PRESIDENT VON HINDENBURG PASSES

INVESTIGATION OF B. C. SUBSIDIES SOUGHT BY PATTULLO

Hitler Takes Absolute Control in Germany on Assuming Presidency

Former Kaiser Wilhelm and King George of Great Britain Sent Condolences—Famous Soldier-Statesman Was Eighty-Six Years of Age

BERLIN, Aug. 2: (CP)—President Paul von Hindenburg, who was commander of more than seven million soldiers during the Great War, died at 9 o'clock this morning and a few hours after his death was succeeded as President of Germany by Chancellor Adolph Hitler who served as a corporal during the War. It was immediately announced that a prebiscite would be held on August 19 to confirm Hitler as head of the government.

Minister of War von Blomberg prepared an oath to be sworn to by the Reichswehr, German standing army, demanding obedience to Hitler, supreme head of the army, "and that I will be ready as a brave soldier to give my life for this oath."

The funeral will be held at Neudeck on Saturday or Sunday. President von Hindenburg was eighty-six years of age.

King George Sympathizes LONDON, Aug. 2: (CP)—King George was aboard the royal yacht at Cowes when the death of President von Hindenburg of Germany was received. He immediately sent a message of sympathy to Col. Oskar von Hindenburg.

AGREEMENT IS DENIED

BLOEMFONTEIN, South Africa, Aug. 2:—Premier Hertzog and his minister of railways and defence emphatically deny that any secret agreement exists between the United Kingdom and the Union of South Africa regarding the participation of the latter in any future war.

MAKE POST OFFICE PAY

Postmaster General Farley of United States Intends to Change Deficit to Surplus

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 2:—Postmaster General James Farley announces plans for a readjustment of air and ocean mail carrying contracts whereby it is anticipated that millions of dollars will be saved annually to the government. Such will be the first step in Mr. Farley's program of making the postal department a revenue bearing arm of government service instead of a deficit producing service which it has been ever since its inception. Last year the postal department was operated at a deficit of \$50,000,000.

Many ocean and air mail contracts will be cancelled.



It was the first cabinet sworn in immediately after a provincial election in the province's history. NEW YORK, August 2:—The Canadian government has concluded negotiations with the Chase National Bank of New York for the refinancing of \$50,000,000 of treasury notes out of a total of \$60,000,000 about to fall due in the New York market.

TRADE PACT IS PLANNED

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 2:—Political and economic questions having eliminated Canada and at least five other nations, including some of the best consumers of United States goods, new reciprocal trade agreements are necessitated.

It is stated here that definite plans are being made for a reciprocity treaty with Canada.

Navy Planes Leave Ketchikan Tuesday Continuing Flight

KETCHIKAN, Aug. 2:—Six United States Navy planes, on their way from San Diego to Dutch Harbor, left Ketchikan for Juneau Tuesday afternoon in continuation of their northern flight after spending a few days here.

Only Few Marine Workers Still On Strike in South

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2:—The only marine workers on the Pacific Coast still on strike, following the termination yesterday of the long-shoremen's strike, are certain groups of cooks, waiters and steamship service department employees.

Halibut Fishing in Area No. Two Closing on August 19, It Is Announced by Commission

SEATTLE, Aug. 2: (CP)—The International Fisheries Commission announces the closing of Area No. 2 between the Washington coast and Cape Spencer, Alaska, in which most of the smaller Canadian vessels operate, to all halibut fishing effective midnight August 19 because of heavy catches as a result of which the quota for the season will soon be exhausted. Officials said that the closure would probably be effective until the end of the year.

Fishing will be permitted to continue in Area No. 3, the other principal fishing district of the Pacific Coast.

Adequacy of Federal Aid to This Province Questioned by Premier

Royal Commission to Probe Matter is Asked at Meeting Of Entire Dominion Cabinet—Sale of Pacific Great Eastern to Canadian National Also Sought

OTTAWA, Aug. 2: (CP)—A royal commission to investigate adequacy of Dominion subsidies to British Columbia was sought today by Premier T. D. Pattullo of the Pacific Coast province. Premier R. B. Bennett and his entire cabinet heard the appeal but no immediate reply was made. Premier Pattullo, however, appeared to be hopeful that the request would be granted.

Later in the day the British Columbia premier submitted a request for the sale of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway to the Canadian National system.

LONDON, August 2:—Both Houses of Parliament adjourned on Tuesday until October 10 unless public interest requires an earlier re-assembly.



## Yukon Plane Here Overnight on Its Way to Vancouver

The plane, which will be in the south for the next three weeks undergoing an overhaul, had on board as passengers Mrs. Wasson, wife of the pilot; Francis C. McCann of Santa Rosa, Cal., who has been in the Yukon on business in connection with mining interests, and Ellis H. G. Tyner of Atlin.

## MANAGER IS HURT

E. H. Kinder, in Charge at Surf Inlet Mine, Sustains Severe Compound Leg Fracture

Bringing in E. H. Kinder, mine manager at Surf Inlet for the Princess Royal Gold Mines Limited, which company is operating the old Belmont-Surf Inlet property, who had the misfortune to sustain a compound fracture of the left leg yesterday morning when the flywheel of a railway speeder on which he was riding broke and struck him, the company's service boat Colnetie arrived here early this morning from Surf Inlet, Mr. Kinder being at once admitted to the Prince Rupert General Hospital where later today he went under anaesthetic to have the fracture set.

Mr. Kinder was accompanied to the city by his wife and J. B. Woodworth president of the Princess Royal Gold Mines Ltd., who was paying a visit to the mine when the accident occurred. Mr. Woodworth will proceed to Vancouver on the Cardena tomorrow night.

made. George W. Nickerson said he was glad to say a few words for Olof Hanson and his work at Ottawa. The Canadian Halibut Vessel Owners' Association felt that he had done things for them which were of considerable value. For a member in opposition Mr. Hanson had done excellent work. In the next House with a Liberal Government in power he would be able to give entire satisfaction, he felt. Among the measures put through had been one for allowing fishermen to count fishing service as experience in getting navigation papers. Hitherto service on any little tug boat was counted as more value than fishing. Another important matter was the reduction in rates on carrying autos to and from Vancouver. It took a private interview with Mr. Hungerford to secure action.

Frank Hart said he felt Mr. Hanson had done better than anyone else at Ottawa. If Hanson were not renominated, it should, at any rate, be some one with a stake in the country. Most other politicians had left as soon as they were defeated.

Howard Campbell said Stewart Liberals were 100 percent behind Olof Hanson. At their meeting Friday they had decided to back him to the full.

T. Ross McKay said from what he had heard of Mr. Hanson at Ottawa he was noted for his fair-mindedness and efficiency. He Mr. McKay, had left the Liberal party when he felt it was straying from Liberalism but, in forsaking the party for a time, he had got a terrible disappointment. The Conservatives were lacking in the spirit of democracy. He could not conceive of them asking advice from the rank and file as Mr. Hanson had done. He felt that all had more to hope for from the Liberals than from the Conservatives.

After the speeches a new constitution and bylaws were considered for the guidance of the party. Several amendments were suggested and it was decided to bring them before the annual meeting at beginning of next year for final adoption.

Convention Postponed  
The nominating convention has been postponed from tomorrow until Friday of next week owing to the delay in arrival of the train from the east which was to have brought interior delegates here this evening.


