PREMIER-B.C. SILVER MERGER IS NEAR

BENNETT MAKES GOVERNMENT POLICY ANNOUNCEMENT

Tremendous Impetus Will Be Given Portland Canal Mining If Important Deal Completed

Only Ratification of Shareholders of Two Companies Is Needed to Effect Important Amalgamation—Agreement Expected Soon

VANCOUVER, Dec. 6: (CP)—Persistent reports here state that a deal has been completed and only ratification by the shareholders of both companies remains to be given before amalgamation of the Premier Gold Mining Co. and the B. C. Silver becomes effective. Directors of the Premier Co. in Vancouver and officials of the B. C. Silver, however, state that they are unable to confirm the reports.

SIXTY-SIX EXECUTED

"Reign of Terror" Continues in Soviet Republic Following Kiroff Assassination

MOSCOW, Dec. 6: (CP)—While millions of Russians, desirous of paying final respects, were filing past the bier of Sergei Mironovich Kiroff, secretary of the central committee of the Communist party and one of the powers behind the Soviet government, who was assassinated on Saturday, a virtual "reign of terror" continued in the country. During the day sixty-six persons were executed by firing squads after conviction on charges of "preparing terrorist plots against high Soviet officials." The executions took place after summary trials at Leningrad and Moscow.

A state funeral was today accorded Kiroff.

RULING ON SAAR MADE

People May Defer Their Choice Instead of Expressing Themelves Definitely, Committee Decides

GENEVA, December 6:—The committee of the League of Nations ruled yesterday that the population of the Saar would not have to choose definitely in the plebiscite to be held next month as to whether they wished to be under Germany or France or continue as at present, under mandate of the League of Nations. They could have another plebiscite if they wished.

Newly Appointed Judge Succumbs

Theodore Lewis Dies in Madison, Wis., Just Two Weeks After Being Named to Bench

MADISON, Wis., Dec. 6:—Two weeks after he had been appointed to the State Supreme Court bench, Theodore Lewis died here yesterday of pneumonia.

Farmers of Interior Have Had Excellent Season Especially in Sale of Timothy Hay Seed

The farmers of the Bulkley and Nechaco Valleys have had one of the best seasons in history, according to several recent arrivals in Prince Rupert. While the outstanding feature of the season has been the sale of timothy seed which has been sold in a cash market and has brought the growers pretty nearly \$200,000, other crops have also done

well. Turnips and potatoes and, in fact, all root crops have been excellent in quality and quantity. Grain crops have been good and there is enough hay to carry over the winter.

Thomas McMeekin, who is the local agent for the shippers of the interior, reports that the amount

of produce handled this year was twice as great as last. This includes all kinds of farm produce including dressed meats. In addition to what is handled by the association many growers have shipped direct to local merchants and this is said to be of greater volume and of better quality than in former seasons.

Mr. McMeekin says that much more meat could be handled if they had a small refrigerator plant for chilling the meat on its arrival here. As it is, the carcasses have to be sold immediately on arrival and this cannot always be done. A great many lambs have been handled, two shipments having been received within the past few days. They are of excellent quality and have been in great demand.

Evidently, the movement inaugurated last year for local people to buy from the northern farmers and gardeners has been eminently successful. Prince Rupert is growing in favor as a market for interior produce and the producers are steadily increasing their output. Some of the shipments have been in carload lots.

NEWSPAPER PEER DIES

Lord Riddell, Publisher of News of World, Passes Away in London At Age of Sixty-Nine

WALTONHEATH, Eng., Dec. 6: (CP)—Lord Riddell, noted English newspaper publisher, author and philanthropist, who built his name and fortune from a London Sunday newspaper, the News of the World, died yesterday at the age of sixty-nine years.

NOT MUCH HOPE NOW

Worst is Feared For Capt. Charles Ulm and Companions On Pacific Flight

HONOLULU, Dec. 6: (CP)—Hope for the safety of Captain Charles T. P. Ulm, Australian trans-Pacific flier, and his two companions, George Littlejohn and Jack Skilling, unreported since they made a forced landing in the Pacific Ocean some five hundred miles west of Hawaii on Tuesday afternoon while on a flight from Oakland to Honolulu, was practically abandoned today after an intensive and continuous search by aircraft and ships carried on during the past 48 hours had failed to reveal any trace whatever of men or machine.

The search is being continued but about the only hope now is that they may have been picked up by a Japanese sampan which would not be able to report the fact until it reached port or got in touch with a radio-equipped vessel.

Pilots of a dozen United States Navy seaplanes plotted courses covering over two hundred thousand square miles of adjacent waters without locating any trace of the fliers.

BIG STORM IN ALASKA

Gales, Heavy Rains, Thunder and Lightning Accompany Record-Breaking Warm Spell

CORDOVA, Alaska, Dec. 6: (CP)—A torrential storm brought damage estimated at \$100,000 here yesterday as vagaries of weather gave southern and interior Alaska more record-breaking warm weather as well as heavy rain.

Sweeping in from the Gulf of Alaska, a 55-mile gale raged for several hours here and at Seward. An unprecedented thunder and lightning storm swept over Cook Inlet Tuesday night.

Mussolini Makes Tax Payment To British Treasury

LONDON, Dec. 6:—It was revealed by the British Exchequer yesterday that an income tax payment of \$1200 had been made to the British government by Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy on interests in this country.

Jim Skinner, Prince Rupert Man, Missing in Graham Island Woods; Search is Unavailing

MASSETT, Dec. 6: (Special to Daily News)—Finding no trace of Jim Skinner, well known Prince Rupert man, who was lost in the woods at 3:30 Sunday afternoon last while hunting on Graham Island, a search party, led by Provincial Constable Thomas D. Brunton of Massett and T. Penny, also of Prince Rupert, returned to Massett yesterday aboard the packer Ogden. Despite a close search for two days, not a single trace was found.

Skinner went into the woods near the old Langara Island village in Parry Pass, leaving Penny in charge of the boat. About an hour later Penny heard two shots and, after five minutes, heard two more. Skinner failed to return and, after hunting for him all day, Penny wired from A. J. Peve's cabin to Massett for help. A party of ten arrived the next morning but their search was unavailing.

BENEFIT BY NEIGHBOR'S LOSS

Canada is evidently benefitting by the failure of the crop in a large section of the United States last summer. The drought there resulted in total or partial failure in a number of the most productive states and animals as well as people have been fed by imported food. Seven million bushels of wheat has been shipped in there already from Canada and it is reported that twice that amount of low grade wheat is to be sent there for animal food. These shipments will relieve somewhat the congestion in Canada.

SHIP OWN LOGS DIRECT

G. W. Nickerson, who has just returned from the south where he has been trying to sell logs from this district for export to the Orient, suggests to Prince Rupert people that it will pay them to form their own organization to cut the logs and ship them direct rather than sell them through a southern agency. By doing that they will save three dollars a thousand feet which seems to be the spread between Vancouver prices and those paid by merchants in China.

Doubtless either Mr. Nickerson or some other member of the local Timbermen's Association will take the lead in this matter and try to work out a plan for local people to handle the shipments instead of going outside and paying too heavy a charge. Certainly they will receive co-operation from citizens if it is sought.

WHAT FREEDOM MEANS

The Victoria Times editorially says: "Neither in Russia, Italy nor Germany is the ordinary person permitted to stand up and say exactly what he thinks—unless he is prepared to take unpleasant consequences. Nor may he express his opinions in the press. The newspapers in all three countries, which have a combined population of about 275,000,000, are muzzled; they may publish only what their governments decree.

"This obviously is what Mr. Arthur Brisbane, columnist for the Hearst press in the United States, had in mind when he wrote the following in his syndicated column yesterday in connection with an incident which occurred in London on Wednesday: 'In London on the day before their wedding, a crowd stops the automobile of the King's son, the Duke of Kent, and his fiancée, Princess Marina. They could not move for several minutes. But the duke and princess smiled, and the crowd smiled with them, and cheered. London does not shout royalty, because British statesmanship wisely allows absolutely free speech, and encourages it. When you can say what you like, you don't shout.'

REPORT ON FARM PLAN

Chief Hanson Gets Officials to Agree On Present Requirements—Outline Given

In his campaign to get an experimental farm for the central interior of British Columbia, Chief Hanson has asked the co-operation of Don Sutherland, district agriculturalist for the provincial government, Adolph Berner of the Soldiers' Settlement Board at Telkwa and Harry Bowman, C. N. R. colonization agent at Prince George. These three officials have met and discussed the proposal and have drawn up a memorandum of what is needed which the member is forwarding to the authorities at Ottawa.

The three officials agree that there is great need for an experimental farm and that the development of agriculture will be greatly hampered if no steps are taken to provide authoritative information not only for those already settled on the land but also the use of prospective new settlers. The district is approximately 500 miles long and conditions vary considerably in the different sections.

The recommendation is made that the farm should be located at some central point where it would be of the greatest good to the greatest number. It might be in the Vanderhoof-Prince George district, the Burns Lake district or the Smithers-Telkwa district. As to size 120 acres would be ample and the cost of the land should be about \$4,800. There should be a house costing \$3,500, outbuildings including silo \$4,800, fencing \$900, machinery \$2,500, 15 head of breeding cows and purebred bull \$800, seven work horses and one stallion \$1,500, three brood sows and a boar \$200 and 300 poultry. The manager would be a man with technical training and should be a working manager and he would require two assistants.

KITKATLA REVIVAL

Church Army Officers From England Find Native People Deeply Enthusiastic

Captain Hutchinson and Capt. Stanley of England, who are touring Canada in the interests of the Church Army of the Anglican Church, are back in Prince Rupert after a week's visit at the native village of Kitkatla. At Kitkatla they were given an enthusiastic reception and had a busy time engaged in evangelical work among the natives.

On Wednesday evening last, on hearing the whistle of Charles Wilton's boat, the organization of Kitkatla were marshalled into line at the Church Army Hall. From there, led by the band, they met Captain Hutchinson and Capt. Stanley.

The young men were greeted with a hearty welcome and, with their native frontier officers, led the parade along the village streets which had been carefully surfaced with clean shells, presenting a white, broad path. They passed beneath three arches of cedar boughs, bearing inscriptions of welcome from the various organizations. An appropriate service was held in the Church Hall. Then the visitors repaired to the rectory until the village bell pealed out the summons that Chief Gumbie wished to meet his people in company with the visitors at a splendid dinner given in their honor.

"The Kitkatla Band, led by its efficient conductor, Henry Brown, gave entertainment to the happy gathering. After dinner, which had been served by pretty waitresses, had been concluded, speeches were in order. An address of welcome was read by Henry Brown, then Chief Gumbie with James Ryan as interpreter, gave the young men the direction of the village. Other addresses of interest followed. William Bentley made an effective toastmaster, at all times commanding immediate attention. His position was permanent throughout the festivities of the week and he was the liveliest address.

Thursday evening the White Cross furnished entertainment and a dinner. Mrs. Stewart Gumbie, its president, gave an address of welcome for her organization.

Friday night, the combined organizations—the Y. W. C. A. and the Y. M. C. A.—entertained in the village hall and Mrs. Arthur Hill, president of the former, and Henry Collier, president of the latter, were the chief speakers at the evening.

Saturday evening there was a sacred concert at the Army Hall. The St. Peter's Church Choir and orchestra rendered three cantatas, "The King Cometh," "The Promised Child" and "The Wanderer

It speaks well for the work of the Church Army and, in the words of the natives, the army is marshalling mighty forces in the interests of Christianity. The meetings were splendidly attended and a number gave their hearts to God.

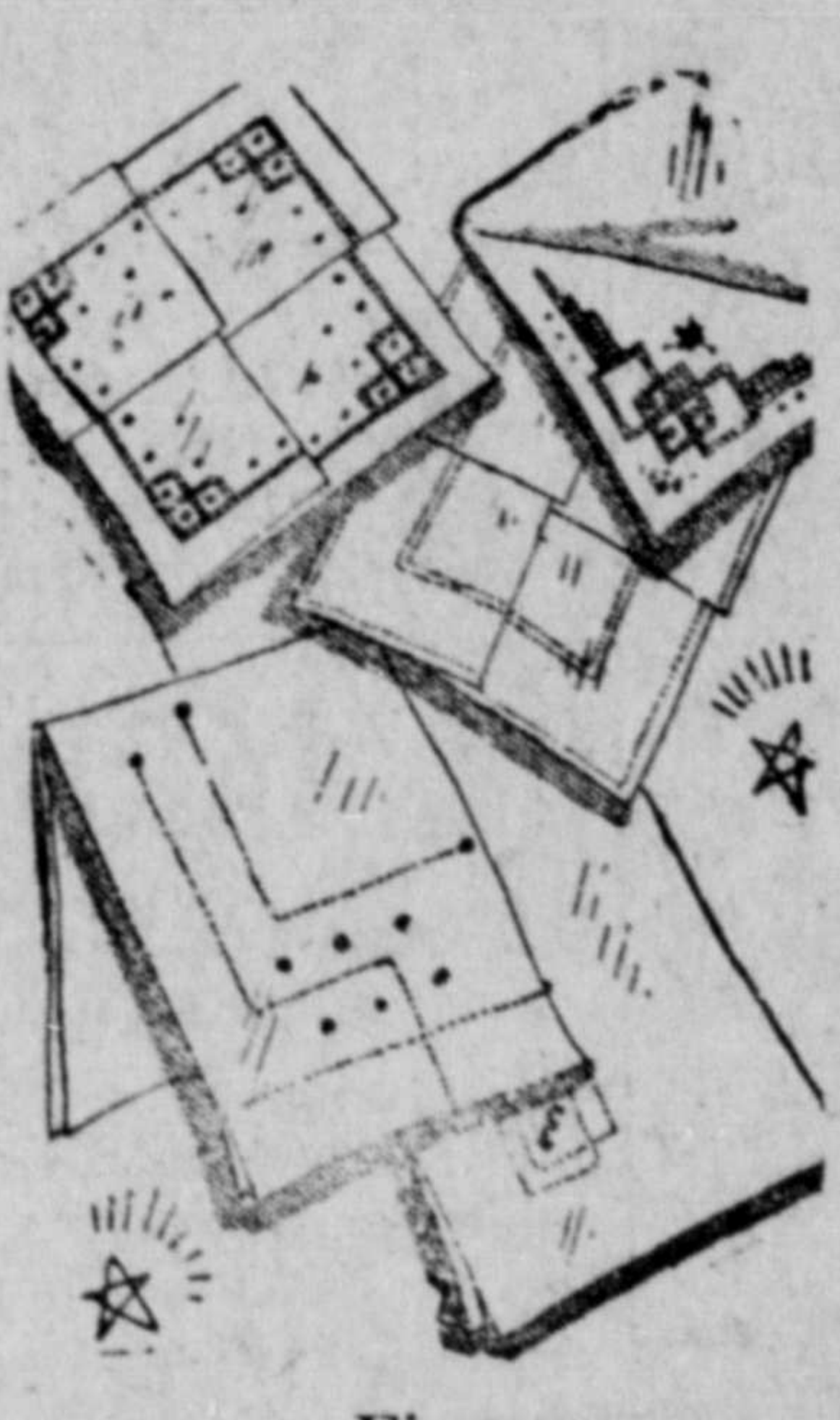
