Striking Ideas in Regard to Future Developments Of North in Commerce, Transportation and Naval Activity Voiced by Clive Planta M.L.A. Before Gyro Club

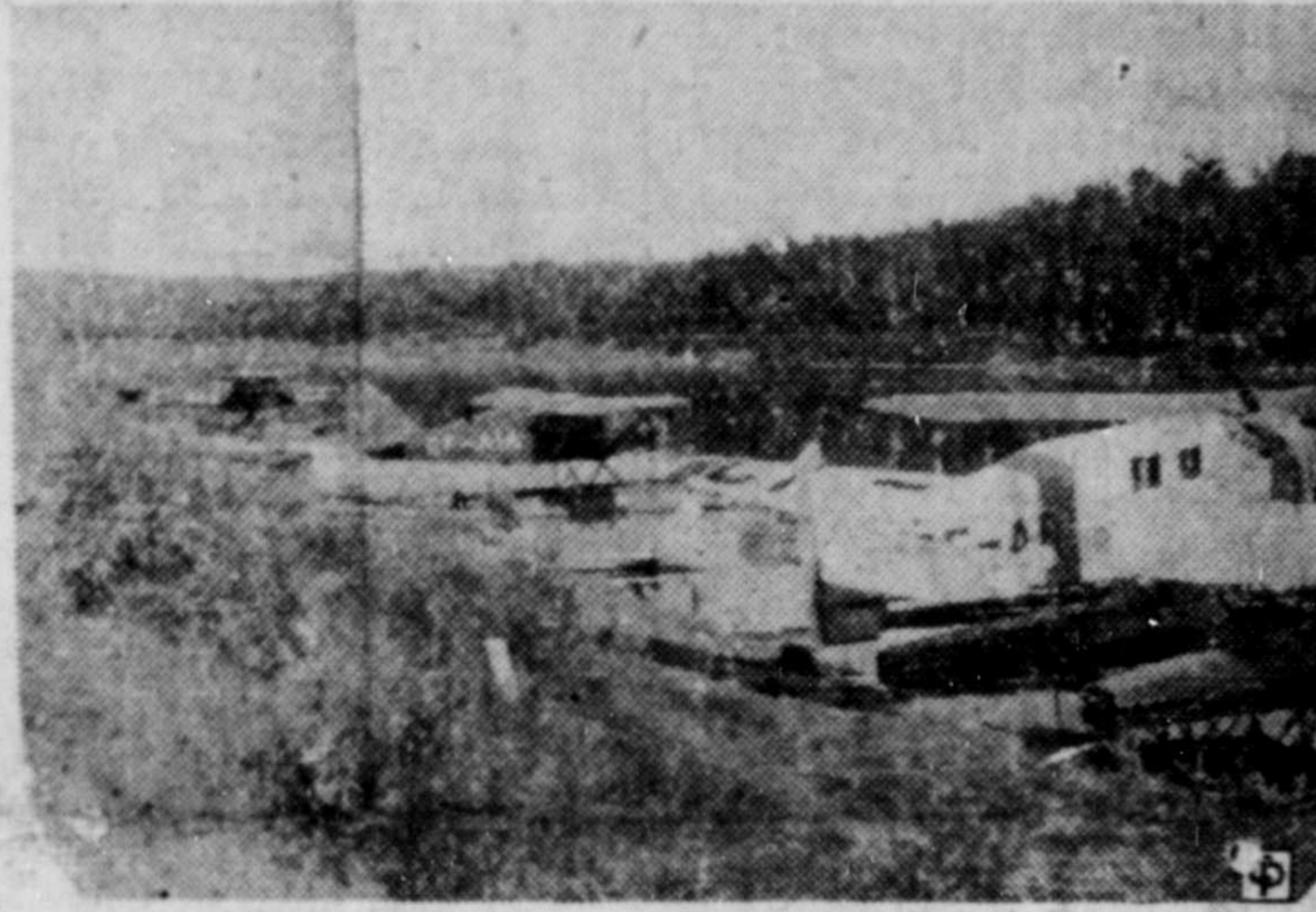
The city of Prince Rupert is paced in a position of extreme responsibility in the light of events that are to come. . . Prince Rupert is in the future to become the watch dog of the British Empire in the Pacific arena of trade. . . For us to build the Yukon Alaska highway with the full knowledge that it is required for a strategic purpose by the United States of America would be to commit an act that would in future inevitably embroil us in international differences. . . I would say build and maintain the Yukon Alaska Highway, allowing the United States every peace-time privilege, providing the panhandle of Alaska is ceded to British Columbia as a concession. . . If, in connection with the Yukon Alaska Highway, the Dominion government and the provincial governments can pledge Canada for some \$20,000,000, they can better justify providing the funds with which to complete highway transportation east and west from Prince Rupert to its natural hinterland.

Such were some of the striking ideas expressed by Clive Planta, M. L. A. for Peace River, in addressing members of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club and a number of guests at luncheon today. Mr. Planta's address proved to be one of unusual interest. He envisioned the important part that Prince Rupert was bound to play in future developments and events in the Pacific arena with respect to commerce, transportation and possible naval activity. Mr. Planta gave considerable attention to the proposed Yukon Alaska highway, giving some interesting views in relation to same. He referred briefly to the Pacific Coast rail outlet problem of the Peace River in regard to which he has placed himself unequivocally on record as being in favor of Prince Rupert as the outlet port and also justified the demand of Prince Rupert for immediate provision of highway transportation to the natural hinterland of the city.

Responsible Position "Prince Rupert, located as it is at the point on the British Columbia coast not far distant from the Alaska boundary, is placed in a position of extreme responsibility in the light of events that are to come," said Mr. Planta "No one can study the events of air navigation without realizing that all areas within reasonable proximity to the future air channels of the world are placed in very vulnerable positions. "We have heard it said that the forty-ninth parallel of this continent can be symbolized as a bond of friendship. We boast 100 years peaceful relationship with the country to the south. With the advent of air transportation, the world routes of which will be established within the radius of the Great Circle, this continent is for the first time in history about to feel the effects of the complicated international problems brought about through the close proximity of numerous nations with conflicting national objectives. Canada is bordered on the south by the United States and on the northwest by Al-

FULL TRAIN ASPEN LOGS

Ship Coming Here Next Week to Load Matchwood Timber For Orient

An extra freight train came in late yesterday afternoon from Fraser Lake, bringing twenty-four carloads of white aspen logs being shipped by M. M. Connolly to the Orient for use in manufacture of matchwood. Six carloads had come in previously and twelve more are expected before the end of the week, between forty and fifty cars in all going with the present consignment. The Ocean Shipping Co.'s freighter City of Vancouver is due here next week to load the logs for the Orient.

LOAN GOING OVER WELL

Subscriptions Started With Rush Yesterday—Bennett and Rhodes on Air

OTTAWA, Oct. 2: (CP)—The Canadian \$250,000,000 refunding loan started off with a rush yesterday morning when subscriptions from three Canadian companies alone totalled more than \$3,500,000.

Last evening Prince Rupert radio listeners were able to hear the appeals broadcast over the network of the Canadian Radio Commission by Premier R. B. Bennett, speaking from London, England, and Hon. E. N. Rhodes, minister of finance, from Ottawa, in support of the loan.

Mr. Rhodes, in explaining the nature and purpose of the loan, stated that this was a desirable investment opportunity where personal interest and national service went hand in hand. The minister of finance announced that one of the many evidences of better times returning to Canada was that federal government revenue for the first six months of the current fiscal year had shown an increase of \$26,000,000 over the same period in the last fiscal year.

Evidently due to transmission difficulties, the words of Premier Bennett from London were somewhat distorted. Forecasts of taxation reductions and lower interest rates to borrowers were contained in the addresses of Premier Bennett and Mr. Rhodes.

Fine New Town to Rise Out Of Fire Which Recently Destroyed Nome; Spacious Business Area

NOME, Oct. 2: (CP)—A new business district with fine modern buildings and spacious ninety-foot streets will arise out of the \$3,000,000 fire of September 18. Improvements will include the moving back of Front Street from the beach on Bering Sea to more solid ground. In early spring rebuilding will start along entirely modern lines with a general re-location of the streets and business district.

Work of cleaning up the fire debris was completed at the end of the week and shacks are now being run up to house the population for the winter.

DROVE DOWN WHEAT PRICE

Large Volume Today Dumped On Winnipeg Market Causing Collapse

WINNIPEG, Oct. 2: (CP)—Large volumes of wheat dumped on the exchange here from Eastern Canada and Chicago caused a break of almost five cents in today's market. Near the close the government agency was credited with rescuing the plunging prices which closed from three to three and a half cents lower than at the opening.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 2:—Cash wheat was quoted here today at 75 3/4c for No. 1 Northern.

INQUEST ADJOURNED

Tokio Feels American Aviation Development Is Menace to Pacific

Necessity For Continued Preparation For War With Russia is Emphasized—General Mitchell Sees Oriental Nation as Dangerous Enemy

TOKYO, Japan, Oct. 2: (CP)—The Japanese Army command published an official pamphlet today in which the strength of the United States in aviation is described as a possible menace to Japan. Necessity for continued preparations for possible war with Russia is emphasized. The pamphlet denounced the accumulation of wealth by a relatively few persons and the "enjoyment of income without labor by a certain section of the nation."

CHARGES ON GRAIN SALE

Wheat Pool Official Suspicious Of Activity in Connection With Argentine Futures

WINNIPEG, Oct. 2: (CP)—Unwarranted selling activity, due to the influence of huge Argentine futures, is forcing down the price of Canadian wheat, it was charged yesterday in a statement by John I. MacFarland of the sales department of the Canadian Wheat Pool. Mr. MacFarland urged an investigation into futures trading not only in the Winnipeg market but also in Buenos Aires and London.

Two Children Lose Lives In Burning Home

ABBOTTSFORD, B.C., Oct. 2:—When their small farm home near here was destroyed by fire late yesterday two children of Mr. and Mrs. Abraham J. Stoope, aged 2 and 4 years, were burned to death.

The children were sleeping in the home located near a hay barn which caught fire from land clearing operations. Both parents were working in the field at the time of the fire.

MR. PLANTA'S MISSION

The mission of Clive Planta, M. L. A. for Peace River, to Prince Rupert is primarily to seek support for the campaign to secure the immediate construction of 150 miles of railway connecting the present end of steel north of the Peace with the Fort St. John district. If this is built it means that there is every prospect that the road will continue to Prince Rupert. He also is anxious to stop the building of the Obed cutoff which would mean that the building of the real Pacific outlet would be delayed many years.

Mr. Planta favors Prince Rupert as the Peace River port because, by connecting with it, the people of the Peace would get the shortest practicable route and lowest possible rates on moving their export grain with the result that they would get the highest possible price for their product. He also would like to see the road through the Peace made the main northern transcontinental line. It would not be a branch of the line to Vancouver, as the present line here seems to be.

The suggestion of pulling up the rails between Prince George and Jasper and of electrifying the line from Vancouver to Hazelton has nothing to do with the other proposal except that it indicates how the present lines might be disposed of once the through line to Hazelton is built. It would be a matter for consideration when the other is finished.

THE ALBERTA PEACE COUNTRY

Part of the Peace River country within the Province of Alberta favors the Obed cutoff because the people there see in it quicker relief from the present conditions. But for the British Columbia section of the Peace to ship by the Obed cutoff would mean hauling their grain back into Alberta and then west again to the Pacific Coast. It would be little better than the present condition. If the route to Prince Rupert were constructed, the Alberta section of the Peace country would be on a main line and the southern section of that district, which at present favors Obed, would also tie up with it through continuation of the present line from Dawson Creek to Hudson's Hope.

aska, which is United States territory, but formerly Russian, and in close proximity to the sphere of influence of Russia and Japan through the advent of air transportation.

"Prince Rupert is in the future to become the watchdog of the British Empire in the Pacific arena of trade. You are destined to become the terminus of a railway travelling through the northern strata of this province via the Peace River Pass, which is the closest practical area of transportation in proximity to the Great Circle.

"It is not surprising that Sir Reginald Yorke Tyrwhitt, Admiral of the British Fleet, speaking in Montreal on August 22, said, 'Canada should defend the Pacific Coast with her own navy and let the British navy police the Atlantic. . . . Perhaps we cannot expect you to protect both coasts but you might protect one with your own navy. You could leave the Atlantic coast for us to look after while perhaps you could look after the Pacific yourselves.'

"If such a policy should be followed by Canada as it has been by Australia and New Zealand what would the position of Prince Rupert be? It would be only reasonable that some of such vessels would be stationed at a proper shelter near this port and would it not be reasonable to expect that the Peace River oil lands would be brought into production and served through this port for fuel consumption and export. I leave these thoughts of the future with you to justify any concerted action you may take now to bring this port into its rightful deserts.

The Alaska Highway

"I would suggest that if we graft a spinal cord of foreign origin such as the proposed Alaska Highway into the vertebrae of this province we are surely inviting a fatal attack of spinal meningitis.

"The outstanding argument in support of the Alaska Highway is that it can be brought about without strain on the provincial treasury. What does this infer? What are the powerful agencies? I am afraid the power is singular—it is the power of the United States of America. They require this highway as a strategic road, part of a plan to develop military and commercial aviation. It is the route which will connect, Fairbanks, Alaska, with the United States of America.

"I will be greatly surprised if the administrators of this province or the Dominion view their responsibilities from the short span of their own lifetime, with no regard for the generations that are to follow us. For British Columbia to be a party in allowing the United States of America to finance, by gift or easy term loan the construction of the proposed Alaska highway is to perpetrate a national insult which is unthinkable.

"Commercially, the United States is our competitor; internationally she is a foreign country—equally as foreign in matters of technical international relations as Italy, France or Japan.

"We refer to the people of the United States as our cousins. I wonder in this alleged family compact how far we will allow our affections to blind us to the inevitable.

"For us to build the Yukon Alaska highway with the full knowledge that it is required for a strategic purpose by the United States of America and, worse, to build it with United States money, is to commit an act in this day of peace between our countries that will in future inevitably embroil us in international differences.

"However, I could very easily ease my conscience in respect to my responsibility to posterity through a compromise deal with the United States. I would say, and I think you would agree, that we will gladly build and maintain the proposed Yukon Alaska Highway and build it with Canadian money, allowing the United States every peace-time privilege, providing the abortive pander of Alaska is ceded to British Columbia as a concession.

"If in connection with the proposed construction of the Yukon Alaska Highway the Dominion government and provincial governments can pledge Canada for some \$20,000,000, even though it be borrowed from United States on long term credit at low rates of interest, they can better justify taking a similar course to provide the funds with which to complete already long overdue highway transportation east and west from Prince Rupert to its natural hinterland."

WHIFFLETS
 From the Waterfront

Margaret I Leading Local Halibut Fleet For Production—Klemtu Cannery Closing This Week-End.

With the 1934 season nearing its close, the Margaret I, Capt. George Fritz, is the leading boat of the Prince Rupert halibut fleet for volume of production up to the end of September, having brought in a total of 219,000 pounds in twelve trips. The Prosperity A, Capt. A. C. Christiansen, is second with 192,500 pounds in ten trips and the Relief, Capt. Merrill Sollows, third with 181,500 pounds in eleven trips. As well as having the heaviest production for the season, the Margaret I has also made the greatest number of trips, the Kaien and P. Dorreen having also completed twelve trips. The Tahoma is the heaviest lander of American halibut for the season at Prince Rupert, also having brought in the greatest number of catches at the port. Her total poundage to date is 200,500 in fourteen trips. For volume of production, the Rainier is second with 155,500 pounds in six trips and the Majestic third with 148,000 pounds in five trips. The Visitor is second for number of catches landed, having completed twelve trips for a total of 78,800 pounds. The Frisco is third with ten trips and a total of 96,000 pounds.

With a good sized list of passengers including a number of local, Anyox and Stewart people who had visited Vancouver on a specially rated excursion, Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, arrived in port at 7:30 Sunday evening from the south and sailed at 9 p.m. for Anyox, Stewart and other northern points whence she returned here at 10:20 a.m. today and sailed at 1:30 p.m. for Vancouver and waypoints.

C. N. R. steamers Prince Rupert and Prince Charles, having been withdrawn from service for the season, both moved up to the local dry dock Sunday morning to be tied up for the winter. The personnels of both ships will leave on the steamer Prince George on Thursday night for their homes in Vancouver.

With a total list of forty passengers, C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. Thomas Cliff, arrived in port at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon from the south and sailed at 2 p.m. for Skagway and other Alaska points. The vessel, which had been delayed several hours by fog, is due to call here again southbound on Friday afternoon and is expected to have on board a large list of passengers. Seven persons disembarked from the vessel here while three embarked from this port for the north.

Howard W. Chambers, manager of Klemtu cannery, after having spent the week-end at Inverness, came in from the Skeena River yesterday afternoon and sailed this afternoon by the Catala on his return to Klemtu. Klemtu cannery will be closing down at the end of this week after an active season.

Scandinavian fishermen Monday morning delivered some 400 pounds of whiting, caught outside the harbor, to the Bacon Fisheries, it being the largest lot of this variety of fish to be landed here in some time. It will be disposed of locally. Capt. Dave Ritchie went out Monday with the Unome for another load of flatfish for the Bacon Fisheries.

HURT AT FUNERAL

Three in Hospital as Result of Collapse of Sidewalk During Rites Yesterday Afternoon

Mrs. K. Kadonaga, suffering from internal injuries, Roiokichi Hiyashi, seven year old boy, who sustained a broken nose, and K. Kabatani, elderly man, who has a broken ankle, are patients in the Prince Rupert General Hospital as a result of an accident yesterday afternoon at 3:15 when the sidewalk at the entrance to the B. C. Undertakers collapsed while the funeral of Albert Obata, a 17-year old Japanese youth, was in progress. It is estimated that some sixty people fell a distance of some twelve or fifteen feet into the rocks between the embankment of the street and the building when the walk gave away under the strain. The incident occurred as the casket was being carried out of the chapel to the hearse following the service, the casket also falling. In addition to those in the hospital, several other persons sustained bruises, cuts, torn clothes, etc. The police were called and the injured were taken to hospital in the ambulance. Relatives of the deceased expressed regret that the injuries should have befallen those who had come to mourn.
