Prediction In Regard To Crop Situation Is Voiced by Authority

Sir Herbert Robson Says That Grain Yield Has Never Been so Seriously Affected by Adverse Weather **Conditions in Forty Years**

LONDON, July 19: (CP)-Prediction that during the next twelve months, starting with the new crop year of August 1, the world demand for wheat would be sufficient to take care of the potential supply was made today by Sir Herbert Robson, leading English grain trader and president of the London Corn Association.

"I venture to say that, during the past forty years, there has never been a season when crops have been so adversely affected by weather conditions," he declared.
