THE B. C. BUDGET

The feature of the 1934 British Columbia budget introduced by Hon. John Hart yesterday was the announcement that the government would ask for authority to refund the B. C. debt at a rate to be set, probably from three to three and a half percent. This is following out the hustings promises of Premier Pattullo. It is in line with action proposed to be taken by other western provinces and also by the Dominion. If it goes through it will lift a tremendous load from the taxpayers and be the first step toward making the province solvent.

It was inevitable that the budget could not be a balanced one. The disparity between income and expenditure has been so great that the difference could not be made up in one year. It is possible that before the end of the fiscal year recovery will have been sufficient to almost wipe out the deficit.

TAXATION LIGHTENED

No new taxes have been imposed under the budget scheme but instead of that there has been a lightening of taxes on some people who are least able to pay. A married man has \$1,000 exemption, \$400 of which is for being a married man. Single men are given exemption up to \$600. That eliminates the one percent tax on men and women earning less than \$50 a month. This is a considerable reduction for those who need it badly.
