Nearly 400 Airplanes Actively Engaged in Manoeuvres Around London

LONDON, July 27: (CP)-Concerned largely with problems of home defence, with London itself supposed to be the main centre of attack, nearly 400 army airplanes are engaged in mimic air war in the annual exercises of the Royal Air Force.

Organization of ground defence is receiving special attention. Large numbers of searchlights and sound locating instruments are employed. and the network of observers to the east, south and southeast of the metropolis are being thoroughly

veritable maelstrom which had had its immediate source in the Serajevo murders were drawn Germany,

France, Russia, Great Britain and, within a few days, Belgium. Europe became afflicted with a delirium of war fever. Feverishly pleading to all con-

cerned that they halt their preparations for war, Sir Edward Grey, British foreign secretary, sought in vain to effect a conference of the prospective combatants. Counsels of peace went unheeded. The smouldering hatreds and jealousies which had been but indifferently concealed for generations past flared out. The match cast into the European powder magazine a month previously had done its work. The volcano outburst which had its culmination on August could not be controlled.
