Provision Made For Recovery of Payments Due by Berlin Under Young and Dawes Loans—Export Quotas Against British Goods Also to be Fought

LONDON, June 21: (CP)—The British government is taking wide powers of reprisal against the German default decree. A bill to establish an exchange clearing house, which will be given second reading in the House of Commons next Monday, provides not only for recovery of payments due on the Young and Dawes loans but also empowers action against any country setting quotas on British exports. The Board of Trade will be authorized to prohibit or restrict imports from any countries using the quota system in a manner considered adverse to British interests. Germany has been notified that, unless a satisfactory accord is reached, operation of the new bill will be effective July 1.

LOS ANGELES, June 21.—The case of Mrs. Nellie Madison, charged with the murder of her second husband, a motion picture studio worker, is expected to go to the jury today. A unique feature of the trial was the calling of her first husband as a witness to testify that she had once threatened his life.

MERGING SERVICES

Beatty and Fullerton Would Join Express and Telegraphs—Members Opposed

OTTAWA, June 21.—Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion, minister of railways and canals, yesterday read to the House of Commons committee on railways and shipping a joint letter from E. W. Beatty K.C., president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and Hon. C. P. Fullerton, chairman of the board of trustees of the Canadian National Railways, asking that enabling legislation for amalgamation of the express and communications (telegraphs) departments of the two systems be passed at the present session of Parliament.

LOST LIFE IN SKEENA

John Everett Hill, Aged 24, of Terrace, Victim of Accidental Drowning While Fishing

The newly opened salmon fishing season on the Skeena River was marked by early tragedy at 2:15 this morning when John Everett Hill of Terrace, aged 24, was accidentally drowned. With his brother, Bruce, young Hill was gill netting off De Horsey Island near the mouth of the river when the boom of the boat swung and the unfortunate young man was knocked overboard. He sank and the body was not recovered. Hill was fishing for Inverness cannery.

Geological Survey Around Ketchikan

Party to be Active in Vicinity of Alaskan City

KETCHIKAN, June 21.—A federal geological survey party will be active in this district this season investigating mineral deposits and possibilities of the area. Annette Island will be included in the ground to be covered by the survey. Much information of value to prospectors and mining men is expected to be secured.

Women Lose Their Lives When German Liner Wrecks in Norway

HAUGESUND, Norway, June 21.—Three women lost their lives yesterday when the 14,000 ton German liner Dresden, carrying one thousand Nazi holiday passengers, struck a rock in a fjord near here.

CANADA TO BUY SILVER

Under Important New Currency Measure to Finance Public Works

OTTAWA, June 21: (CP)—The new monetary bill given first reading by the House of Commons Tuesday authorizes the Minister of Finance to purchase 1,670,000 ounces of silver as agreed upon last year. Next year silver purchases will be made by the Bank of Canada. The Prime Minister indicated that the increased gold note issue would be utilized as a means of financing his special public works program.

OPPOSED TO HAPSBURGS

Little Entente Does Not Want Return of Monarchy to Austria Or Hungary

BUCHAREST, Roumania, June 21.—Foreign ministers of the Little Entente nations, Roumania, Yugoslavia, and Czechoslovakia, have voiced opposition to the restoration of the Hapsburg monarchy in Austria or Hungary.

Sweepstake Proceeds To Be Forfeited To Crown Under Bill

OTTAWA, June 21: (CP)—First reading was given on Wednesday without discussion to a bill which would amend the Criminal Code of Canada so that proceeds of a lottery would be forfeited to the crown instead of an informer. The bill does not apply to small raffles and church bazaars in which the amount involved is less than \$50.


