Commissioner Tells of Work Done During First Year in Address

Making Progress of Refinancing Scheme Reducing Interest Charges to 4%

Up to June 30 of this year all the departments of the city had been kept up and some of them improved, salaries and wages had been all paid and the interest charges kept up. The only debt, outside of capital repayments and sinking funds. was a sum of about \$15,000 due the! government on social services but, at the same time, the government owed the municipality \$6,000 and there was \$10,000 in the bank so the end of June saw the city on an even keel. That was information conveyed to the members of the Rotary Club yesterday afternoon at its luncheon in the Commodore Cafe; by W. J. Alder, city commissioner. in an interesting address.

To enable the city to tackle the of providing sinking funds and making principal payments, the commissioner said he was trying to get through a plan for refunding the interest rate at four percent. He had already made considerable progress and he was hopeful he would have it ready for legislation at the next session of the legislature.

The commissioner said that, when he came here fifteen months ago. it was with no instructions except \$5.00 to put the city on its feet. He found .10 a desperate situation requiring desperate measures. No favors had 3.00 been granted and at the end of 9.00 June the city had been just one year under the system of commission government.

> In the past since 1910 it had .02 been the custom to borrow heavily part of the year. This was a very expensive system to the city costing at times nearly \$1000 a month for interest and taking a large portion of the taxes when they became due. Services Improved

During the year the fire department had been improved, good care had been taken of the city streets. telephone betterments had been made and the profit from the latter was now about ten thousand icing of the city was costing about \$10,000 a year and was proving an excellent service.
