TRYING TO INSURE PEACE OF WORLD

POISONED ONTARIO NEWSPAPERMAN'S WIDOW IS SUICIDE

Co-Operation of United States Is Necessary to Any Anti-War Drive

Such is Declaration of Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin of Great Britain—Military Accord Between Russia and France Denied

GLASGOW, Nov. 24: (CP)—Any collective effort by the nations to ensure the peace of the world must include the United States, Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Lord President of the Council, declared here last night. "Never as an individual will I sanction the British Navy being used for an armed blockade of any country in the world until I know what the United States is going to do," he declared.

PASSES IN VICTORIA

Mrs. Justice W. A. Gallier, Formerly Of Appeal Court, Dies

VICTORIA, November 24 (CP)—Former Justice William Alfred Gallier, who retired from the British Columbia Court of Appeal bench two years ago, died here yesterday at the age of seventy-six years.

Born in Bruce County, Ontario, Mr. Justice Gallier served in the Nile Expedition under Lord Garnet Wolseley in 1885 and afterwards practised law in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories, moving to British Columbia late in the Nineteenth Century and opening practice in the Kootenay district. He represented first case and then Kootenay in the House of Commons at Ottawa from 1900 to 1908. On November 30, 1909, he was appointed to the Court of Appeal bench.

ULM AT DETROIT

Australian Aviator Now On His Way From Montreal To Vancouver To Start Trans-Pacific Flight

MONTREAL, November 24 (CP)—Capt. Charles Ulm, Australian aviator, hopped off from here at 7:30 yesterday morning for Vancouver, flying via Detroit where he arrived safely a few hours later. In order to avoid unfavorable weather conditions, he planned to fly via Omaha, Cheyenne and Seattle to Vancouver whence he will proceed to San Francisco where it is his intention to start upon a trans-Pacific flight to Australia.

ARE SEA MONSTER'S REMAINS THOSE OF DREADED ZAWEAKSH KNOWN TO NATIVES OF OLD?

Experience of W. R. Sampson of Port Simpson Last Spring May Shed Light on Mystery

Are the remains of the huge sea monster now at the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station in process of preservation after having been discovered at Henry Island a few days ago those of ZAWEAKSH, "monster of the sea," which was known and feared by Indians of an early day on the north coast of British Columbia? Are they the remains of such a creature

as is reported to have been seen last May by W. R. Sampson, Port Simpson fisherman, and his two sons Robert, aged 21, and Harry, 16

while fishing for halibut in their gasboat Ballantyne on the northwest side of Stenhouse Shoal outside of the Dundas Islands? This appears to be very likely following an interview with Mr. Sampson whose description of the enormous creature which he observed for upwards of ten minutes travelling along the surface of the water with its whole body in full view and huge horse-like shaped head checks closely with the skeleton now here and scientists' conception of what the monster may have looked like in life. Possibly Mr. Sampson's description may be of assistance in any attempt that may be made later to reconstruct the body.

Mr. Sampson, who is spending the winter in Prince Rupert, states that he and his sons had ample opportunity to view the strange creature and make full observations. It was the son, Robert, who first sighted the monster as it appeared to be approaching almost straight for their boat. However, it passed by at a distance of some twenty or twenty-five yards. Good frontal and profile views were obtainable. Moving along the surface of the water at a goodly speed, the head was reared high out of the water at the end of a long neck. The lengthy body Mr. Sampson describes as resembling somewhat the fuselage of a flying boat. Not far back of the curve of the body and the neck were two flapper-like appendages hanging downwards on either side while in the centre of the back possibly ten feet from the tail was a vertical fin-like affair standing erect possibly to a height of four feet. The tail was shaped somewhat like that of a dogfish. The entire length Mr. Sampson estimated as about forty feet.

Detailed Description Giving more detailed description, Mr. Sampson said the head was of striking resemblance to that of a horse. Prominently bulbous at the end, the round mouth, possibly two feet across, seemed to have suckers rather than teeth. There appeared to be no ears but there were depressions in the front which might have contained eyes. The head and neck were brown colored and the back and body gray.

After passing abreast of the Sampson boat, the creature gradually began to submerge into the water with the head and high upright fin on back last to disappear beneath the surface. The younger son became quite nervous, fearing the monster might charge. However, he was assured by his father that there was no cause to be fearful. Mr. Sampson reported the sight both at Port Simpson and Prince Rupert. The old people at Port Simpson believed it was the same ZAWEAKSH, "monster of the sea," which they had either seen or heard

in their younger days. There was no record among them, however, of one having been seen in later years. Mr. Sampson is convinced that the skeleton here is that of such a creature as he and his sons saw.

Get One Alive In view of numerous reports that have been made by Prince Rupert fishermen of having seen in life in the water a creature which they believe may have been a monster such as the one whose skeleton has been found near here, undoubtedly in the future efforts will be made to take one into captivity alive should it be seen again. The value of such an exhibit can be readily appreciated. How such a creature could be taken might be a problem. Such methods as using a harpoon or lassoo are among those suggested.

In response to a request from the London Daily Mail, Dr. Neal Carter, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, today cabled to that Old Country newspaper a five hundred word article descriptive of the local sea monster. The details as given by Dr. Carter were along the same lines as already published here and elsewhere throughout the country.

If weather is favorable tomorrow the monster may be taken out of the formaldehyde vat in which it is being pickled and reassembled on the government wharf so that moving pictures may be taken of it. In any case, it is the intention to take such pictures before Tuesday afternoon. It will not be kept outside any longer than is necessary as it is the desire to complete the preserving process with as little interruption and delay as possible. It will have to stay in the formaldehyde for at least two or three weeks. It is particularly desirable that it should not be exposed to rain now.

Dr. Carter was inclined today to concur with the idea of Dr. C. W. Gilmore of Smithsonian Institute that this would not turn out to be a creature entirely unknown. However, Dr. Carter felt that it was sufficiently rare to be of interest, no matter what its ultimate identity may prove to be.

Sea Serpent Snap Shots

Bodies of Mrs. Wilson and Baby Are Washed Up On Lake Shore

Woman Left Note Saying Her Husband Had Died From Rat Poison and That She Could Not Stand Gossip So Was Ending it All

PORT HOPE, Ont., Nov. 24: (CP)—The bodies of Mrs. Donald H. Wilson, thirty-four year old widow of Donald Wilson, editor and publisher of the Port Hope Guide, and her twenty-one months old baby were found washed up on the shore of Lake Ontario today ten miles west of here. The woman left home last night after writing a note addressed to her mother and father reading: "I know that Don got hold of some rat poison. I am taking baby with me. Gossip in this town has killed me and there is nothing for either of us to live for. Please bury me in Daddy's plot."

Donald Wilson died three weeks ago from an acute stomach disorder and was found subsequently to have taken a large enough quantity of arsenic to kill ten men. Police had since questioned Mrs. Wilson and her mother but no report was published of any disclosures.

Officials of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station are desirous of contacting this person as he would be able to give them invaluable assistance, it is thought, in the matter of identification.

WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Salmon Pack This Year Larger—Sea Serpent Centre Of All Interest—American Halibut Landings

British Columbia's output of canned salmon this year will be the biggest since 1930, which was the year of record production. The pack up to the end of the first week of October totalled 1,242,000 cases, as shown by reports received by the Dominion Department of Fisheries from its British Columbia office, and that quantity far exceeded the total production in the full year

1931, topped the 1932 total by more than 160,000 cases, and was only some 23,000 cases below the 1933 aggregate. Canning operations for 1934 have now passed their height but a substantial quantity of salmon will be packed in waters lower on the B. C. coast—a sufficient quantity to lift the total for the year well above the 1933 figure. The production subsequent to October 7 last year amounted to 155,000 cases, and this year's output in the corresponding period will be greater than that. As already stated, the 1930 pack in British Columbia was a record-making "high," 2,221,783 cases, and this year's total will not approach that figure. The outlook is, however, that the production will not only be the biggest since 1930 but that it will exceed the pack of approximately 1,400,000 cases put up in 1929. A noteworthy feature of operations in the 1934 period ending with October 6 was an increase of more than 113,600 cases in the pack of sockeye, the most valuable species of Pacific salmon, as compared with the production in the like period of 1933. Except in Rivers and Smith's Inlets, the output increased in almost all the sockeye canning areas. The pack from sockeye taken in the Fraser River district showed a gain of substantially more than 100 percent—132,000 cases, in round figures, as compared with 52,900 a year ago—and on the Naas River and the Skeena River the percentages of increase were greater. Dropping the odd figures, the output of canned pinkies up to October 6 totalled 435,300 cases, of chums, 206,300 cases, of cohoes, 175,600, of bluebacks 29,000, of springs 24,600, and of steelheads 1,100. Pink production was less than at a like date in 1933 and so was the pack of steelheads, but there were increased outputs of the other species.

They do say there is nothing new under the sun but it looks like our sea serpent is something that has seldom, if ever, been seen before.
