LABORITES WIN HEAVILY IN BRITAIN

STEVENS TAKES UP CUDGELS ON BEHALF OF FISHERMEN

Conservatives Suffer Huge Reverses, Result Of Municipal Voting

Forty-Five Communists in All Parts of Country Are All Defeated—Liberal Party Slips Further Towards Oblivion as Boroughs Vote

LONDON, Nov. 2: (CP)—Labor won sweeping victories in yesterday's British municipal elections. Early this evening a compilation of voting in London and all England and Wales showed 526 Labor gains, 405 Conservative losses and thirty Liberal losses with ninety-two other losses. Forty-five Communists in various parts of the country were all defeated.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—After a promising start, the stock market turned weak again yesterday with the price margin narrow and turnover for the day amounting to but \$49,000 shares. Gets Nine Months In Burglary Case

Harvey Leighton to Get Another Trip South For Breaking and Entering Store

Harvey Leighton, Metlakatla Indian, who was brought back to the city this week from Courtenay whence he had gone in a fishing boat, appeared in city police court yesterday afternoon before Magistrate McClymont and, pleading guilty to a charge of breaking and entering in connection with the recent burglary of Jabour's store here, was sentenced to nine months' imprisonment at Okalla.

Leighton, together with David Edward Ryan, who was recently convicted on a similar charge and also sentenced to nine months' imprisonment, was taken to Okalla last night on the Prince George by Corp. S. W. Dawson of Campbell River who had brought Leighton north on Wednesday.

City Councils To Stay in Command

Commissioners Not to be Appointed For Port Moody or Fernie

VICTORIA, Nov. 2: (CP)—The Department of Municipal Affairs announces that the cities of Port Moody and Fernie, which have made temporary default in interest payments on bonded indebtedness, will not be placed under commissioners but the respective councils will be left in command as the most practical form of administration for the present.

BRITISH CONSULATE IN HAVANA BOMBED

HAVANA, Nov. 2.—Terrorists yesterday bombed the British consulate here. Heavy damage was done to the building but no persons suffered injury.

FORD TO BUILD MILLION AUTOS IN COMING YEAR

DETROIT, Nov. 2:—Announcing a production schedule for a million cars for the coming year, the greatest in four years, Henry Ford yesterday expressed himself as being highly optimistic in regard to general business prospects in 1935. The Ford Motor Co. was "out of the depression," said Ford in announcing an intended manufacture of "one million cars or better" next year. The new schedule will involve an outlay of \$415,000,000.

NEW RECORD FOR FLIGHT

Cathart Jones and Ken Waller Are Back in England

LONDON, Nov. 2: (CP)—Cathart Jones and Ken Waller, English "boomerang fliers," reached England this afternoon after completing the round trip flight to Melbourne and back in thirteen days, six hours during which they covered 22,600 miles. From Melbourne the westward flight was made in a new record of five days and sixteen hours, three days better than the former record.

THIRTEEN MAY HAVE DROWNED

Wreckage Picked Up in Gulf of St. Lawrence Gives Rise to Fears Of Sea Tragedy

CLARKE CITY, Que., Nov. 2: (CP)—Thirteen persons are believed to have been drowned in the loss of a small steamer and an unidentified St. Pierre and Miquelon fishing schooner in the Gulf of St. Lawrence during a heavy gale on Sunday or Monday. Wreckage of both craft has been picked up.

Precipitation And Sunshine in 1934 Are Both Greater

Prince Rupert had a substantial amount of rainfall during the month of October this year, the precipitation totalling 12.6 inches as compared with 13.8 inches in the same month last year, bringing the precipitation total for 1934 to date up to 82.54 inches in comparison with 69.55 inches in the first ten months of 1933. There was but 37.7 hours of sunshine in October this year as against 46.4 hours in October 1933, bringing sunshine for this year to date up to 962.6 hours as compared with 869.3 hours in the corresponding period last year.

United States is Repenting For Its Vicious Example Of High Tariff, Says Secretary

NEW YORK, Nov. 2: (CP)—Admitting that the United States had set a "vicious example of high tariffs," Secretary of State Cordell Hull, in an address read to the Foreign Trade Association, at its annual conference here last night, declared: "We have repented." "Extreme nationalism, if persisted in, is destined soon to wreck our entire structure of western civilization," the Secretary of State declared.

Former Minister of Trade and Commerce Active in Committee

Takes Up Question of Low Earnings of Independent Operators in Comparison With Company Men—Britain to be Questioned

OTTAWA, Nov. 2: (CP)—Hon. H. H. Stevens, former minister of trade and commerce, before the mass buying and price spreads committee, of which he recently resigned as chairman, yesterday afternoon took up the question of low earnings of Nova Scotia fishermen and gave notice of several pointed questions he would ask of A. H. Brittain of Montreal, president of the National Fish Co., when he appears before the commission on Monday.

BANKER SEES BETTER TIMES

F. E. Robertson Says One Does Not Have to Go Away From Prince Rupert to Find it Out

There is a tremendous improvement in general business conditions in the east over a year ago," states F. E. Robertson, local manager of the Royal Bank of Canada, who returned to the city on Wednesday evening's delayed train after a vacation trip to Toronto, Montreal and elsewhere in the east. LOS ANGELES, Nov. 2:—Buren Fitts, district attorney, was indicted by a grand jury here yesterday on a charge of perjury arising out of the dismissal of John P. Mills on a morals charge in connection with the notorious "love lottery" case in 1931. Fitts' sister was also indicted in the same connection.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 2:—In recognition of National Fish Week which is now being observed travellers on trains of the Canadian National Railways will find on the dining car menus for the breakfast, luncheon and dinner a choice selection of tasty Canadian fish dishes to tempt their appetite, according to G. A. McNicholl, general passenger agent. While fish is served on these dining cars regularly throughout the year, special dishes are planned during National Fish Week to encourage the consumption of Canadian fish.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 2:—Supposedly having been suffering from a nervous breakdown, the body of Mrs. Anne Johnson, wife of Joseph Johnson, Los Angeles banker, was found beside the tomb of Rudolph Valentino, famous moving picture actor, yesterday. She had committed suicide by taking poison.

MULLER IS THE GOAT

Archbishop Ludvig Muller, having failed to force the German people to acknowledge him as head of the German Evangelical Church, has been forced to resign. In other words Hitler is right but Muller is wrong. It comes back to something like the British Constitution under which the King can do no wrong. If wrong is done, it is the advisers who are wrong.

Evidently this is the second great mistake of the Nazi government. The first was trying to foment a Nazi rebellion in Austria. In that case as in this Hitler withdrew from the movement when he found it had failed. Other persons were the goats.

No one can say exactly what effect the failure of the attempt to control the religious opinion of the Germans may have. There is no doubt that the people were much disturbed over the Muller experiment. Possibly it may also weaken their faith in Hitler as a political leader. But Hitler still has control and he is known to be absolutely ruthless with those who oppose him. Those who foment discord are said to mysteriously disappear and the fear of being one of those who cannot be found is spreading throughout the nation.

AIYANSH, Nov. 2:—Capt. Hutchinson and Capt. Hanney, Church Army visitors from England, were given a great reception during a recent visit to Aiyansh, the event being one of much importance in local church history. The occasion was marked by special proceedings of various forms.

Capt. Adams took a boat down the river to meet the two visiting officers upon whose arrival the whole community turned out to extend a welcome. Local officers of the Church Army and the Army band led a procession to the Church Hall where an address of welcome was read by the rector, Rev. S. Kinley, after which the visitors were invited to a wedding party.

In the evening a service was held in the Church Army Hall with an attendance of three hundred crowding the hall to the doors.

The following day there was a gathering in the village hall under the auspices of the Woman's Auxiliary, a service being held in the evening. Again all the people of the village attended.

Next day the Young People's Society was host to the visitors with a supper in the Hall.

Saturday being a half holiday, there was a sports program with football, baseball, lacrosse, basketball and foot races, the two captains joining in all the sports with real good sportsmanship. In the evening a general sacred concert was held in the Church Army Hall, the entertainment being a splendid one. Those taking part included the Church Army sisters, Capt. Adams with bass solos, Capt. Hanney with accordion solos, Miss Ruth Adams, Miss Winnie Davies and Mrs. Johnson with vocal solos and the Church Army officers.

Each day they were here Capt. Hutchinson and Capt. Hanney held services for the children.

Many people turned out on the river bank to farewell the officers when they departed for Greenville.

JUBILEE AT
KITSEGUKLA

Fiftieth Anniversary of Bringing Of Gospel is Observed

KITSEGUKLA, Nov. 2:—An epoch in the history of missions to the native people was commemorated on the Skeena River on October 20 and 21 when the jubilee year of the bringing of the Gospel Message by the Methodist Church to Kitsegukla was celebrated. The village, gay with arches of welcome, flags and Chinese lanterns, erected by different societies, was a pleasing sight to visitors from the neighboring villages of Kispiox, Hazelton, Kitwanga and Kitwanooc when, led by the local band and their hosts, they paraded the streets preliminary to marching to a meeting on the river bank where the opening part of the day's program was held. On this site Rev. William Henry Pierce, the first missionary, landed in 1884 and it was a great disappointment to everyone that, at the last moment, sickness and advancing age prevented his presence. His place was taken by Peter Milton, one of the first converts, who gave a resume of what took place so long ago and described the environment and customs of the time. Only two other converts of the first year survive—Mrs. Peter Milton and Mrs. Simideeks, and these ladies sang a hymn with clear tuneful voices. It was difficult to believe they had learned it from Mr. Pierce so many years ago.

The different village organizations gave a splendid feast in the evening, the tables being loaded with good things. Speeches of appreciation and instruction were given by James Ryan, Kitwanga; Chief Ernest Weehah, Kitwanooc; Tom Campbell, Hazelton; Henry Russell, Glen Vowell; Walter Scoultz, Kispiox; Peter Mark, president of Epworth League; Arthur Sampare, president of Kitsegukla Band; Moses Jones, president of Council; David Williams, vice-president Athletic Club; Mrs. Moses Jones, president Woman's Missionary Society, and Alfred McDames, local preacher.

The evening was made the more enjoyable by the band playing a popular selection of music exceedingly well and by the antics of a dozen or so boys and girls who impersonated a Chinese troop, their make-up and acting being really clever and amusing.

Sunday Services

Sunday was given to worship and praise. Services continued throughout the day, being marked with fervor and blessing, to which the choirs of the United Church of Kitsegukla, the Anglican Church of Kitwanga and the local corps of the Salvation Army contributed not a little with beautiful anthems.

Over fifty people partook of Holy Communion at an early service.

NEWS OF THE MINES

Planes Doing Valuable Work in Mining But Roads Also Needed—Echo of McConnell Creek Mining Fiasco—Engineer in Interior

The whole north country owes much to the enterprise of air service companies and the courage of splendid pilots in connection with mining development in the opinion of A. M. Manson, M. L. A. for Omineca. Prospectors and mining men, says Mr. Manson, have penetrated by plane into parts of the province heretofore practically inaccessible. They have discovered new deposits of wealth, the planes having carried them to points that only the foot of the Indian had heretofore trodden. "But, while airplanes have discovered," declares Mr. Manson, "roads must follow to enable supplies and equipment to be taken in. Last year the planes of the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. carried in hay for their horses at the Slate Creek camp and, doubtless, they could continue to do so. They are doing more wonderful things each day but roads are essential. The terrain down the Omineca River is excellent for road building. The construction of a first class highway from Fort St. James to Finlay Forks would undoubtedly involve a considerable expenditure but it would pay. Not only would there be work for those on road construction but the payrolls in the northern camps would be doubled and trebled in a very short time. The yield to the crown in gas tax, two percent mineral tax and income tax would mount from year to year. Unemployment would be replaced by gainful occupation. The whole province would profit in a most substantial way. Let us get behind the mining industry. Let us encourage it in every way and mining will do more to rehabilitate this province in the next few years than any other single thing can do."

MARVELS OF GT. PYRAMID

Robert Bartlett Tells Some of Result
Of Studies Connected With
Egyptian Structure

An interesting address on the Great Pyramid was given yesterday to members of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club at their regular luncheon meeting in the Commodore Cafe by Robert Bartlett, a student of British Israel lore. This pyramid, which covers an area of thirteen acres, is pierced by tunnels, the measurements and direction of which all seem to have relation to astronomical or historical events. So striking are many of the facts and figures in this connection that, for many years they have been the marvel of scientists and students of history. They indicate that some people of two to three thousand years before the present era had a very complete knowledge of astronomy and the indications also seem to point to their being able to foretell important future events.

One interesting feature of the measurements is the fact that many of them lead to the mathematical quantity 3.14159 which is the ratio of the circumference of a circle to its radius.

The only inscription found in the chambers of the pyramid is that of Cheops, the king who is supposed to have had it erected.

At the close of the address Mr. Bartlett received the thanks of the club through President J. J. Little.
