

"I am creditably informed," Mr. Stewart said, "and I am going to ascertain the truth of the matter that in Western Ontario there i an individual enpaged in the production of silk stockings and silk underwear who stands to make profit well over \$200,000 this year and he is paying the lowest wages he ever paid."


