## TIDAL WAVE SWEEPS OVER DESOLATE EGG ISLAND AND DOES LIGHTHOUSE DAMAGE

Everything Moveable Carried Away by Furious Storm Which Was-Worst Since Light Was Established Thirty Years Ago
