MUNICIPALITIES ASK INCOME TAX FOR THEIR ASSISTANCE

Roosevelt late yesterday signed the administration's gold bill and currency revaluation measure which has formally become law, going into force today.

MADE ALTITUDE RECORD, KILLED

MOSCOW, Jan. 31: (CP)—Three members of the crew of a Soviet stratosphere balloon which established a new world's altitude record of 67,585 feet yesterday, were killed while attempting to land southeast of here last night. They had exceeded the record set last fall by Commander T. G. W. Settle of Akron, Ohio.

Will Be No Lop-Sided Reciprocity With U.S. Says Prime Minister

Insists That Canada is Emerging From Depression Better Than Most Countries—Spikes Election Reports—Progressives Move Non-Confidence Amendment

OTTAWA, Jan. 31: (CP)—Canada will never sign a lop-sided reciprocity treaty with Washington that will open Canadian markets to lower priced farm products, Premier R. B. Bennett stated yesterday in the House of Commons.

refutation of his claim that Canada was emerging from the depression in better shape than most countries. He also spiked reports of a pending election, declaring that the general opinion of the people was against it.

In one sense, the Premier admitted, Canada was not yet out of the woods. It might be that "cruel disciplinary measures" would be necessary through a very large conversion loan when conditions were ripe.

Replying to the criticism of Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Leader of the Opposition, with respect to the proposal of the government to limit wheat acreage under the London agreement, Premier Bennett read telegrams and other correspondence that had passed between Ottawa and the governments of the three prairie provinces in respect to this matter. There had been no restriction placed on exports, the Premier declared.

The question of hours of labor and compensation will be carefully investigated by a select committee of the House of Commons to be appointed under provisions of a resolution respecting mass buying by department and chain stores and kindred matters now long standing on the order paper in his name, the Prime Minister told the House last night.

Robert Gardiner, leader of the United Farmers of Alberta and Progressive groups, introduced an amendment to the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne which, in effect, expressed lack of confidence not only in the government but in the official opposition.

HOSPITAL FINANCES

Statement Presented at General Meeting—Interesting—Deficit During 1933 Negligible

The financial statement for the year was, as usual, one of the most interesting documents to be presented at the annual general meeting last night of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association. In presenting the financial report, G. V. Wilkinson, chairman of the finance committee, announced that a decrease of revenue last year totalling \$7893.67 had been offset by the enforcement of strict economies and cutting of major expenses including a 10 percent reduction in wages with the result that the institution had been able to close the year with a deficit of but \$1167.99 as compared with a deficit of \$859.21 in the preceding year.

Mr. Wilkinson pointed out that the provincial government grant for 1933 had been \$14,905.95 or \$3557.35 less than in the preceding year, the civic grant had been \$11,844.10 or \$2758.70 less than in 1932. The cost per patient day had averaged \$2.57 which compared very favorably with other hospitals in the province.

The chairman of the finance committee referred to the problem of indigent cases which had come not only from the city itself but from various points in the district. "We can see no prospect of increased revenue during 1934," concluded the report of the finance committee, "and we recommend that rigid economy be exercised and every expenditure be carefully considered before it is passed."

It will be at least another month before the Prince George job is finished.

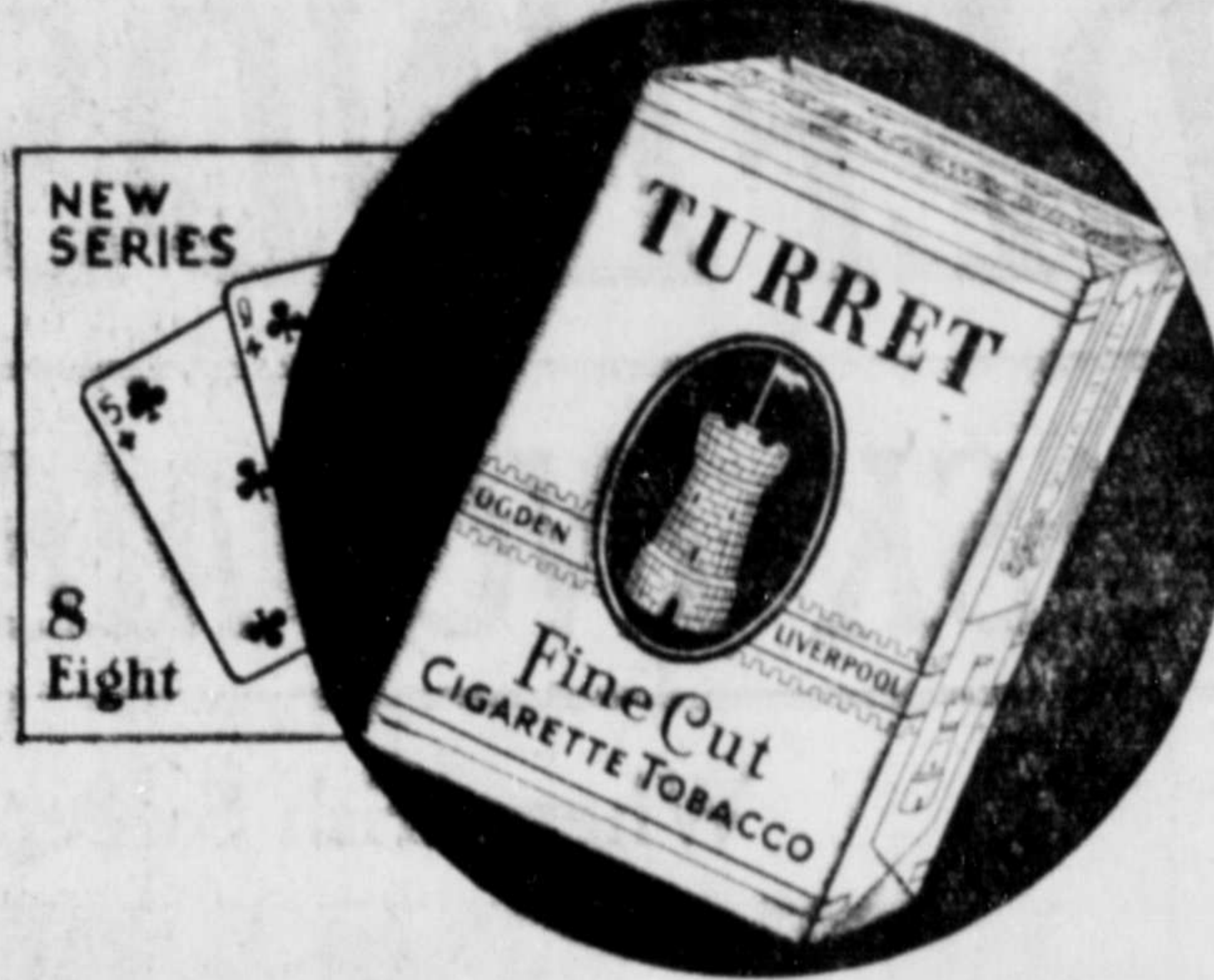
William Dann replied to the toast on behalf of the guests, expressing amazement at the growth of the organization since the first dinner to veterans was given by himself in 1922.

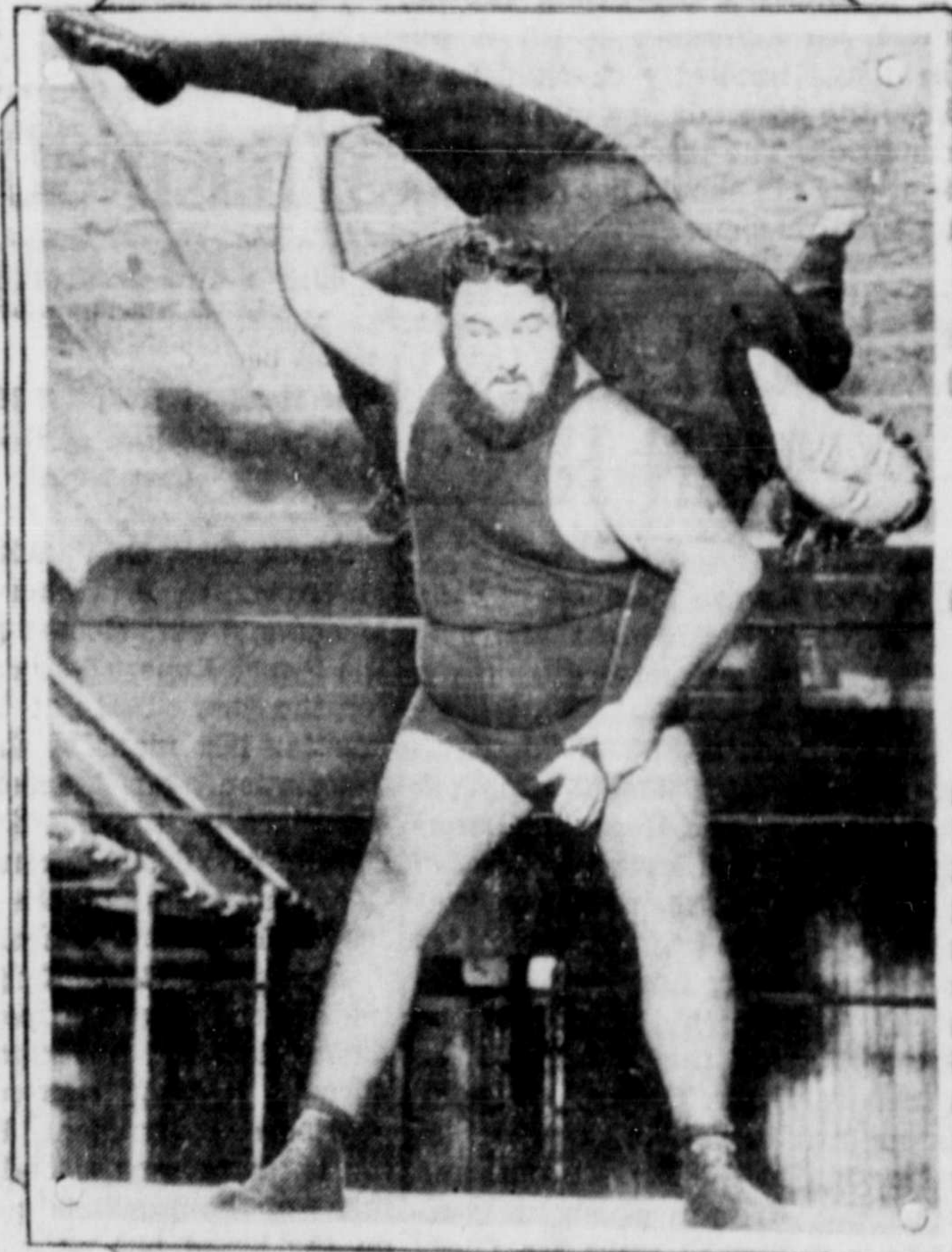

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HOSPITAL DID WELL

Despite Difficulties Institution Had Satisfactory Year in 1933

In his presidential report for the year 1933 at the annual general meeting last night of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association, Frank Dibb expressed a reasonable pride in the showing that had been made and the service which had been maintained by the institution under the difficult circumstances of the past year. Particularly gratifying was the financial showing, a deficit of but \$1167.99 being recorded despite the fact that civic and government grants had been greatly reduced and revenue was \$6634.47 lower than for the previous year. This showing had been made possible by economies which had been put into effect without, however, impairing the efficiency of the institution. Mr. Dibb paid tribute to the work of the managing secretary and the finance committee in connection

with the financing of the institution. The deficit had been infinitesimal when compared with that of the most other hospitals in the country. Appreciation was also expressed of the co-operation given the hospital by City Commissioner W. J. Alder in connection with the payment of civic grants.

The question of a new hospital building had been discussed during the year, Mr. Dibb stated. If this could not be undertaken, further repairs to the present building would be needed.

Mr. Dibb made an appeal for a more adequate understanding and a more sympathetic attitude on the part of the public towards hospital problems. The importance of the hospital in the community and the necessity of education of the public along these lines were stressed.

In regard to the splendid work that had been carried out in the hospital training school, Mr. Dibb referred to the fact that of nine students who had taken Registered Nurses' examinations during the year one had passed second in the province and seventy percent had passed with first class honors.

In concluding his report, Mr. Dibb thanked members of the Medical Association and of the board, the managing secretary and lady superintendent as well as members of the staff, those who had made donations and all others who had assisted in any way.

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BRITAIN TO RETALIATE

Runciman Demands That France Restore Quotas For British Trade

LONDON, Jan. 31:— Unless France restores the former quotas for British trade, Great Britain will impose retaliatory tariffs in the very near future, Rt. Hon. Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Trade, announced in the House of Commons.

NAVAL MAN IS SPEAKER

Commander C. J. Beard R. C. N. of Ottawa Heard at Gyro Club Luncheon Yesterday

"I hate war and I would do anything in my power to prevent it," was the frank admission of Commander C. J. Beard R. C. N., Ottawa, director of naval reserves for Canada, in addressing the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at luncheon yesterday. Seasoned naval man as he is with a long active service career, Commander Beard told his listeners that, as far as actual conflict was concerned, he had been terrified much of the time and bored the rest of it. There was little "fun" in it he had found. The speaker urged preparedness and adequate defences as the most effective means of obviating warfare.

Commander Beard, who was an officer in the Dover patrol during the Great War, speaking in a pleasantly informal and conversational style, told many interesting anecdotes of that service. It was a remarkable achievement that never a man should have been lost in the transporting of troops across the Straits from England to France and that there had been so little loss of tonnage. Undoubtedly, the Germans had missed many chances.

With enemy surface craft altogether eliminated from the area, Commander Beard told how the Channel had been closed to undersea craft by the searchlight chain which prevented submarines showing themselves at the top of the water by night and the mines which made it impossible for them to operate under the surface.

Due to electrically controlled depth charges, the submarine had now lost much of its effectiveness in actual warfare, Commander Beard declared.

As for aerial conflict, the speaker pointed out that fog was a factor against which aircraft were still largely impotent. They simply could not operate in fog.

Commander Beard gave the interesting information, which is not generally known, that the first Canadian to lose their lives on service in the Great War were four young midshipmen who were lost in the Good Hope on November 1, 1914.

During the luncheon Frank Dibb was congratulated upon having achieved the status of a grandfather—the first member of the Gyro Club to do so. The congratulations were tendered by Past President T. W. Brown who was in the chair in the absence of W. H. Tobey, the president.

Guests at the luncheon, in addition to Commander Beard, were Walter Hume, L. H. Haworth, G. P. Tinker, T. N. LePage, H. S. Meadows, Peter Lakie and J. J. Little.

Maintenance Work Of Hospital Last Year Reported On

Improvements and repairs which had been carried out in hospital and nurses' home buildings during the year 1932 were reviewed by Robert Gordon, chairman of the house committee, in presenting his report at the annual general meeting last night of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Association. In concluding his report, Mr. Gordon pointed out that the building was now well over twenty years old and extensive repairs to the roof would be necessary in the near future.
