CONDITIONS IN CHINA ARE CHAOTIC SITUATION IN RUSSIA IS TENSE AS TERRORISTS ARE TRIED

Communist Bandits On March; Missionaries Escape With Hardship

Authorities Endeavoring to Check Onslaught of Brigand Armies—Two Babies Born as Church Envoys Hesitate After Evacuating Changten

CHANGSA, Hunan Province, Dec. 28: (CP)—A group of fugitive missionaries which arrived here from the bandit-infested regions today revealed chaotic conditions as a result of the activities of brigand armies. Chinese authorities, endeavoring to stop the communist march, ordered all missionaries to move to safety when gunfire opened on the city of Changten. So hurriedly were the missionaries moved, it was necessary to stop at a small village where two babies were born—one a girl to Mrs. Nellie Loomis Graham of Carbondale Penn., and the other a son to Mrs. W. N. Wagner of Waterford, Conn. Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Caswell of Vancouver were also in the party.

COASTWISE SHIP BURNS

Steamer Ontario Beached by Coast-guard in Boston Harbor—Members of Crew Injured

BOSTON, Dec. 28:—After having been virtually destroyed by flames, the coastwise steamer Ontario was beached in Boston Harbor by coast-guard vessels which took her in tow. No lives were lost although several members of the crew were burned before they could be removed from the blazing ship.

KILLED IN EXPLOSION

Thirteen Coal Miners Lose Lives in West Virginia When Locomotive Blows Up

MONTGOMERY, W. Va., Dec. 28: (CP)—Thirteen coal miners were killed and at least forty-three were injured yesterday in an explosion of the boiler of a locomotive drawing a train loaded with three hundred men enroute to work at McDunn. Pieces of the wreckage were blown as far distant as 169 yards.

DESCENDENT OF ROYALTY

Forbears of British Lord Privy Seal Were Kings of Sweden

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 28:—Capt. Anthony Eden, Lord Privy Seal of England, who has been a prominent figure in international affairs of late, is a descendent of Swedish royalty, it has been revealed here. A family tree has been sent to him showing how he descended from the Norse kings of not so many centuries ago.

IS NAMED CHAIRMAN

Lord MacMillan to Head British Royal Commission Investigating Arms Manufacturers

LONDON, Dec. 28:—Lord Macmillan, who was chairman of the royal commission which made a survey of the Canadian banking situation a couple of years ago as a result of which the Central Bank of Canada was organized, has been appointed chairman of the royal commission which will investigate the activities of British munitions manufacturers.

President Lebrun Entertains Best Behaved Children

PARIS, Dec. 28: (CP)—President and Madame Albert Lebrun personally entertained the two hundred best-behaved school children in France at the official residence. Each child received a Christmas gift.

INSURANCE OF HEALTH

Manitoba to be First Province in Canada to Make Experiment; Woodnorth Chosen

WINNIPEG, Dec. 28:—Manitoba will be the first province in Canada to make an experiment with state health insurance. The municipality of Woodnorth, with a population of 2,000 persons, has been selected for a two-year trial. The government will provide three doctors, three nurses and a hospital and the people of Woodnorth will be asked to accept a tax on property to cover free medical and hospital service, single persons to pay a poll tax. If the experiment at Woodnorth proves successful, the service will be extended.

New York Stock Mart is Active

Day's Transactions Over Million Shares—Utilities Drive Forces Most All Issues Down

NEW YORK, Dec. 28:—Stock trading was fairly active on the New York Exchange although a liquidation drive against utilities caused an offish tendency in most all issues. The day's transactions totalled 1,050,000 shares with closing averages as follows: industrials, 100.35, off 3/4; rails, 35.30, off 27/32; utilities, 16.33, off 45; and bonds, 95.09, off .05.

GOVERNMENT MAY ASSIST RAILWAYS TO GET EQUIPMENT

OTTAWA, Dec. 28: (CP)—A plan by which the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways would be assisted in financing an equipment order of upwards of \$30,000,000 is known to be under consideration by the Dominion government and a decision is expected momentarily.

Two Thousand Soldiers On Guard In Leningrad While Court In Session

Leonid Nicolaieff Shouts Defiance Before Military Tribunal—Declares He Freed Country of Low Down Scoundrel and Others Will Finish Work

LONDON, Dec. 28: (CP)—Reports reaching the Daily Express today said that two thousand soldiers were guarding the military court in Leningrad where fourteen alleged terrorists were on trial for their lives. The men, including Leonid Nicolaieff, are accused of the assassination of Sergei Kiroff, lieutenant and confidante of Dictator Joseph Stalin. They were shackled at the ankles and wrists when herded into the courtroom. Nicolaieff is reported to have shouted defiance at the court when the trial opened, asserting: "I freed Russia from a low down scoundrel. Others will finish my work."

Another Border Dispute Before Nations League

GENEVA, Dec. 28:—Persia has agreed to meet the council of the League of Nations on January 14 with a view to settling the Persia-Iraq border dispute. Iraq this week laid a formal protest before the League at the over-running of the Persians into Iraq.

GOVERN HEALERS

Chiropractic Regulations for British Columbia Announced—Advertising Forbidden

VICTORIA, Dec. 28: (CP)—Chiropractors in British Columbia will not be allowed to advertise under regulations of the provincial chiropractic board which was gazetted yesterday. Registration fees of \$250, examination fees of \$300 and annual membership fees of \$75 are the levies set. Examinations under a special examining board are to be held on the second Fridays of April and October each year. Unsuccessful candidates will have their fees returned.

WAREHOUSES OVERFLOWN

No Market For Chinese Silk Owing To Increased Use of Rayon and Cotton

SHANGHAI, Dec. 28:—Silk warehouses here are becoming over-loaded with silk for which there is no market. The increased use of rayon and cotton in foreign countries which have always been heavy importers of silk is responsible for the situation.

London Demand Forces Price Of Silver Up

NEW YORK, Dec. 28: (CP)—Bar silver closed at 53 1/2c on the local metal market yesterday, up 3/4c from Monday. Today's price was 54c strength in London attributed to heavy speculative buying there forcing the market up.

CASE IS FAILING

Martin Insull Acquitted on Embezzlement Charges—Deportation May be Sought

CHICAGO, Dec. 28:—Martin Insull may escape trial on further charges of embezzlement in connection with the collapse of the utilities enterprises of himself and his elder brother, Samuel, but it is likely that the authorities will take steps to have him deported as an undesirable alien. Martin Insull was acquitted by a jury after twelve hours' deliberation on charges of embezzling \$340,000. Similar charges involving \$104,000 still stand against him but it is expected these will be dropped now. The federal government is also considering the dropping of further charges against Samuel Insull following his acquittal at his first trial recently.

Joseph Burns Back in Pen

All But Two of Ten Fugitives Whom Dillinger Led Now Are Accounted For

MICHIGAN CITY, Indiana, Dec. 28:—Joseph Burns, eighth of the ten prisoners who were released by the late John Dillinger from the Indiana State Penitentiary here some months ago, is back in the institution to resume serving of a natural life sentence. All but two of the ten fugitives have either been recaptured or are dead.

Kingfish Fears Assassination

Louisiana Senator on His Way From Baton Rouge to Washington Has Big Bodyguard

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28:—Surrounded by a bodyguard owing to threats of assassination which are said to have been made against him lately, Senator Huey Long arrived here from Baton Rouge to attend the session of Congress.

Dictatorships Breed Plots

The trouble in Russia in which one of the leading statesmen of the country lost his life reminds us that dictatorships always tend to breed plots. They tend to encourage people to show their opposition in underhand criminal manner. There is no other way of getting control of the policy of the country except by killing those in control.

In a democracy no such drastic action is necessary. All that a person or group of persons has to do in order to bring about a change of policy is to persuade the people of the country that it is right and in their best interests and they will vote for it. Everyone has an opportunity to demonstrate his political talents if he wishes. There is no need for drastic action and such action is always futile.

Under a democracy we may not always get the best results in government but we train people in self-restraint and teach them to take a lively interest in governmental affairs. When we watch the manner in which the various systems work out in Europe, it makes us better than ever satisfied with our own system. It is cumbersome and anything but economical but it can be modified and improved. Until several other countries demonstrate that they have something better and show its workings over a period of years, we shall scarcely wish to imitate it.

Should Be Standardized

A friend of this paper makes a suggestion which we pass on for what it is worth. He says that in visiting around among his friends at Christmas he found that the cocktails he drank were much too varied. Some of them were made with a base of rum, some with gin, some with whiskey and many mixed them with various fruit juices which he found neither pleasant to the taste or beneficial to the health. He suggests that a general formula be followed so that visitors may not be taking chances as they do now.

Possibly under these difficult circumstances it may be wise to appoint Mr. Millar chief cocktail supervisor in order that such connoisseurs as our friend may be protected. The alternative would be to form a new organization to be known as the Uniform Cocktail Society that would undertake to bring about reforms in this direction.

We strongly suspect our friend of having extreme radical tendencies in introducing such a leftist movement into city politics.

WAS GREAT EXPLORER

Capt. J. E. Bernier, Now Dead, Did Much Work For Canada In North

LEVIS, Que., Dec. 28. (CP)—Captain Joseph Elgear Bernier, celebrated French-Canadian Arctic explorer, who died here on Wednesday night, would have been eighty-three years of age on New Year's day.

Capt. Bernier for years conducted Arctic exploratory work for the Canadian government, reaching many remote points seldom if ever visited by white men. One of the ambitions of his life was to visit the North Pole but he never achieved this desire.

Much of the work of claiming Arctic regions for Canada fell to Captain Bernier. The Captain, in his capacity as explorer for the department of interior, Ottawa, made 12 trips to the Arctic Islands, during which he planted the Canadian flag on many of them. The Captain, in the course of 60 years as a seafaring man, covered nearly 500,000 miles in his trips and during this time was master of 107 ships. In between his trips to the Arctic Captain Bernier did much to familiarize people of Canada with its frozen north by lecture tours. The Captain in most of the journeys north used the Canadian government steamship Arctic. In 1924 the first experiments with short wave radio equipment were made on Captain Bernier's ship.

Captain Bernier was particularly proud of the fact that on one of his northern cruises a cross was planted under his supervision on a mountain top on Melville Island. This is the farthest north spot in the world where there exists such a monument. It is a landmark for a great distance, and it is solidly planted, for the base rests in an accumulation of stones six feet deep. Every one of these stones had to be carried up the mountain side in a sack, one at a time. The arduous labor occupied the crew of the exploring vessel many days, but they were a untried and happy lot when the cross was finally raised with imposing ceremonies and consecrated by a French-Canadian missionary to the Eskimos.

The navigator was born at Levis, Que., on January 1, 1852, and was the son of a sea captain, Thomas Bernier. He got his first command of a vessel at the age of 17 and made many trips in charge of a schooner when still a youth. He established a record for the round trip in a sailing ship from Canada to England which stood for many years. Temporarily retiring from the sea Captain Bernier accepted the governorship of Quebec jail for four years, but could not resist the lure of the ocean and resigned this position.

He was a member of the Royal Colonial Canadian Institute, London, and the Quebec Geographical Society. He was twice married, both of his wives predeceasing him, as did his only son. When on shore the Captain resided in Levis, across the river from Quebec, where he was dock master for some years.

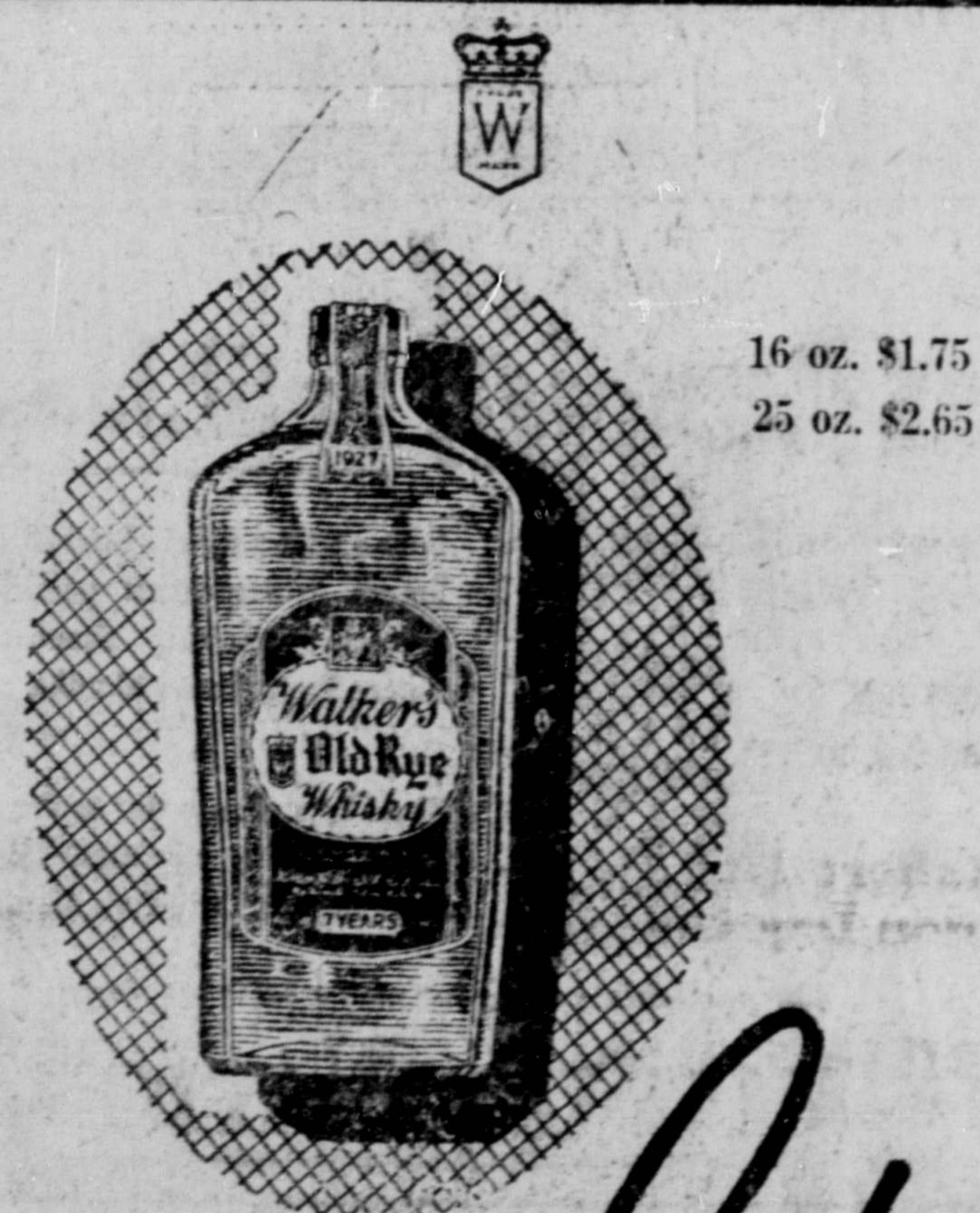

The long-winded correspondent has no place in modern journalism. Every letter must be signed by the writer, not necessarily for publication but as a matter of good faith and courtesy. All unsigned documents go to the waste paper basket. Letters of a caustic character must have the signature appended for publication. Letter should be written on one side of the paper only. Correspondents must avoid personalities and the language should be such as would be allowed in the ordinary rules of debate.

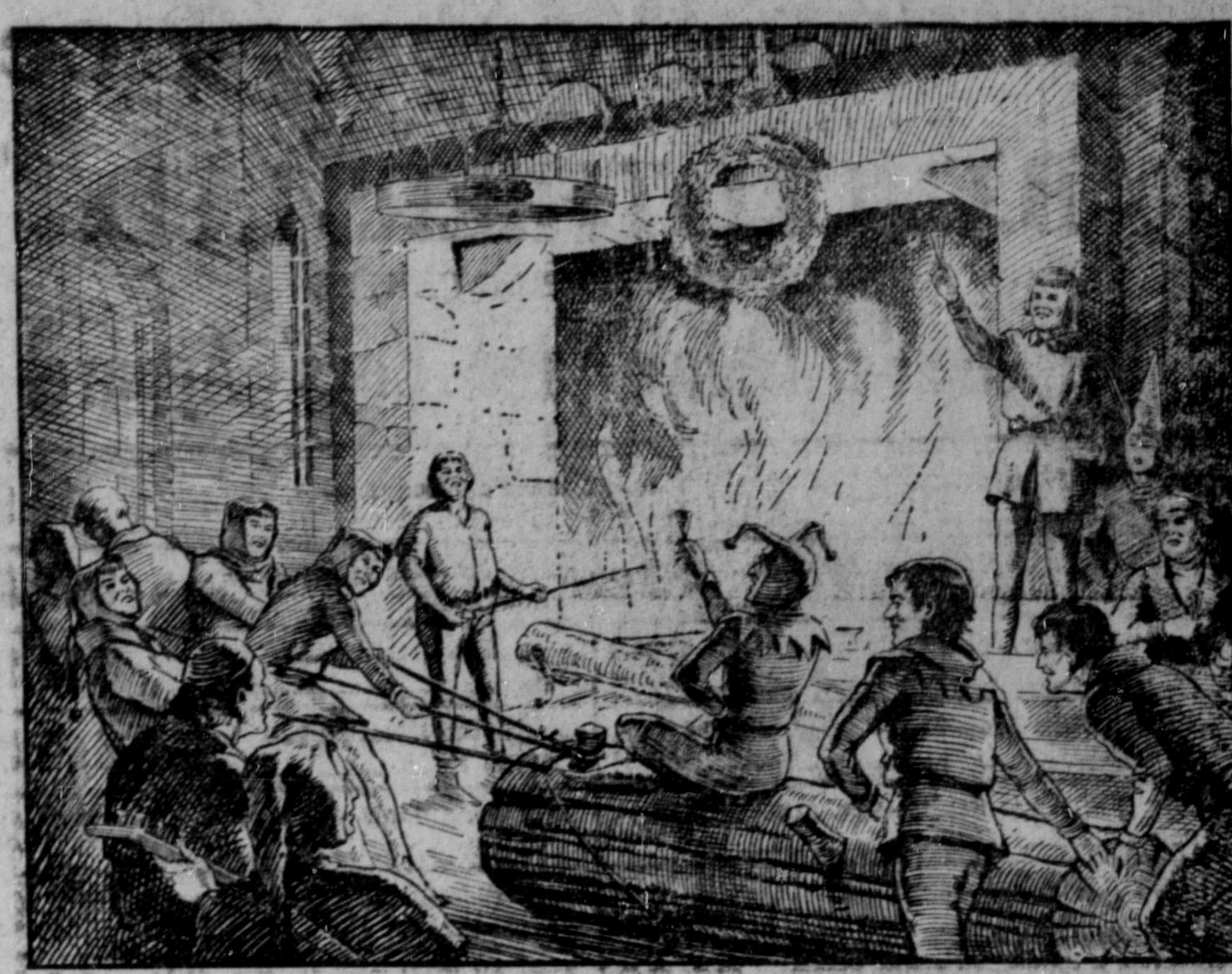
ST. PETER'S XMAS TREE
