In a convention at Duluth in 1912, Winnipeg, Canada, and London, England, were represented and it was decided to make the organization international.

Today, the Dean said, there were 3,596 clubs in the world and it was interesting to note that of all the clubs formed 98% are in existence today. Only 2% had handed back their charters. The membership to-

day was practically 160,000. In drawing attention to the ideals of the organization, Dean Gibson showed that they all revolved around the word service. There was service by the members in their businesses and professions, service to the community, to the country and finally service to the world by bringing influence to bear in the cause of international peace.

In 1921 the Rotary Club was formed in Prince Rupert and the Dean said he felt sure the ideals of business life today were higher than they were at that time, whether from the influence of Rotary or not. 

WORK, WAGES AND THE NORTH

Under the heading "Work, Wages and the North," the Financial News of Vancouver strongly advocated the extension of the Bear River road at Stewart into Maziadin Lake, the same to be done as a needed public work and also to provide work for the unemployed of Stewart and Prince Rupert. It is pointed out that the road would open up a valuable mining country.

Other interests would have the road past the Premier Mine opened up in order to give access to mining properties already partly developed.

Prince Rupert wants work done on the highway which would give them access to the vast interior. In every direction there is work to be done and men to do it. Each district has its pet scheme but the whole country between Prince Rupert and Jasper is a unit in demanding the completion of the northern highway which would connect Prince Rupert with Edmonton.

We are heartily in accord with the idea of continuation of the Bear River Road from Stewart. It is a worthy project and, doubtless, will receive attention. We urge the people of that town to keep after it until it is completed. If there had been as much interest taken in road building in Prince Rupert, especially during the past few years, as Stewart is taking today in trying to get that Bear River Road, we might have had a great deal more work done out beyond Cloyah Bay.




