to Be Cancelled

PORTLAND, Maine, Oct. 15.—Roads in Maine were blocked and telephone and telegraph lines down in Maine, Massachusetts and other New England states at the week-end as a result of unseasonably heavy fall of snow. Owing to the snow and cold weather, a number of less important intercollegiate football games, which were to have been played Saturday, were cancelled.

Ellsworth Again Seeks Polar "Jungles"



Dr. Lincoln Ellsworth, famous American explorer, is hoping for better luck this year as he sails from New Zealand for the Bay of Whales, where he and Bernt Balchen, his pilot, will take off in their big plane, the Polar Star, for a 3,000-mile flight over polar land still uncharted. Last January a similar venture failed when the Polar Star was damaged before it could take off, by cracks which developed in the ice beneath it. Ellsworth hopes to find evidence of the time when the polar regions were a vast jungle and expects to uncover proof of extensive mineral deposits. Good Supply of Sulphuric Acid For Pulp Purposes Assured From Mine in Neighborhood of Rupert

Prince Rupert people are looking forward eagerly for news that a pulp mill is to be built and operated in Prince Rupert, probably within the city limits. Reports being heard point to early consummation of arrangements for work to start within a reasonable time. In the meantime it is interesting to note that plans are being laid to supply the new mill with sulphuric acid from a mine in this neighborhood. The property recently changed hands on the strength of the pulp mill being built.

The mine in question has been thoroughly explored by short tunnels and by extensive diamond drilling showing that the ore, iron pyrites carrying about one percent copper and small values of gold and silver, is ideal for the manufacture of sulphuric acid, the chief chemical used in the manufacture of high class sulphite wood pulp. It is on a tidewater within about fifty miles of the city.

The people who have taken over the property represent much mining capital and they are in a position to proceed with the work just as soon as the market is assured. The working of the mine would mean the employment of a large crew of men and another large crew in the plant which would be established for the separation of the sulphur. The probability is that it would first separate the copper, gold and silver, leaving pure iron pyrites. This ore, containing about sixty percent sulphur, would then be roasted and the sulphur fumes precipitated for the acid. The iron slag may or may not be marketable.

The mill would in all probability be located at or near the mine and the copper shipped direct to the smelter, presumably at Anyox. The manufacture of the sulphuric acid could be carried out adjoining the pulp mill or at any other point on tidewater, preferably where there is both water and rail transportation available.

VISIT MADE TO MINING DISTRICT

Olof Hanson and Others Returned Early This Morning Pleased With Their Visit

A Prince Rupert party consisting of Olof Hanson, Dr. Carson, W. O. Fulton, Thomas Brown, S. E. Parker, J. S. Wilson and Paul Armou visited Portland Canal points at the week-end returning to the city early this morning. They visited Anyox, Alice Arm, Silver City, Stewart and Premier, taking in also the Dunwell mine, United Empire and Big Missouri.

A member of the party this morning said that Stewart seemed to have a new lease of life as a result of mining activities. The people there are very optimistic. The party attended a meeting of the board of trade at Stewart and discussed with the businessmen of the town a number of public questions. The Stewart people seemed very pleased with the work Mr. Hanson had done for them. The party came south on the Pacheña. They were all pleased with the reception given them and the progress made at the mines.

POINCARÉ DIES TODAY

PARIS, Oct. 15.—Raymond Poincaré, the last of France's great war leaders and a war-time president, died early this morning aged 74. He was one of France's outstanding statesmen.

AIR RACE ENGLAND TO AUSTRALIA

MILDENHALL, Eng., Oct. 15.—Captain and Mrs. Mollison, reported contemplating dropping out of the Australian air race to fly the motion pictures of King Alexander's assassination across the Atlantic to the United States, said today they still entered the race as their demand for £30,000 for the Atlantic hop was prohibitive.

The air race for a prize of £50,000 from London to Melbourne will commence next Saturday. A dozen entries have already been made and more are expected. In addition to the Mollisons many aviators of note are to take part.

Miners Declare They Will Die Underground and Ask To Have Coffins Prepared

Soldiers Cannot Go Below For Fear of Being Killed With Pickaxes Before They Are Out of Cage

PECS, Hungary, Oct. 15.—Forty-four out of 1200 striking coal miners who for three days and three nights have been entombed by their own choice a thousand feet underground threatening mass suicide were brought to the surface yesterday in a critical condition. The others still remain below, some dying, and still threatening to cut off the air pumps and suffocate to death unless the operators guarantee them more work and wages. At present the miners work two days a week and receive but two dollars. They demand at least \$3.50 a week.

SUCCESSOR TO BARTHOU

Former Premier Laval is New Foreign Secretary For France

PARIS, Oct. 15. (CP)—Premier Gaston Doumergue late Saturday announced important cabinet changes following the death of Foreign Minister Louis Barthou in last week's assassination at Marseilles. Former Premier Pierre Laval succeeds Barthou as foreign minister.

Accounting responsibility for the Marseilles tragedy on behalf of his department, Albert Sarrail resigns as minister of the interior. The minister of justice has also resigned. The cabinet changes will not interfere with general policy of the French government.

PUT IT UP TO LEAGUE

British Government Would Make Geneva Responsible For Marseilles Incident Probe

LONDON, Oct. 15. (CP)—Should international relations show signs of becoming strained over the matter, the British government has expressed itself as being in favor of the League of Nations assuming full responsibility for the investigation of last week's incident at Marseilles when King Alexander of Yugoslavia and Foreign Minister Louis Barthou of France were assassinated.

Relations of Jugo-Slavia, Hungary and Italy are felt by the British government to be delicate. Merely routine business was taken up Thursday night at the regular monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Shrine Club in the Masonic Temple. President Arthur Brooksbank was in the chair.

BRITON ARRESTED AS ACCOMPLICE IN ASSASSINATION

PARIS, Oct. 15.—It was announced Saturday night that a naturalized British subject had been arrested as an accomplice in the assassination at Marseilles last week of King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia and Foreign Minister Louis Barthou of France. The man refused to give his name but stated that his father was a Bulgarian, his mother Turkish and he was a naturalized Briton.

Burned to Death Terrace Saturday

Svente Sjostrand Lost His Life From Suffocation When Shack Burned

Word has been received by the provincial police of the death at Terrace on Saturday night of Svente Sjostrand. He was burned to death in a fire which destroyed his home.

TERRACE, Oct. 15.—Shortly after midnight Saturday a fatal fire occurred at a shack near Terrace. S. Sjostrand was suffocated. He was an old timer here aged 60 and unmarried. Two other occupants of the shack, A. Lund and J. Skog, escaped with burns.

Mounted Police Boat Out After Years in North

VANCOUVER, Oct. 15.—After having spent four years in the western Arctic Ocean, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police motor vessel St. Roche arrived here at the end of the week from the north with Sergeant Larsen in charge.

STEVENS COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE FISHING

OTTAWA, Oct. 15. (CP)—The committee on price spreads and mass buying, presided over by Hon. H. H. Stevens, minister of trade and commerce, is to resume its sessions next week when inquiry will be opened into the fishing industry of the Maritime Provinces. Representations are to be made to the committee on behalf of the fishermen.

AUDITED CIRCULATION

At considerable expense each year the Daily News secures the services of an auditor through the Audit Bureau of Circulations to make a thorough check-up of the circulation of the paper and the statements issued to advertisers. This auditor represents both the national advertisers and the newspapers of the continent.

On the days the auditor was here the total press run was 1875 and 1850 respectively.

The only British Columbia newspapers that have an audit of their circulations are the Vancouver Province and Sun, the Victoria Times and Colonist, the Nelson News and the Prince Rupert Daily News. From the very fact that they undergo the circulation audit and that they belong to the Canadian Daily Newspaper Association and are members of the Canadian Press, they rank as the most important daily papers in the province.

RUPERT AS AIR CENTRE

For the present Prince Rupert may content herself with being an airport with only accommodation for seaplanes. Eventually she will have to construct a landing field for land planes but there is no pressing need for it just now. Possibly by the time it is needed planes will be built in such a manner as not to require so large a field.

It is rather interesting to remember that the first plane to come to Prince Rupert was a land plane. It landed on the baseball ground at Acropolis Hill but the runway is too small for large planes. If Montreal Heights should be converted into a golf course within the next few years it is possible that it might also be used as a landing field for airplanes.

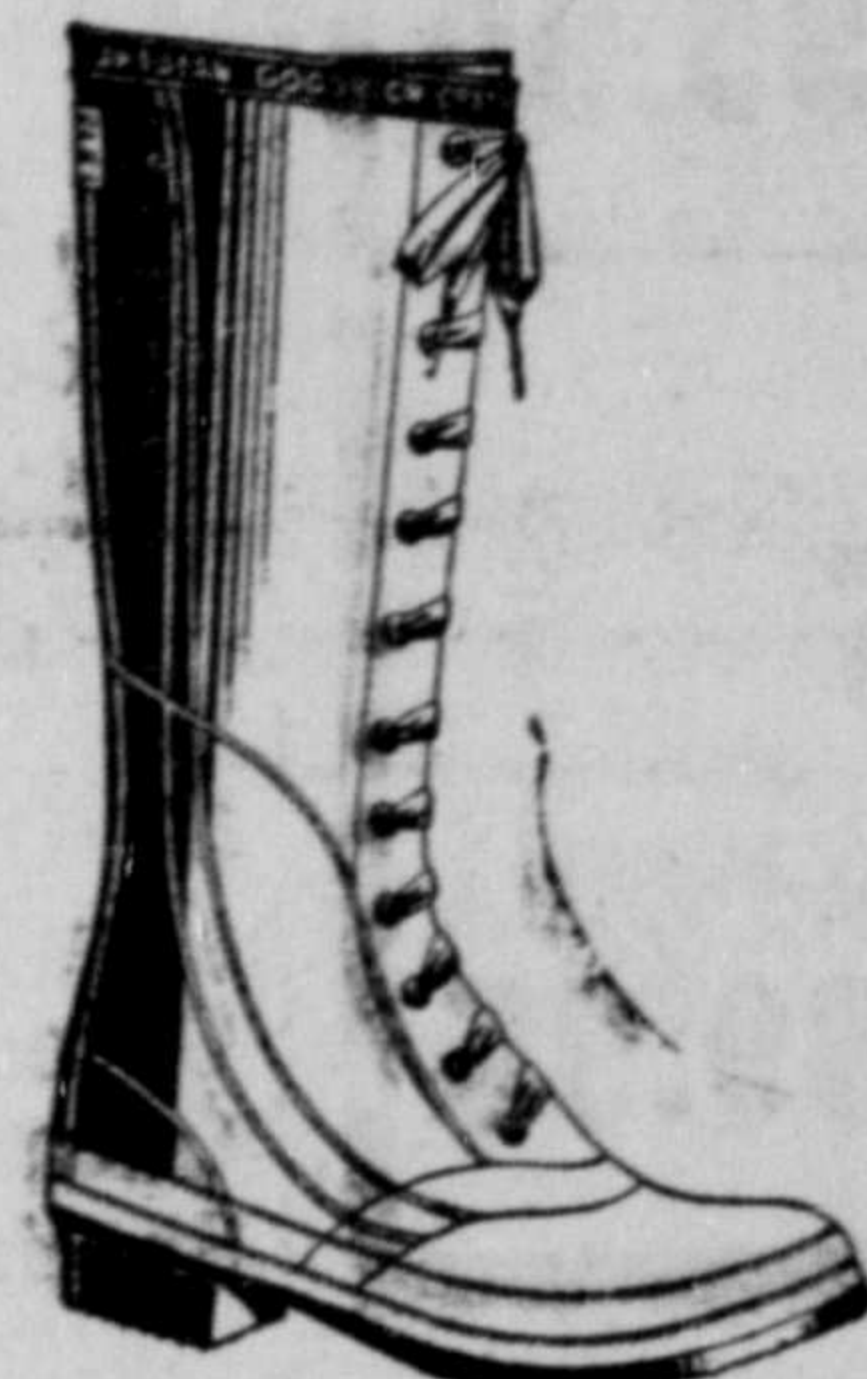
