"RECIPROCITY RIGHT FOR RUPERT"—NEW SLOGAN

ALD. NEWTON IS ENDORSED BY LOCAL CONSERVATIVES

Delegates to Nanaimo Convention Instructed to Support Him.—Newton Supporters Carried the Meeting by 31 Votes to 29 in Meeting of Sixty.

By the narrow margin of 31 to 29 a meeting of local Conservatives last night endorsed Mr. M. Newton as the Conservative nominee from Prince Rupert for the Comox-Atlin seat in the House of Commons. The delegates who were to attend the convention at Nanaimo next Wednesday were duly charged to support Mr. Newton's candidature.

The charges made by Mr. Newton that the previous meeting to elect delegates was packed by parties desirous of injuring his political prospects made last night's meeting of more than usual interest. At the previous meeting Mr. Newton only got in at the bottom of the list by one vote in the contest for delegates, securing less than a third of the votes of the meeting. Last night, however, the Newton contingent in a rather stormy meeting held a bare majority and used it well:

In a meeting of sixty, they managed to have thirty-one votes. The chief object of the meeting was to decide whether or not to instruct the delegates to support any particular candidate. After some discussion a motion was put before the house to the effect that the delegates be left to exercise their judgment as to whom they would support. Mr. Newton's supporters opposed this, and voted it down by 31 to 29.

Alderman Clayton thereupon moved a second resolution that the meeting instruct the delegates to support Mr. Newton's candidature at the Convention, and this was carried by a similar vote of 31 to 29.

This makes Mr. Newton the official Conservative candidate for Prince Rupert.

SERIOUS BUSINESS FOR PRINCE RUPERT SAILOR

Witnesses Say That James McCall Who Sent a Bullet Through the Windsor Bar was Threatening the Life of Constable Hamblin all Day Before Shooting.

Matters are looking rather serious for James McCall the sailor from the S.S. Prince Rupert who used a rifle on Thursday evening sending a bullet through the Windsor Hotel bar within six inches of the bartender's head. Seven witnesses were examined at this morning's preliminary hearing of the case before Magistrate McMullin. As a result it came out that McCall had been threatening the life of Constable Hamblin all day, and that he also threatened to shoot the colored man Ernest Gray who refused him the loan of five cents in the Butte Cafe.

Up for Election
Accused comes up for election before Judge Lampman this afternoon, and should he not elect him for speedy trial the case will be a costly one for the city to send down below. Asked if he had anything to say this morning accused remained silent. Evidence of Arthur Little showed how the sailor was obstreperous almost as soon as he landed, and required to be restrained on Centre street. Afterwards he went up town and did the rest of the stunt. Victor Swanson, the bartender who nearly lost his life told how accused had been seen to load the gun deliberately and fire from a sitting position probably with the intention of hitting the coon. "The bullet whistled by within six inches of my head," said the witness.

Other Witnesses
Seven witnesses in all appeared to give evidence this morning. These were Arthur Little, Victor Swanson, Ernest Gray, the colored man, Oscar Gross, proprietor of the Butte Cafe, A. Doyle, Constable Hamblin and Constable Merritt. City Solicitor Peters conducted the prosecution. The accused is charged with "Having in his possession an offensive weapon for a purpose dangerous to the public peace."

"BOB KELLY" TO SPEND \$\$\$

The Popular Little "Nabob" Means to Do Well by His Townsite at New Hazelton

Mr. Robert Kelly—or more familiarly "Bob" Kelly—"Nabob Kelly" as some say—reached Prince Rupert by the Prince George today.

"I am going to put my new townsite—New Hazelton—on the market early next week," he said to the Daily News.

"It would have been on the market sooner but for an annoying little delay with the government which demanded special papers which I had to send here for.

"Yes, I shall let a local firm

handle the sale of lots here but which firm I have not yet settled.

"Messrs. Foley, Welch & Stewart have already secured four blocks 118, 119, 120 and 121. The Union bank will also build there. I shall have agencies selling lots in Seattle, Spokane, Vancouver, Victoria, and other cities. I intend to spend money on this proposition and give it a good start at once."

FIRE CHIEF AND THE WATER DEPT. CHARGES

"Water Officials are Wrong in Every Point They Allege" Declares Fire Chief McInnis. He Means to Deal Direct with the Fire and Water Committee. Difficulties His Dept. Has to Meet With Owing to Street Obstructions.

"I do not intend to reply to the water officials' allegations through any newspaper," said Fire Chief McInnis when approached by the Daily News on the subject yesterday. "My business is with the fire and water committee of the city council. My report on the position of the fire department is already in their hands, and it is up to them to deal with it. But I may say that the water people are wrong in every one of the points they have alleged against the fire department."

Want Callmen
Amongst the points emphasized

in the Fire Chief's report to his committee is the need for more call men. At present there is an advertisement posted at the City Hall for another call man and the opinion exists that several more should be employed. All the four call-men originally employed did not return to duty after their dispute with the council regarding wages, and it is apparently difficult to get men for this duty at \$10 per month though the offer is made of free quarters at the fire hall.

Condition of Streets
Another point sure to be touched

on is the condition of the streets. On the occasion of the explosion on Second avenue when the old schoolhouse was burning the big red auto hose car was held up for a few minutes by an obstruction outside the Bank of Montreal. A light pole made rickety by the excavation of grade around it had been stayed up by pieces of heavy lumber. Two of these had to be chopped away to let the "Red Devil" get by. Notification of this obstruction had not been sent to the Fire Chief, but Chief

AFFECTS TRAMP STEAMERS

Strike Ordered by British Sailors' and Firemen's Union

(Special to the Daily News)
New York, Aug. 12.—Fifty British tramp steamers which are now in port here may be tied up indefinitely by a strike ordered by the sailors' and firemen's union of Great Britain. While the sailors on the liners of the Atlantic companies sign for the round trip, the sailors on most of the tramp steamers sign separately for the journey each way. The union has issued a new wage scale embodying an increase all round and the seamen are instructed to refuse to sign except under the new scale. Members of the American union are not allowed to take the place of strikers.

COUNCIL MEET TODAY

Special Call by Acting Mayor Kirkpatrick

At five p.m. today the city council will meet by special summons from Acting Mayor Kirkpatrick. A good deal of municipal business requires attention, and as four of the aldermen and the Mayor will be absent from town on Monday there can be no meeting then.

Amongst the business to be attended to today is the passing of a requisition for pumping plant for the new Morse Creek temporary water supply. Alderman Clayton will move the granting of the order. The amount involved is \$1175. The city already owns suitable boilers for the plant.

HELD MOCK FUNERAL OVER A DEPARTING COMRADE

Undergraduates of Cambridge University Held an Historic Farewell Over a Student Who Was Expelled for Breaking the College Rules.

(Colonial Press Despatch)
London, Aug. 11.—Never within memory have the Cambridge undergraduates "ragged" as they did on Thursday afternoon, when a well-known Trinity Hall sportsman, who has recently been doing great things on the cricket field, was "sent down," and was accorded a mock funeral on the most gigantic scale the town has ever known.

Every fancy costume kept by theatrical costumers and others was let out on hire and undergraduates too late to hire a costume made one. One had a dress suit made of sackcloth, trimmed with ashes. Others bought a street organ, draped in purple and black.

Early on the scene was a cab containing the Devil, followed by a hansom cab with four undergraduates inside—four outside, and two sitting on the horse—and most of them in pyjamas. Practically every vehicle in the town was chartered.

The procession was headed by a van containing eight masked

bandsmen. The hearse came next, with "the deceased" walking at the side. Next came the unfortunate man's charger—a very small donkey. A cab, with a large printed notice, "Alas, my poor brother," contained the "dead man's" brother. But perhaps the most pathetic figure was the heart-broken widow.

For fully half a mile the procession stretched, and so dense were the crowds that it took an hour to make the journey of a mile to the railway station, where the scene was unequalled in the history of Cambridge. Undergraduates climbed on to roofs and even on to the top of trains.

Cambridge will know no more of the student who has been "sent down," but it will not soon forget him.

GRAHAM ISLAND IS RICH IN COAL AND OIL LANDS

West Coast of the Island is Declared by Experts to be "Oil Territory"—News Correspondent Visits The Drilling Camps

(Special Correspondence) With the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, the Queen Charlotte group of Islands standing but eighty miles from the city of Prince Rupert, has been brought prominently before the incoming capitalists and settlers.

Other Valuable Deposits The wealth of copper at Ikeda, Jedway and other portions of Moresby Island will mean a source of profit to the owners of the mines in those localities, while the gold deposits at "Gold Harbor" and in other localities are but harbingers of the future development that will bring to light the potentialities of the group of islands.

Splendid Showings Experts from all parts of the world have visited the West Coast of Graham Island, and all are surprised at the showings. Along the shore line the tarry matter is oozing from the rocks.

A Hazardous Coast The West Coast of Graham Island is a very inhospitable place. The Pacific Ocean sweeps mountainous waves ashore, which would engulf any small craft, and is even dangerous for large vessels. The rocky shores are scamed and torn it would not be wise for navigators to visit the locality in any craft that would not stand wind and weather.

Coal is There The evidence of coal lands are plain, on Yakoun River and at Skidegate. Two companies are now engaged in development work and others will have their plants on the ground, in a short time.

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Fortunes for Some At the present time few of the residents of Prince Rupert realize the opportunities offered on the adjacent islands. The increase in population, following the construction of the railway, will bring capital and labor to exploit and develop the territory now almost unknown.

Riley of the Dundee mine at Ymir has been appointed manager of the three big properties in which Mr. Rand is interested, the Toad Mountain Consolidated, the Dundee and the Athabasca.

FINE LADY SWIMMERS

Miss Fletcher Wins English Championship, Beating Record Holder.

London, Aug. 11.—Miss Curwen, of Liverpool, gave Miss Jennie Fletcher, of Leicester, a great race at Leicester in the 100 yards ladies' English championship. These ladies took the lead from the start, and were practically level up to 66 2-5 yards, when Miss Curwen turned just ahead. The decision that Miss Fletcher had won in 1 min. 15 3-5 secs., and Miss Curwen was second in 1 min. 15 4-5 secs., was disputed. If Miss Curwen could have reproduced her form of the previous day she would probably have won with a good margin, for she covered the distance in 1 min. 12 3-5 secs., beating Miss Fletcher's world's record made at Manchester in October, 1909, by a second.

Miss Fletcher has not been quite so speedy since that splendid performance. Indeed, she seems at present to be a little faster than last year, when Miss Steers of Cardiff, beat her in 1 min. 13 3-5 secs. Miss Steers did not defend her title this year, although a few days previous she easily won the 100 yards ladies' championship of Cardiff in 1 min. 20 secs. Miss Steers swam excellently in gaining third place to Miss Fletcher and Miss Curwen. TRIED TO SAVE EDITOR'S GIRL

Newspaperman Drowned Near San Deigo While Trying to Save Daughter of His Chief.

James Rackenbury, a tourist from Denver, Col., displayed rare bravery in attempting to save Karberg. As each succeeding wave carried the reporter farther out to sea, Rackenbury, a powerful swimmer, soon found himself struggling with the huge breakers and was compelled to give up the fight. Karberg's body has not been found.
