Tearfully mourning their losses, widows and relatives of the victims are pictured huddled near the pit-head of the Kakanj coal mine at Palkani, Yugoslavia, wai ing for the recovery of the bodies of their men folk who were killed in a disastrous explosion in the mine. Of the 450 men in the mine when the explosion occurred, more than 350 perished leaving nearly every family in the little mining village touched with tragedy.

New Monetary Ratio of Gold and White Metal Currency Advocated

Payments For Present Silver Holdings in United States Would be Limited to Fifty Cents Per Ounce-**International Co-operation Sought**

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 22: (CP) - President Franklin D. Roosevelt recommended to Congress today that it declare an American policy "to increase the amount of silver in our monetary stocks with the ultimate objective of having and maintaining one fourth of their monetary value in silver and three fourths in gold." This policy would be mandatory.



To Cost Less After June 1 to Ship Autos on Steamers Between Here and Vancouver

The Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, which has been for some time advocating a reduction in rates on automobiles between Prince Rupert and Vancouver on the steamships, has been advised by Peter Lakie, district freight value. and passenger agent for the Canadian National Railways, that, effective June 1, the following rates will be put into effect: Up to 115-inch wheelbase, \$20. From 116 to 125-inch wheelbase, \$25. Over 125-inch wheelbase, \$30. These rates will apply for used cars which have been in the possession of their owners not less than six months when accompanied by not less than two adult and putting them on a wartime tickets. The President, in fulfilment of his agreement with the silver advocates, said he should be "authorized and directed to make purchases of silver necessary to attain this ultimate objective."

Payments for present silver holdings in the United States would be limited to fifty cents per ounce and profits so made would be taxed fifty percent.
