LABOR NOW IN CONTROL IN LONDON

STATE AID TO MINING INDUSTRY IS URGED AT VICTORIA

Workers Ascendant On Metropolitan Council-First Time in History

Conservatives, Who Have Held Majority For Twenty-Seven Years, Win But 55 of 124 Seats While Liberals are Completely Wiped Out

LONDON, March 9: (CP)-For the first time in history Labor controls the government of the entire London metropolitan district, complete returns from Thursday's All Prisoners Are council elections giving Labor sixty-four members or a majority of four in the council which totals 124 members. Conservatives, who held a majority for twenty-seven years, elected 55 members while the Liberals were completely wiped out.






