WILLIAM GETTLE AND JUNE ROBLES RECOVERED ALIVE

No Ransom Secured By Abductors In Case Either of Tucson Child or Millionaire Los Angeles Oil Man

Chained in Pit; Rough Covering

Was Shackled by Ankles in Rough Grave-Sunburned, Dirty and Infested With Vermin

TUCSON, Ariz., May 15: (CP)-June Robles, six-year old Tucson girl, who was kidnapped on April 25, was found alive but "quite ill" and suffering from exposure chained under a heap of cactus in a sand pit nine and a half miles from Tucson yesterday afternoon. The discovery was made by law oficers and Carlos Robles, uncle of the girl, who were guided to the spot by information sent them by the asserted kidnappers. No ransom was paid.

The little girl was chained by the ankles in a hole which had been scooped out of a shallow grave, two and a half feet wide, six feet long and three feet deep. The hole was covered with tin, burlap and cactus. Inside were a jug of water and

a little food. Little June was sunburned, dirty and covered with vermin. When freed she was too weak to walk. Doctors believe, however, that she will recover within a day or so

Meantime, search for the abductors is being centred in Chicago and it is expected that arrests may be made in the very near future.




