Was Unharmed By Experience

Culmination of Search is Regarded
 As Victory For Authorities
 Over Lawless Forces

LOS ANGELES, May 15: (CP)—Trapped in their own lair, the kidnapers of William F. Gettle, millionaire Beverley Hills oil magnate, fell into the hands of the law here late yesterday before police guns and their victim was rescued virtually unharmed without ransom being paid. A sudden raid by the police on a small house in La Crescenta, north of Glendale, uncovered the hideout. One man, Roy Williams, was captured immediately and Larry Kerrigan, who ran, was later taken into custody. Another man, Kummy Kirk, and two women, Loretta Moody and Joan Burke, were arrested in another raid on an apartment house on North Harvard Street. It was in their watch of this place that the police got their tip of the La Crescenta hide-out.

It was due to statements made by the captured abductors that it was possible for the authorities to rescue Gettle without payment of the \$75,000 ransom money which had been demanded. No specific charges had been laid up to last night against the kidnapers.

Kerrigan confessed he had acted as Gettle's guide after Williams and Kirk had seized the oil man at his estate at Arcadia early Thursday morning during a party. Williams admitted that he had aided Kirk in spirited Gettle away and Kirk confessed he had thought out the scheme.

The successful outcome of the Gettle case is regarded as a distinct victory for the authorities over the elements of lawlessness. That the police had the situation well in hand at all times was indicated by the fact that their quiet search ever since the kidnapping last Thursday had centred around the point where the abductors were captured.

Action Was Withheld

The authorities were believed to be withholding action in connection with the kidnapping of Gettle. In order to give the family a chance to negotiate with the abductors for his return to his wife and four small children. Last week contact was made with Mrs. Gettle by the kidnapers who demanded \$75,000 ransom. Five thousand officers and searchers were to have been released this week but it was felt the safety of Gettle might be better insured by holding off further on the man hunt.

There was also a \$40,000 ransom note from San Bernardino but this is not believed to have been genuine.

One Man Killed, Two Likely To Die After Non-Strikers Sieged

Twenty-One Injured When Stockade in Which Strike-breakers Were Housed Was Stormed by Longshoremen Early This Morning

SAN PEDRO, Cal., May 15: (CP)—Storming a stockade in which four hundred non-strikers were housed, a mob of five hundred striking longshoremen created a riot early this morning. One man was killed and twenty-one injured, two possibly fatally. The strike situation continues tense at various United States ports on the Pacific Coast with no immediate signs of a settlement of the dispute.

ROME IS RETRACTING WAITING STATEMENT

Pond and Sabelli Should Complete 4500 Mile Flight Tonight

ROME, May 15.—The airport was ordered specially lighted tonight in anticipation of the arrival of Capt. George Pond, former United States Navy flyer, and Lieut. Cesare Sabelli on their trans-Atlantic flight from New York. If all goes well, they should be here by 9 or 10 o'clock. A great crowd had started to gather this afternoon to welcome them.

SHOULD MEET SITUATION

Elks Defeat C. N. R. A. in First Game of Season

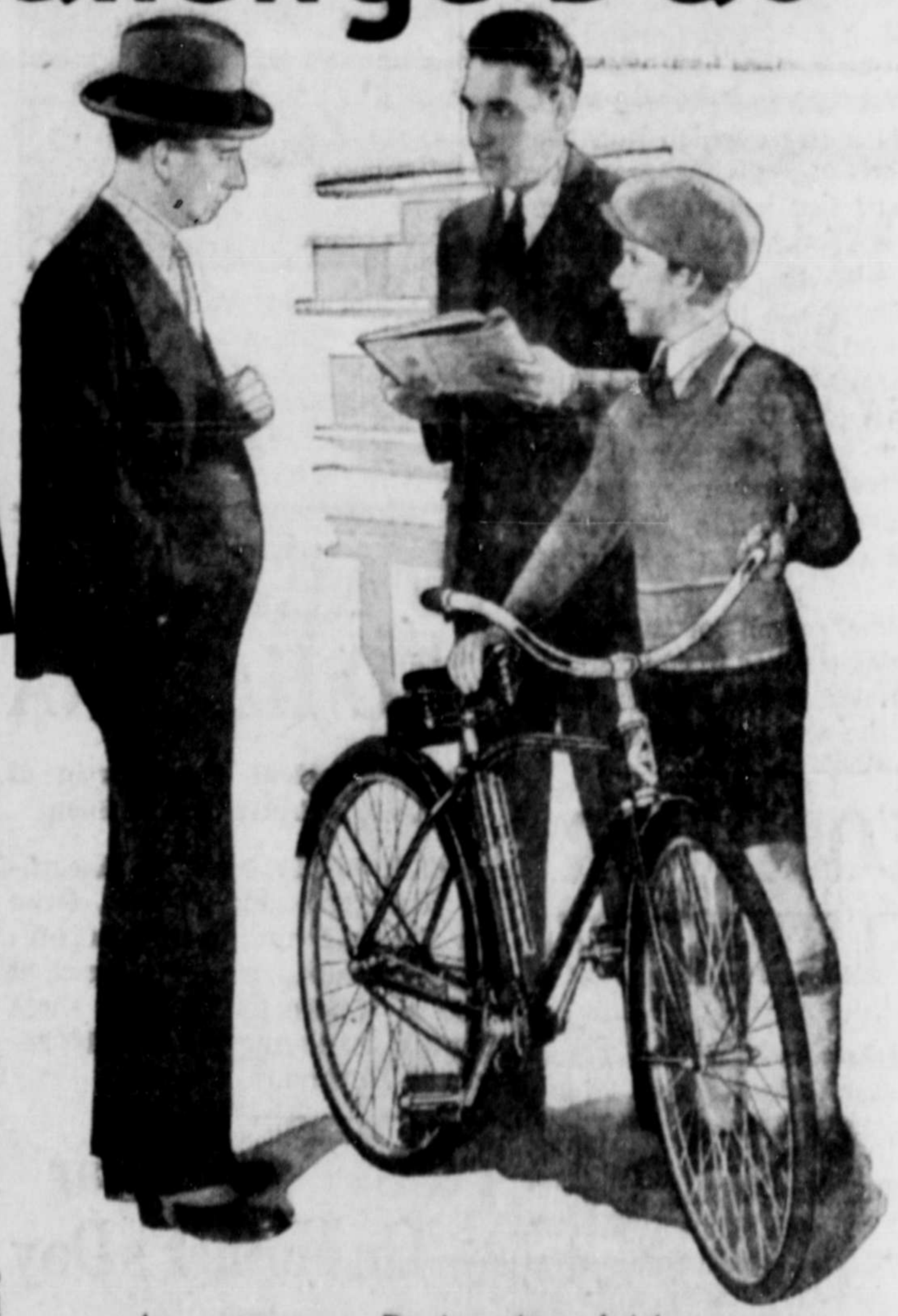
