The funds derived from this supertax would be used for the purpose of re-

GOLD BILL

Currency Devaluation Measure Now Included in Laws of United States

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. (CP)-Following unanimous approval by the House of Representatives on Monday of the Senate amendment limiting the life of the measure to three years, President Franklin D. Roosevelt late yesterday signed the administration's gold bill and currency revaluation measure which has formally become law, going into force today. The bill gives the United States Treasury title to gold in Federal Reserve banks and bestows power upon the president to devalue the dollar by from forty to fifty percent of gold content.

Institutional work of the Prince, Dunwell, .30. Rupert General Hospital was re- Georgia River, 1021/2. ported upon by Miss Jean Harrison R.N., lady superintendent, at the annual general meeting of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association last evening. Nine hundred and nineteen patients had been treated during the year. Miss Harrison reported. There had been 19.342 patient days in all or an average of 21 days per patient. Seventy-eight births and 40 deaths. had occurred. A total of 374 general anaesthetics had been administered, 247 x-ray examinations made and 126 major and 301 minor operations performed. Nine pupil nurses had completed training during the year and seven pupils had been admitted to the training school.
