## McGEER PLAN FOR WORK AND WAGES BENNETT DOUBTS PRACTICABILITY OF BOND CONVERSION

### Consent of Holders Or Repudiation by Gov.'t Are Only Alternatives

Wartime Tax-Free Bonds Must be Redeemed and Canadian National Deficits Ended, Prime Minister Tells Parliament

OTTAWA, March 20: (CP)—Two factors stand in the way of a general conversion of Dominion bonds—the wartime tax-free bonds must be redeemed and the \$1,250,000 a week deficits of the Canadian National Railways must cease—Prime Minister R. B. Bennett told the House of Commons last night. He declared that it would be national suicide for Canada, a young country awaiting development, to repudiate or default on its bonded indebtedness.

"To consolidate debts of the provinces," the Premier said, "would mean that consent would have to be obtained of those holding these securities, people living in London, practically all the states of the American Union and other parts of the world or the repudiation by the provinces of their obligations. Can we contemplate the latter alternative? Can we force the former?" Premier Bennett was replying to a series of Progressive and Liberal speeches demanding a scaling down in debts—municipal, provincial, federal and private.

### PASSING OF QUEEN

Beloved Emma, Former Sovereign Of Holland, Died This Morning Following Bronchial Illness

Was 75 Years Old

Sweetness and Sympathy Ever Endured Her to Hearts of All Dutch People

THE HAGUE, March 20: (CP)—Dowager Queen Emma of Holland, mother of Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands, died early today after a protracted illness with bronchitis. She was seventy-five years of age.

Few dowager queens were so beloved by their people as was Queen Emma.

From the day in January, 1879, when, as the young Princess of Waldeck and Piedmont, she went to Holland to share the throne with King William III, her sweetness and sympathy endeared her to all Dutch hearts.

The daughter of Prince George Waldeck, she was born August 2, 1858. She was only 20 years old when she became the second wife of the Dutch monarch, but her simplicity and kindly homeliness enabled her to meet her responsibilities tactfully. She always was able to hold the unflinching sympathy of all parties within the kingdom, a sympathy which amounted almost to adoration.

The success of Queen Emma's regency after the death of William III in 1890, until her daughter came of age and ascended the throne in 1898, was universally recognized. She proved one of the most popular sovereigns in Europe.

After Wilhelmina's accession, the Queen Mother retired to the background of the regal stage, but her devoted subjects never forgot her and lost no opportunity of showing her that she still held their loyalty and deep affection.

As an evidence of the regard which she commanded throughout Europe, participants in the 1928 Olympic Games, then being held at Amsterdam, joined in the celebration of Queen Emma's birthday. One hundred and fifty countries were represented in this magnificent spectacle.

Queen Emma was closely related to the English Royal Family. Her sister was the late Duchess of Albany, and her niece, Princess Alice, with the Earl of Athlone and Lady May Cambridge often visited her.

### British Hunger Marchers Converge On London



A contingent of men and women hunger marching from Wales and the west of England, shown passing through Reading en route to London, where a huge mass meeting, planned for one Sunday, fell through because of the inclement weather. The marchers congregated in the city, however, won a victory in the House of Commons. The House, overriding the action of Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald, voted to receive at the bar of the House, a petition from the army. MacDonald had previously refused to consider the petition, because of "Communist purpose" of the march.

### Scheme of Liberal Member Is Approved; Opposes Ottawa Bank

Urges Definite Scheme of Effective Co-operation Between Provinces and Ottawa With New Banking System To Provide Public Credit

VICTORIA, March 20: (CP)—G. G. McGeer, Liberal member for Vancouver-Burrard, yesterday asked the public accounts committee of the Legislature to approve a "definite scheme of effective co-operation between the national and provincial governments and the proposed national banking system" for the purpose of using the public credit as a purchasing power and medium of exchange necessary in the expense of maintaining a broad program of constructive wage distributing public enterprise.

The public accounts committee today endorsed Mr. McGeer's resolution which opposes the Bank of Canada Act at Ottawa in addition to calling for a system of national credit control to stimulate purchasing power.

Copies of the resolution it is proposed to have forwarded to all members of the House of Commons and all members of the various provincial legislatures and local governments after the House passes it. Newspaper's Suggestion The Victoria Times urges the Pattullo government to send Mr. McGeer to Ottawa to present British Columbia's views before the banking and currency committee in connection with the proposed establishment of a central bank in Canada.

### ROOSEVELT IS SILENT

Has No Comment to Make on Dies Bill But Would, No Doubt, Veto It

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 20: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt expressed indifference yesterday in regard to the Dies silver bill following its passage by the House of Representatives over the chief executive's objection by a vote of 257 to 112 or eleven votes more than the required two-thirds. Undoubtedly the bill will be vetoed by the president should it pass the Senate which is doubtful.

The bill would provide for the acceptance by the United States of silver from Canada or other foreign countries at a premium of twenty-five percent above the world market price in exchange for agricultural commodities in which a surplus exists. The metal thus received would be used as backing for new silver securities, thus having an important effect upon the currency of the country.

### Is Acquitted Of Manslaughter But May Lose Licence

VANCOUVER, March 20:—Edward J. Coyle has been found not guilty by a Supreme Court jury on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the death of Mrs. Illegworth as a result of being struck by an automobile driven by Coyle. The jury recommended, however, that Coyle be not permitted to drive an automobile for five years.

### Cariboo Highway Is Opened Again

Had Been Closed Down While Repairs Were Being Made to Boston Bar Bridge

VANCOUVER, March 20:—The Cariboo Highway was re-opened for traffic at the end of the week after having been closed for a few days while repairs were being made to the bridge at Boston Bar which had been damaged by high water recently.

### 'Jake the Barber' Wanted in London

Extradition Proceedings in Chicago Are Being Delayed For Twenty-Four Hours

CHICAGO, March 20:—Twenty-four hour delay was granted yesterday in the proceedings which have been instituted by the British authorities for the extradition to London of John Factor (Jake the Barber) who is wanted there for questioning and possible prosecution in connection with his financial operations in that country some years ago.

### HELPING OF INDUSTRIES

President Roosevelt Announces Plan for Twelve Intermediate Credit Banks

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 20:—President Franklin D. Roosevelt yesterday announced his intention of setting up twelve intermediate credit banks in various parts of the United States for the purpose of making capital available for smaller industries particularly.

### EMPLOYERS SPLIT NOW

Automobile Manufacturers Divide On Whether or Not to Recognize Workers' Unions

### Parley Continues

Efforts Being Made to Avert Serious Industrial Tie-Up Starting Tomorrow

NEW YORK, March 20:—Automobile manufacturers of the United States are now divided among themselves in regard to the recognition of motor workers' unions, it became known last night. The independent companies are disposed now to compromise while the larger companies such as Chrysler and General Motors continue resolutely their stand against recognition.

Thirteen automobile manufacturing executives were in secret conference here all day yesterday with General Hugh S. Johnson, director of the National Industrial Recovery Act, and the parley continued into the night in the hope of averting the strike, potentially affecting 250,000 workers, which the American Federation of Labor has threatened to precipitate tomorrow unless the principle of collective bargaining provided for in the N. R. A. code is adhered to. The conference was resumed today. Conferences between employers and employees are also in progress at Detroit.

General Johnson warned the manufacturers yesterday that further dilly-dallying would probably result in the greatest tie-up in the (Continued on Page Four)

### PATTULLO IS HEARD

Premier Speaking in Legislature Today on Special Powers Act—Uphill Funny

VICTORIA, March 20: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo reserved until this afternoon the speech it was expected he would have made in the Legislature yesterday in regard to the Special Powers Act. Instead the House went through the amended Minimum Wage and Moratorium Acts, changes in which were adopted in their original form despite efforts of the Opposition to make certain alterations.

Tom Uphill, the popular Labor member for Fernie, contributed some characteristic levity to the proceedings yesterday. "Gerry McGeer is my new spiritual adviser," he informed the House. "I was an honest coal miner before I lost my innocence and became a statesman" was another remark which provoked smiles in all quarters.

### Completed Taking Out Bodies of Men Lost in Navy Boat

SASEBO, Japan, March 20:—Operations of removing bodies of victims from the upturned hull of the new Japanese torpedo boat Tomozuru which is in dry dock here following its capsizing last week have been completed. Thirteen members of the crew were rescued alive, 89 bodies having been taken out of the hull.

### LOGGING CAMPS IN COMOX VALLEY ARE OPENING UP AGAIN

COURTENAY, Vancouver Island, March 20:—All logging camps in the Comox Valley re-opened today following a vote of loggers yesterday at a mass meeting where it was decided by 210 to 132 in favor of returning to work. Before the vote was taken, it was agreed that all would abide by the decision of the majority.

### Well Known Flyer Killed in Testing

LONDON, March 20: (CP)—Capt. F. G. M. Sparks, one of Canada's best known aviators, was killed when an airplane he was testing crashed from an altitude of 400 feet.

### Heavy Toll is Taken By Cyclones Last Week in Queensland

BRISBANE, Australia, March 20:—Belated reports received here tell of further casualties and damage caused by cyclonic windstorms which swept the north coast of Queensland the latter part of last week, causing the deaths of at least seventy-five persons, taking a heavy toll of shipping and fishing craft, high demolishing whole towns and causing damage estimated at \$2,500,000. The dead were practically all natives.

### Vancouver People Injured in Crash

Were Returning From Portland Dog Show—One Canine Killed, Another Missing

PORTLAND, Ore., March 20:—Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Rothwell and Miss Helen Robertson of Vancouver, B.C., returning home after attending a dog show here, sustained injuries which are not regarded as serious in an automobile crash on the highway not far from here. One prize dog they had in the car with them was killed while another disappeared.

### Northwest Indians To Make Mukluks For Pole Expedition

LONDON, March 20:—Indians of Fort Rae in the Northwest Territories of Canada have been given an order to make thirty-six pairs of mukluks to be used on a British South Polar expedition which will be undertaken later in the year.

### HUDSON BAY ROUTE

Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion, minister of railways in the Bennett government, says that, so far, the government has invested \$53,000,000 in the Hudson Bay route. The interest charges are two and a half million dollars annually and there has been a deficit on operation of the railway and port each year so far. However, he expects an improvement in business over the route this year. It was already announced that a number of ships were planning to enter Hudson Bay for cargo during the coming open season, August 8 to October 8.

For several years the government has taken active steps to encourage shipping by the Hudson Bay route but this year no chartering was being done by it.

A suggestion might be made to the federal government that it also take a slight interest in the port of Prince Rupert but that, evidently, would be expecting too much.

### EACH DO A LITTLE

While it may seem a little early to talk about gardening, it is noticeable that a great many people have already started and some have turned over the soil from end to end of their gardens already. But it is not that we wish to talk about particularly. Last year we strongly urged each one to do something to improve the appearance of the city. We renew the suggestion this year. If each does something, if only the planting of a window box, the city will steadily improve in appearance from year to year. Its possibilities are tremendous.

Recently James Grant, the markets commissioner, was in the city. He is a gardener and shows his ability by cultivating a beautiful little place a few miles out of Victoria. On it he has a rock garden which adds much to its attractiveness. While in Prince Rupert he remarked on the wonderful opportunities here for beautification. The city is laid out in such a way that it could easily be the prettiest city in Canada. Everything depends upon the people. If they all take part and do a little the work will develop until Mr. Grant's suggestion might become an accomplished fact.

Goddess of Chance Rules With Sweepstake Drawing—Horses For 32 Canadians

DUBLIN, March 20: (CP)—The Goddess of Chance ruled again today with the distribution of the world over of tickets which may be worth anything from \$500 to \$150,000 depending upon the outcome of the Grand National Steeplechase to be run on Friday at the Aintree Course at Liverpool.

More than \$15,000,000 has been subscribed to the Irish Hospitals Sweepstakes from which \$9,000,000 has been made available for prizes.

Fifty-four horses figure in the draw although the entry list has been reduced to under forty.

Thirty-two Canadians drew horses, twenty-one being probable starters.

The draw for eight hundred consolation prizes of \$500 each and for ten residue prizes of \$33,000 each will be made tomorrow.

## SPORT CHAT

The National Hockey League schedule for the 1933-34 season was completed at the end of the week and the play-offs, first for the league championship and then for the Stanley Cup, emblematic of the world's professional hockey championship, will soon be in progress. As usual, considerable interest is being displayed in Prince Rupert as to the outcome. While the Toronto Maple Leafs and Detroit Red Wings had long since cinched first place honors in the International and American Divisions respectively, the race for second place positions in either division was in doubt right up to the end of the schedule.

In the International Division the Montreal Maroons were able to secure second place by playing a draw with the Ottawa Senators at the week-end, finishing with a scant point to the good over the Canadiens who won over Detroit Red Wings. The New York Americans were left well down in fourth place while the Ottawa Senators had no competition for the cellar.

In the American Division the Chicago Black Hawks last Thursday, by a victory over the Toronto Maple Leafs, displaced the New York Rangers from second place and retained the position by winning over Toronto on Sunday after the Rangers lost to the Maple Leafs on Saturday. The New Yorkers thus failing to rise again out of third place. Boston Bruins finished the season far behind in the cellar and out of the play-off picture.

## Finest Tobacco in World Grown At Sumas on Reclaimed Lake Area

When the veterans were returning from the war and the Oliver government was looking about for some way to employ them which would at the same time possibly provide homes for many of them, work was started on the reclaiming of Sumas Lake lands. Much money was expended on the project and, during the election that followed,

Oliver and his cabinet were severely criticized for their prodigality. It was claimed that the Sumas area was of little value and that the work had proven much too costly.

Today the Sumas reclaimed area is the finest tobacco growing area in the world. Canadian Tobacco Ltd. have there one of the largest and probably the finest tobacco plantations on the face of the globe. Not only is the tobacco grown there but also there are 24 curing kilns and other buildings making up a complete tobacco factory, employing during the busy season 250 men and women. Last season 400 acres were planted to tobacco. This year he acreage has been increased and it is planned soon to increase to 1,000 acres.


The total area of reclaimed land in the Sumas area is about ten thousand acres and, as a result of the success of the tobacco growing, it is probable the whole of this will soon be utilized.

The tobacco firm is owned and controlled by British Columbia interests and just now an intensive campaign is being carried out to get British Columbia people to use their own "weed" instead of sending east for their smoking material.



The local lighthouse tender Newington, Capt Harry Ormiston, which went down the coast a week ago Sunday morning to conduct a search for Dan MacDonald and Jimmy Flewin, who are conceded now to have lost their lives by drowning from Egg Island lighthouse in Queen Charlotte Sound, is expected to return to her base at Digby Island this week. Following the fruitless search for the two men, the vessel has been engaged in servicing various lighthouses in the downcoast area and on Saturday night was at Namu cannery after having visited Adenbrooke Island and other lights.

Negotiations, which were reported some time ago in these columns to be in progress, have been completed for the purchase by the Canadian Fishing Co. of the Chatham Sound Fishing & Packing Co.'s salmon cannery at Humpback Bay, Porcher Island. 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
