A new machine gun, invented by a Japanese, which will fire 9,000 shots a minute, is believed by experts to be similar to the machine gun capable of firing 33,000 times a minute which was perfected by Levi W. Lombard, left of Boston, in 1918. Similar to the description of the Japanese gun, the Lombard weapon, shown at top being operated by Earl L. Ovington, of Santa Barbara. 
