DOLLAR REVALUATED BY ROOSEVELT ISLAND MINE RE-FINANCED AND MILL IS TO BE INSTALLED

Fixed Price of \$35 Per Ounce for Gold Is Set By President

Further Advance in Commodity Prices Expected to Result—London and Montreal Metal Prices Move Up Sharply in Response

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 1: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt late yesterday announced that, "until further notice," the American dollar was revalued at 59.06 percent of its former gold content and that the Treasury Department would pay a fixed price of \$35 per ounce for "any and all gold." The administration hopes that a world gold price will be established on this basis and expect that, as a result, commodity prices will further advance beginning with exports.

The new two billion dollar stabilization fund also goes into effect today.

Gold Prices Advance LONDON, February 1 (Canadian Press)—Bar gold advanced two shillings and five pence in price today to 135 shillings six pence per ounce, equivalent to \$34.11. MONTREAL, February 1 (Canadian Press)—The price of gold jumped 62c to \$34.01 today.

Made President

MONTREAL, Feb. 1: (CP)—Official announcement was made yesterday of the appointment of Samuel J. Hungerford as president of the Canadian National Railways. As well as vice-president in charge of operation, Mr. Hungerford, since the resignation of the late Sir Henry Thornton in July 1932, has been acting president of the National system.

Hon. Charles P. Fullerton, K.C., chairman of the trustees of the Canadian National Railways, announcing Mr. Hungerford's permanent appointment, issued the following official circular: "S. J. Hungerford has been appointed president of the National Railways, reporting to the trustees. The appointment covers the Canadian National Railways Company and other railway and other companies comprised in the National Railways."

Few railroad men in Canada have gone more thoroughly "through the mill" than has Mr. Hungerford. His story is one of thoroughness in his job of learning every phase of railroading from the day in 1886 when he trudged along with his dinner pail to the Southeastern Railway shops in Farnham, Que. to start his railway career as an apprentice, in due time becoming a machinist and from that start moving steadily on until in 48 years he has become president of the largest railway system in America.

FORMING OF BANK

Minister of Finance Moves Towards Formation of Central Institution

OTTAWA, Feb. 1: (CP)—Hon. Edgar N. Rhodes, in the House of Commons yesterday, gave notice that a measure would be introduced in Parliament providing for the incorporation of the projected central bank for Canada as recommended in the majority report of the Macmillan Commission. The minister of finance intimated that the central bank would not strictly speaking be publicly owned but a clause would be inserted to provide against any single person or corporation obtaining control of the institution.

First opposition to the central bank proposal came from the Senate where one of the members predicted that its establishment would result in the closing of half of the branches of already chartered banks in the country.

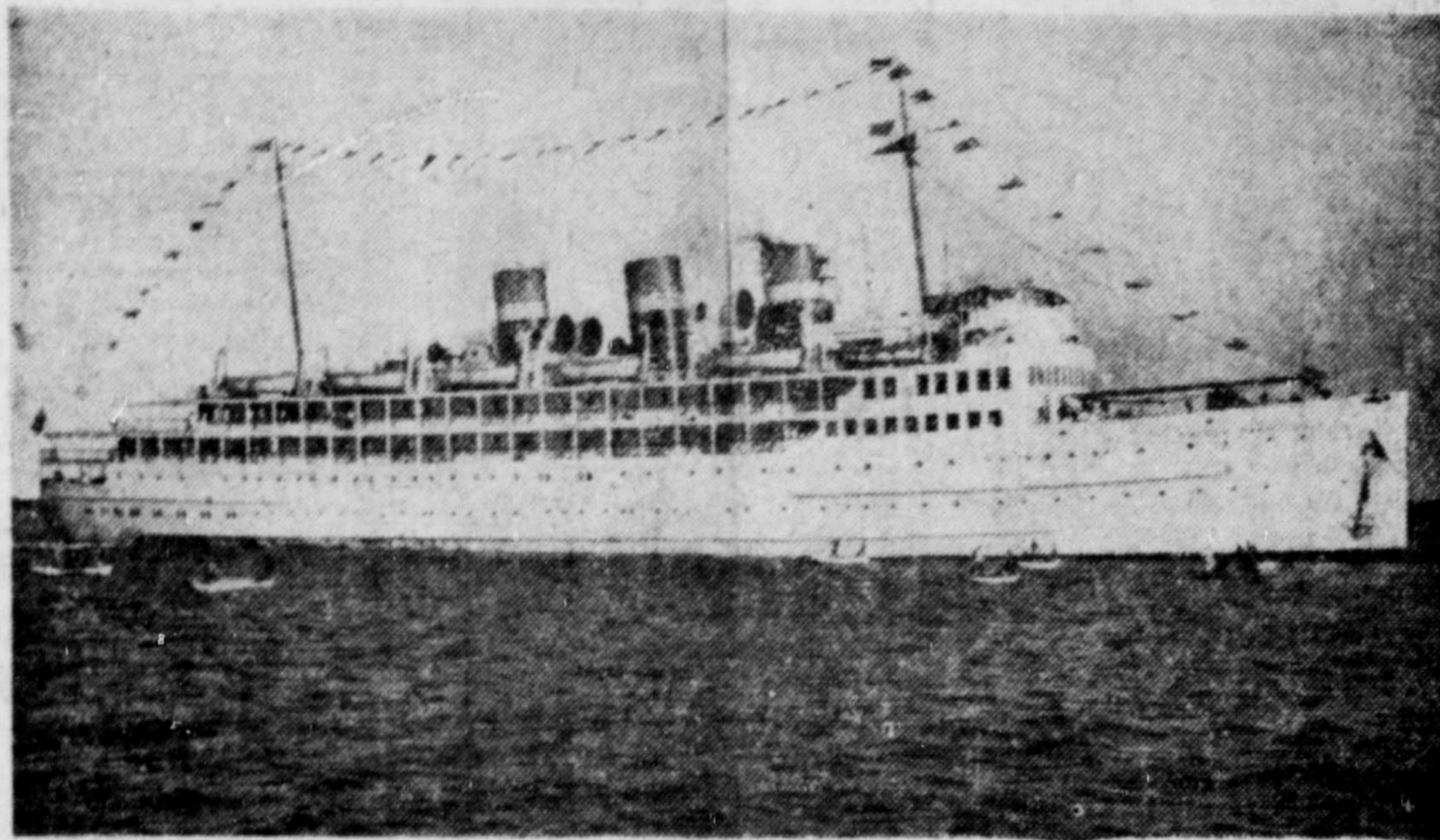
State Health Insurance Scheme In British Columbia Planned; To Re-Cast Education Finance

VICTORIA, Feb. 1: (CP)—Definite plans for a contributory state health insurance scheme under provincial control will be worked out by the British Columbia government in the six months following the coming session of the Legislature, Hon. Dr. George Weir, provincial secretary and minister of education, stated yesterday. It would be implemented as soon as a sound basis could be found for whatever scheme of contributions and benefits was decided upon without waiting for action by the Dominion or other provinces.

WARSAW, Poland, Feb. 1:—Fifteen thousand Jews have been compulsorily inoculated and disinfected as an epidemic of typhus has spread throughout Poland.

BIG SUM REALIZED

Six Million Dollars Raised for Warm Springs Hospital in Celebrating President's Birthday

WASHINGTON, D.C., February 1—Approximately \$6,000,000 was realized as a result of some six thousand or so birthday balls and dinner held throughout the country on Tuesday in honor of the birthday of President Franklin D. Roosevelt for the purpose of endowing the Arm Springs Foundation for infantile paralysis in Georgia.

Preparedness Bill Passed by Congress

"Pacifist Bloc" in London Shocked At Quick Adoption Of Vinson Bill

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 1:—The "Pacifist Bloc" was shocked yesterday by the speed with which Congress acted upon preparedness legislation, the Vinson bill being passed in a single day.

Birth Racket Is Uncovered

VICTORIA, Feb. 1: (CP)—Birth registrations of more than 230 persons, mainly Japanese, in British Columbia have been cancelled as a result of an investigation into an alleged fraudulent registration plot uncovered in 1932. It is stated that Orientals claimed Canadian birth in order to conform with the fisheries regulations.

NEW FISHERIES COMMISSION

George J. Alexander of Nanaimo Receives Appointment As Assistant To Hon. George Pearson

VICTORIA, February 1 (Canadian Press)—The cabinet has passed upon the appointment of Geo. J. Alexander of Nanaimo as assistant commissioner of fisheries in succession to J. P. Babcock who resigned recently. Hon. G. S. Pearson is the minister of fisheries.

WOMAN DIES, MAN IS HELD

Mrs. Sarah Enright Succumbs to Fractured Skull in Montreal—William Kelly Arrested

MONTREAL, Quebec, February 1—Mrs. Sarah Enright, aged 35, Vinnipeg, died in hospital here as a result of a fractured skull caused by blows from a dull instrument and William Kelly of Montreal is being held pending an inquest.

INSULL IS EXPELLED

Greek Government Refuses to Extend Leave of Former Utilities Magnate to Remain

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 1:—The United States legation in Athens advised the Department of State yesterday that the Greek government would expel Samuel Insull, former Chicago utilities magnate, at midnight last night when his police permit to remain in that country expired.

Insull, having been indicted by a Cook County grand jury, is wanted in Chicago to face trial on charges of conspiracy and larceny in connection with the collapse of his "utilities empire."

The Greek government was advised by state physicians that they considered it would be safe for Insull to travel. Extension of the time he might remain in Greece was, therefore, denied.

WORK IN ONTARIO

Greater Highway Program Planned For Eastern Province For Benefit of Unemployed

TORONTO, Feb. 1:—Hon. Dr. Herbert A. Bruce, Lieutenant Governor, in the Speech from the Throne opening the fifth session of the Eighteenth Legislature of Ontario yesterday, forecast a greater highway construction to give work to unemployed but failed to make intimation of any hint in regard to a beer system.

Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars To Be Spent on Gold Harbor Claims

Ambitious Program of Development Work Planned on Moresby Island Property Prior to Starting Gold Production, Manager Announces

The development work at Gold Harbor Mines has been refinanced to the extent of \$75,000 and work will recommence toward the end of this month and continue throughout the summer and in the fall a new cyanide mill will be erected on a new site. This is the news brought here by E. Schroeder, manager of the company, who came in on the Prince John yesterday and is leaving this evening for Vancouver for a brief trip before returning to the mine.

Mr. Schroeder is very pleased with the results so far obtained at Gold Harbor. The mill has been operated in a small way, chiefly on ore at the dump and has so far produced \$5,000 worth of gold. In addition to this, a good deal of development and exploratory work has been done in the course of which a vein has been uncovered eight feet wide, giving very good average values in milling ore.

It is now planned to continue the surface stripping with a view to determining the length and number of veins bearing good gold values. The veins may run right across the peninsula to Douglas Inlet in which case a huge ore body would be available. In any case, the stripping and underground development is expected to show that the amount of ore would fully justify the expenditure of money on the new mill. A site for this has already been chosen farther back from the water. At that point a new working shaft is to be sunk connecting up with the present workings.

The work at Gold Harbor was closed down last month at the time of the cold snap when everything was frozen up. When activities recommence there most of the attention will be devoted to stripping and trenching in order to get that work done before the flies become annoying. Then the shaft will be sunk and the ground be prepared for the new mill in connection with which the present engine and crusher will be used. Development will also continue on the lower level where 100 tons of ore has already been broken which is "good mill feed."

The company has 21 claims in a solid block running between Gold Harbor and Douglas Harbor. The re-financing is being done by Glen Jordan of a Boston firm who has become interested in the property, and who is willing to back his faith in it with his money.

It is probable the present mill will continue to operate and will help to provide the necessary funds to keep the work going during the summer until the new mill is ready for use.

RETURN OF PROSPERITY

Dominion Bank Head Urges Rail Consolidation, Government Economics and Balanced Budget

TORONTO, February 1—President B. C. Bogert of the Dominion Bank has advised consolidation of the Canadian railways, economy in government expenditures and a balanced budget as a means for solving the return of the Dominion to more normal conditions in his address at the annual meeting of the bank.

FRANCE HAS STRONGEST AIR FORCE IN WORLD; SOVIET RUSSIA SECOND

LONDON, Feb. 1:—Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald admitted in the House of Commons yesterday, in reply to a statement by Capt. Harold Balfour, that the Soviet Russian air force is the second strongest in the world, the French being first.

Difference of Opinion In Tokyo Regarding Proposal To Increase Navy Strength

TOKYO, Feb. 1: (CP)—The Minister of the Navy told the Japanese Parliament yesterday that new auxiliary naval vessels of the Japanese would outrank those of the United States at the end of 1936.

Former Minister of the Navy Yoshizawa, a member of the House of Peers, declared that, if navy men had their way, relations between the two nations would be ruptured.

Japan will ask the next naval conference for permission to increase its naval strength to a point nearly approximating that of Great Britain and the United States.

**Local Naval Unit Greatly Improved**

High Praise Voiced by Commander C. J. Beard R. C. N. After Conducting Inspection

Commander C. J. Beard R. C. N. of Ottawa, director of naval reserves for Canada, who left on last evening's train for Edmonton and Saskatoon enroute back to Ottawa after a visit of several days here, during his stay in Prince Rupert, conducted an inspection of the local unit of the Royal Canadian Naval Reserve of which Lieut. Walter Hume is commanding officer. Commander Beard saw the local unit go thoroughly through its paces and, following the inspection, made the statement that it had improved beyond all recognition since his last visit here four years ago.

## JANUARY WEATHER

Precipitation Totalled No Less Than Twenty-Two Inches—Was Colder Month

The very substantial amount of 22.9 inches of precipitation was recorded at Prince Rupert during the month of January, it is announced by R. G. Emmerson of Digby Island, Dominion meteorologist, as compared with 9.8 inches in the same month last year. But 6.6 hours of sunshine was recorded this January in comparison with 21.8 hours last year. January this year was also a colder month than last year, the minimum thermometer reading having been 11 above whereas last year in January the lowest reading was 21 above.

On the next voyage from Vancouver, the John, it is expected, will be bringing out large logging crews for the Allison camp as well as the J. R. Morgan Logging Co. at Crescent Inlet.
