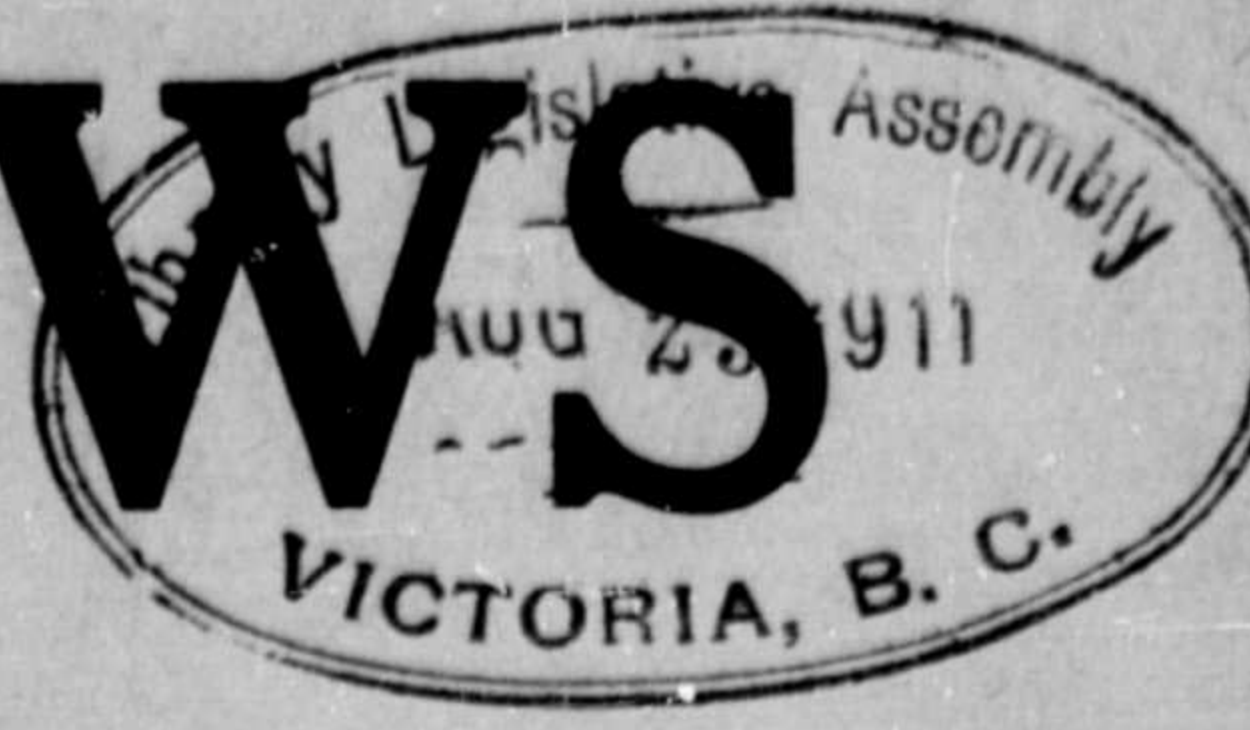

TELEGRAPH CREEK COMES TO FRONT FOR HUNTERS

Tempting New Territory Attracts ex-President Theodore Roosevelt—Large Party of English Big Game Guns at Wrangell—S.S. Port Simpson Busy

Quite the latest hunting field for the "great guns" of the aristocratic world is certainly the district of Northern British Columbia around and beyond Telegraph Creek. Wealthy men who have hunted big game in the tropics, shot chamois in the Alps, and scaled the dizzy ridges of the Andes seeking new hunting worlds to conquer, are now turning their attention to Northern British Columbia and this district has until lately been almost undisturbed. Before the rumor got round that ex-President Theodore Roosevelt was planning a visit to the Telegraph Creek territory, a number of other great sportsmen had their eye on the district which is getting a great reputation as a fresh hunting ground.

RAILWAY COMMISSIONERS ARRIVE IN CITY TO-DAY

Just What is the Range and Weight of the Board's Influence in the Dominion---Administrative Body With Powers Second to None in Canada Made up of Men Worthy of Them---Board Will Meet in Government Building.

Today members of the most powerful, extensively influential and honest administrative body in the whole Dominion of Canada, in other words the Board of Railway Commissioners, arrived in Prince Rupert this morning. The Board is holding session in the Provincial Court Room. Members of the Board are Mr. James P. Mabee, Chairman, Dr. James Mills, Mr. S. J. McLean, Mr. D'Arcy Scott, the Hon. M. F. Bernier, and ex-Officio the Hon. George P. Graham, Minister of Railways and Canals. Mr. George A. Mountain is Chief Engineer to the Commissioners and Mr. A. D. Cartwright is the Secretary.

Vastly Useful Body

No more useful body of commissioners exists in all Canada. Between the general public and the great railway corporations the Railway Commissioners maintain the balance guarding the people's rights, and seeing fair play also for the railway companies, in order that they may carry on their valuable development work restricted only where their operations interfere with the public good and safety. While the Board sees to it that the railway companies have to give the people fair treatment, it also guards companies from the attacks of unfair competitors, and from unfounded and unreasonable complaints.

Wide Jurisdiction

Greater powers, and a more far-reaching system than that of any other Board in the Dominion belong to the Railway Commission. From our own Prince Rupert, and the wonderful Northland beyond it, where even now the Chief Engineer, Mr. Mountain has been busy with the White Pass Railway, right across the continent to Sydney, Cape Breton where we get the steel for the G. T. P., the Board of Railway Commissioners whose members you can meet today, holds almost unlimited authority.

The Railway Commission deals with five hundred distinct industries. Thousands of requests for the exercise of its administrative powers come in annually. Thousands of authoritative actions are recorded to its credit every year. With railway lines in operation in Canada up to twenty-five thousand miles of track, and a continually increasing mileage, the

extent of the Board's work becomes apparent. One billion five hundred and fifty million dollars of capital are involved in the railway enterprise of the Dominion today in actual operation. Eighty million passengers are carried over the tracks every year, and nearly seventy million tons of freight. Two hundred thousand employees with a pay roll each year of \$40,000,000 ever on the increase must be added before you can grasp the extent of the Railway Commissioners' work for the country. Why, the revenues of the various corporations whose operations are guided by the Railway Board, are yearly more than twice those of the Federal Government.

Wonderful Organisation

Operating under the Railway Act, the Board of Railway Commissioners has such perfectly organised powers that no matter is too small and no deadlock too large to be dealt with, and with authority. Just as in the highest court of law the Commission operates judicially and the attaching of the Board's seal upon documents is a formality recognised as effectively as any Court Seal. The Board has the fullest powers to

investigate, circumstances, papers, books, contracts—everything in dispute. It may even take evidence by commission in a foreign country. Every railway accident that causes death or injury must be reported to the Railway Commissioners. They have five accident inspectors retained in different strategic points of the Dominion simply to look after this end of the work. Right down to the regulation of such details as the speed of trains through cities, and villages, and the coupling of cars, even the means of access from car to car, come under the Board's jurisdiction.

It is even within the power of the Railway Commissioners to fix the maximum passenger and freight rates according to what is in the judgment of the Board a fair and reasonable scale. Before our important, first hundred miles of G. T. P. railway could be operated for passengers, as Rupert residents remember, the sanction of the Railway Board had to be obtained. Not a furlong of steel may be opened up for regular traffic in Canada without the authority of the Railway Commission. But as a sort of compensation to the companies, until the sanction of the Board is obtained for a new line the corporation owning that line may use it for its own purposes without being compelled as a common carrying corporation to handle whatever freight is offered.

Some little while ago the Grand Trunk Railway Co. was compelled by the Board to issue tickets at two cents a mile and to instal a service of third class coaches between Toronto and Montreal. This is an example of how a corporation can be compelled by the Commission to meet public needs. But the work of the Commission is not all aimed at compelling the companies to give concessions. The Commission sees fair, and the great railway corporations of Canada appreciate the services of the Board. Because the method of appointment of its members ensures men on the Board of Railway Commissioners who are above reproach, and paramountly capable of judicial and administrative work between public and corporations, the effect of the Railway Commission is beneficial to the welfare of the whole Dominion through the railways, the arteries of the country's commerce.

CHIEF OF QUARANTINE FOR DOMINION COMING

Dr. F. Montizambert Expected to Look Over Prince Rupert's New Quarantine Station—Dr. H. Tremayne Will Show Him Around With Dr. Watt, Quarantine Chief for B.C.

Dr. F. Montizambert, chief of the Dominion quarantine service, is on his annual tour of inspection. After a visit to Victoria and the quarantine station at Williams Head he arrives at Prince Rupert, accompanied by Dr. Watt, of Victoria, chief quarantine officer in British Columbia.

Dr. Tremayne's Charge

Here Dr. Montizambert will have an interesting duty to perform in the inspection of the new Quarantine Station now in progress of construction by Messrs. Anderson and MacKinnon over at Digby Island. In the beautiful new Quarantine Launch Evelyn Dr. Tremayne, quarantine officer for the port whose duties will before very long be as arduous almost as those of any quarantine officer in the world, will take the senior officer over the works, along with Dr. Watt.

Quarantine Prospects

Before very long the quarantine work of this port will be exceedingly important. Nearly all the big "round the world" steamers will run to and from Prince Rupert and the Orient. To perform his

duty as quarantine officer examining a thousand passengers say, Dr. Tremayne will require to meet the vessels a long way out at sea, and this will necessitate at a date not so very far distant, a still more powerful quarantine boat. While the trig little Evelyn can do wonders as a sea boat she would not do to run regularly out into the Pacific and do the heavy work of boarding big liners.

CHIEF GOES SOUTH

Manager of the Famous "Chateau" Vickers to Holiday

Our old friend Chief Vickers of the city police force is planning a trip down below tomorrow. The Chief will combine duty with recreation by conducting to their more permanent hostelry at New Westminster one or two of his guests at the Chateau Vickers. One or two Provincial Police prisoners have also to go below by the Camosun which will have a regular cargo of delinquents this trip. Chief Vickers has not been out of Prince Rupert for two years, and is looking forward to his trip.

VIGILANT "PAT"

Alert to Protect Indians from "Hooch"—Cases Today

Before Magistrate Cars today Donald Martin pleaded guilty to having supplied liquor to an Indian. He was sentenced to pay a \$100 fine, or go to prison for two months. An Indian named Felix Brown, the same Felix Brown who was nearly drowned by filling the of his launch lately, had also to pay a fine of \$25 for having whisky in his possession. Both these cases are the result of vigilance for the protection of Indians from themselves and those who would give them liquor on the part of Sergeant "Pat" Phillipson.

WESTMINSTER CONSERVATIVES

Nominate J. D. Taylor Again—Premier McBride and Others Make Speeches Deserving Pity Rather than Censure.

New Westminster, Aug. 19.—J. D. Taylor who represented New Westminster riding in the late Parliament, was again nominated at the Conservative Convention held here tonight. Premier McBride and others were present and spoke denouncing the reciprocity pact which the Liberal Government contemplates executing with the United States.

MAY FINALLY DECIDE ABOUT THE FATE OF SEAL COVE

Railway Commission Will Deal With Question—Interesting Little Chat With Judge Mabee—Delighted and Surprised With His First Trip Up This Coast—Leaves on Monday

That big handsome man standing a few inches over six feet tall, with a strong, kindly face, over which rested a big Stetson hat you may have seen come ashore from the S.S. Prince George this morning was Judge J. P. Mabee, chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners, and Judge of the Ontario High Court.

He is a strong man physically a strong man intellectually. "It's my first trip up this coast," said His Lordship when queried by the News. "It's a beautiful trip and I marvel in pleasant surprise at the excellent accommodation of the steamships up this coast. This is a beautiful boat," he said referring to the Prince George.

"We are going to get to work here at once and hope to be through by Monday afternoon in time to leave by the S.S. Princess May for Skagway, from where

we will go to White Horse where we sit."

"Do you know what business the commission will handle here?" asked the News.

"I understand the chief thing is the settling of the dispute about the line the G. T. P. track shall take running northeast of the city and about the filling up of some of the coves' along the proposed route."

As Judge Mabee had not had time to look around the city he could not comment on it.

Only one other Commissioner is travelling with him and he is Mr. S. J. McLean, L.L.B., Mr. Richardson is acting secretary and Mr. Butcher as official reporter. Arriving with the Commissioners is Mr. D'Arcy Tate, G. T. P. solicitor, and R. C. W. Lett, colonization agent for the G. T. P. The meeting place is the court house.

ANOTHER SLIGHT ON PRINCE RUPERT

Today is the day set for the home-coming of Mr. S. M. Newton. It is safe to say that there will be no brass bands or cheering crowds at the wharf to acclaim the returning alderman. Nevertheless, the Prince Rupert candidate for the Conservative nomination fought well to secure the honor for his city, if all reports are true.

The rejection of Mr. Newton by the Conservative Convention in favor of a candidate who lives outside the constituency, is one more slight upon Prince Rupert, of a piece with the mutilation of our city charter and the general policy of making Prince Rupert tag round at the heels of the Victoria politicians.

In his announcement, Mr. Newton said that one of his chief objects in offering himself was because he felt that the time had come when this constituency should be represented at Ottawa by someone who lived within its borders. That he should have been rejected in favor of "Mr. Clements of Vancouver" is a mortification that citizens of Prince Rupert of all parties may share in. It is a slight on Prince Rupert.

Although it has been stated in the despatches that Mr. Clements at one time lived in Prince Rupert, only three persons have yet been discovered in the city who know the gentleman, and none of them are at all enthusiastic about the gentleman's fitness to represent Comox-Atlin at Ottawa.

The tub thumping of the Empire against the reciprocity agreement has obviously been very difficult work. Now that the tub thumping must be done on behalf of "Mr. Clements of Vancouver" instead of for a Comox-Atlin man, it will probably become even more distasteful to that journal and its editor.

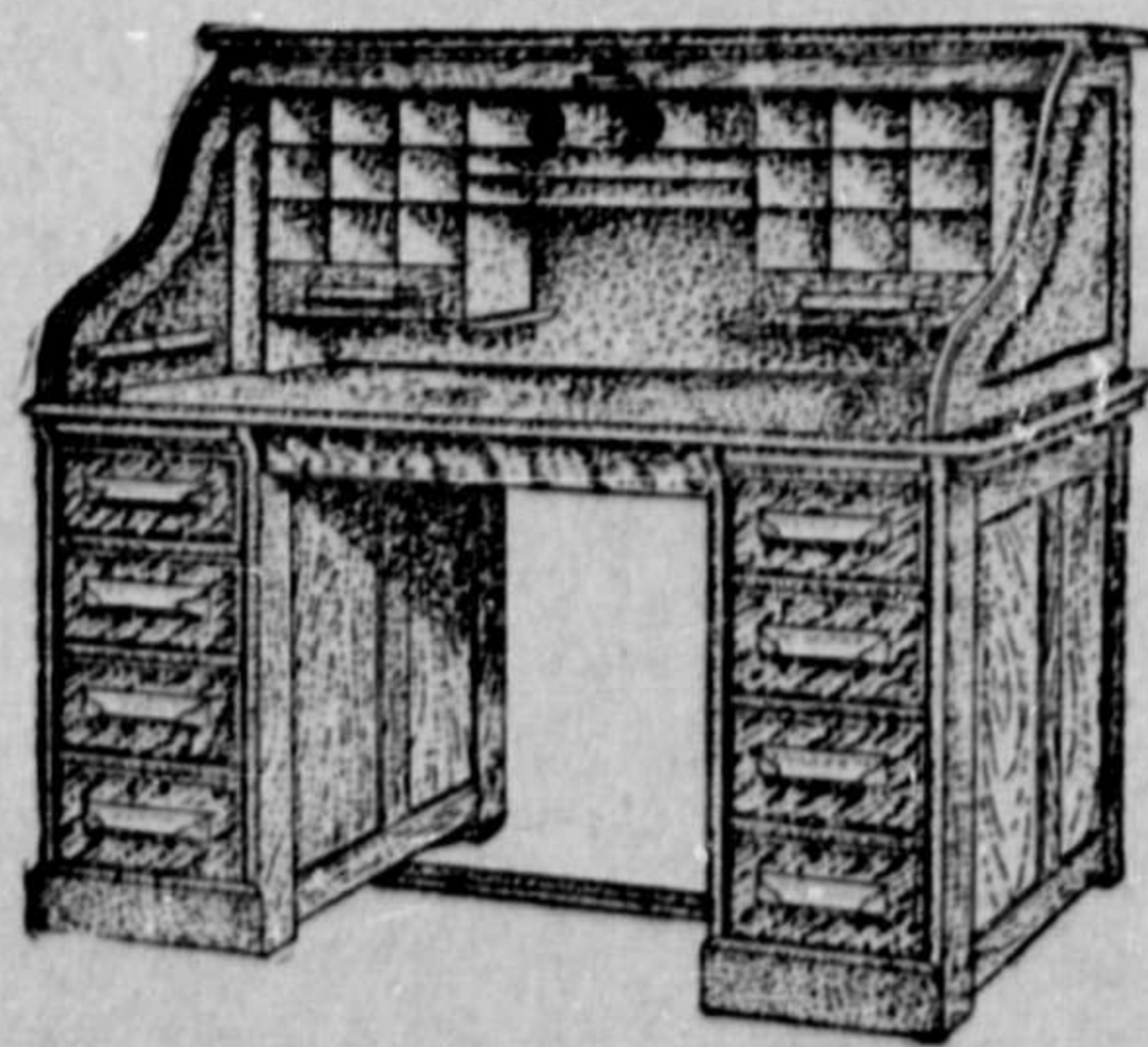

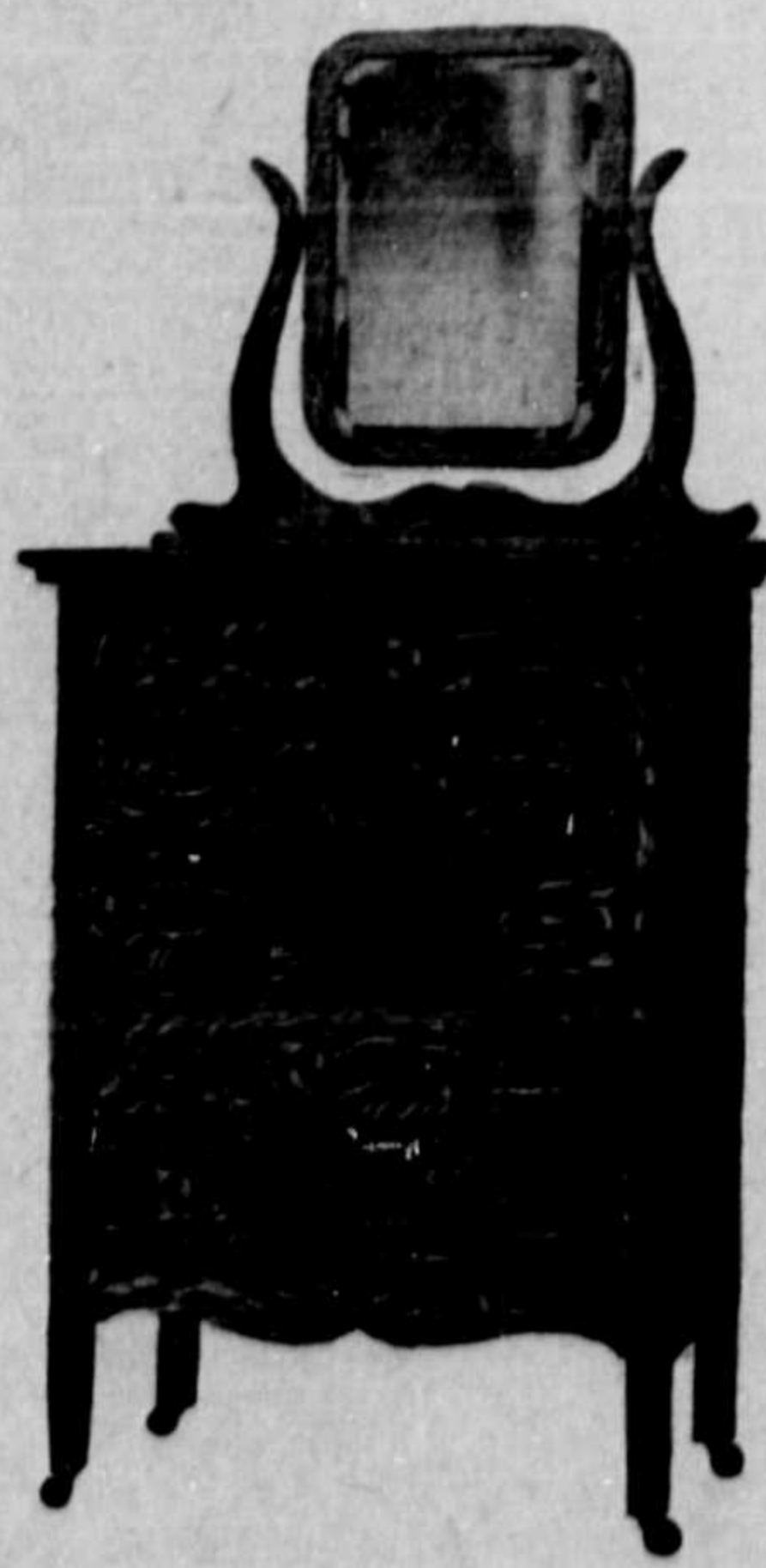

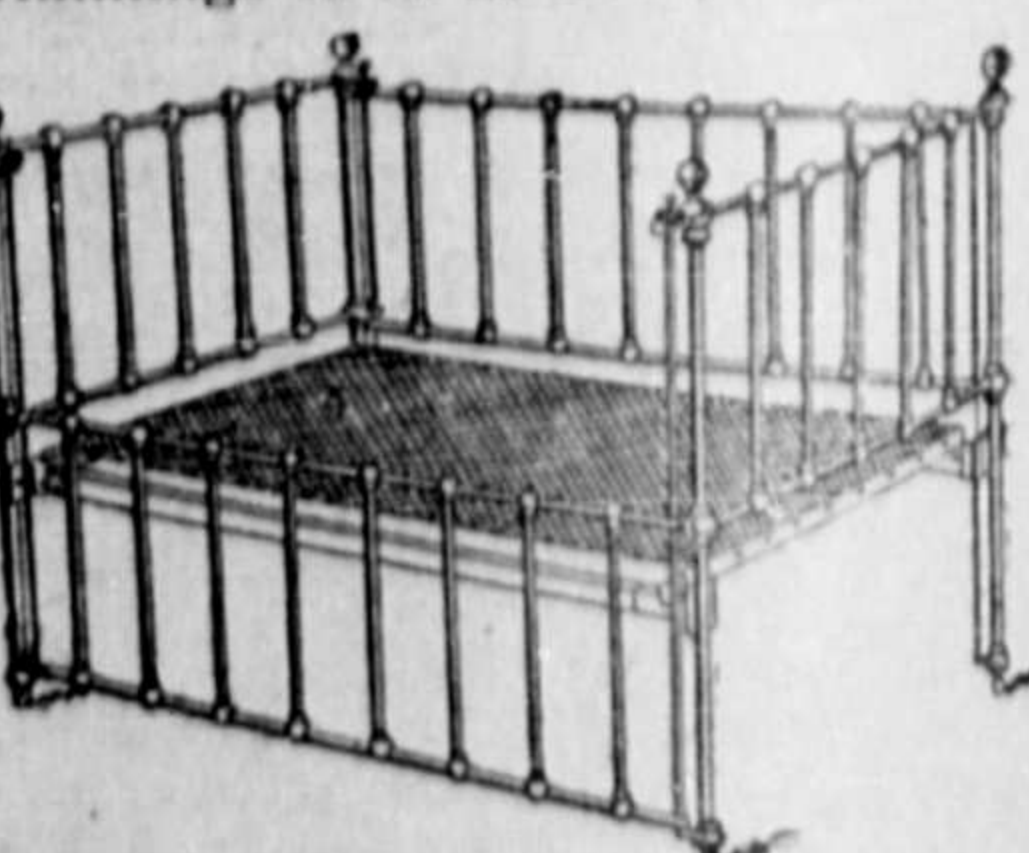

The Krupp works' yacht Germania won the international cup at Cowes this month, defeating yachts owned by the Kaiser, King Alfonso and King George.

When the famous Corinthians old country footballers strike Calgary about August 26, \$1200 or \$1400 will be spent in entertaining them, and of this amount the city will put up \$200. Dr. H. Ings and Colonel Pryce-Jones interviewed the city council and induced them to regard their request for civic assistance favorably.

If the present plans are carried out there will probably be a strong track team from the Edmonton Y. M. C. A. there, sent out to the coast this fall, where they will try conclusions with the athletes in Vancouver and Victoria.

The patent office has issued a patent to Ben Shibe of Philadelphia for a new core for baseballs. Instead of the cork centre now in use, Shibe's patent calls for vitrified rubber and a highly seasoned wood. It was said the new plan is the result of experiments wherein it was proved that the vitrified rubber and wood core make the ball respond more readily to the bat, fly more true and with greater speed.

"Bill" Lang defeated "Bill" Squires in the fifth round of a recent bout at Brisbane, Australia, for the heavyweight championship of Australia. Lang weighed in at 190 and Squires at 176 pounds. The odds were 4 to 1 on Lang, who had all the best of it throughout. Four thousand people saw the bout.

What is believed to be close to a record was established on Gray's Harbor in the matter of loading lumber aboard the California-Atlantic steamship Stanley Dollar. She was loaded with 1,400,000 feet of fir in just 51 working hours. Of this quantity 800,000 feet was stowed into her hold in 24 hours.

BIG DOINGS AT SWANSON BAY

Company Owning Plant Have Spent Large Sums on New Machinery—Going to Start Again in Big Way—Pulp Mill to be Worked Again.

For some time past there has not been any great rush at the lumber mill and pulp works down at Swanson Bay, but things have altered. The company now owning the plant there are making preparations for big business. New machinery, costing several thousand of dollars has been installed, new buildings have been erected and in a few days everything will be in shape for handling big quantities of lumber and pulp.

This information was learned by a member of the staff of the Daily News who was at Swanson Bay.

Last Sunday night two of the company's foremen left for Vancouver to get two crews of men, one crew to work in the saw mills and one crew to run the pulp mill.

Gangs of men are already cutting timber in the company's own limits, quite near to the works.

It is understood that most of the lumber will be shipped to Great Britain and Australia, while the manufactured pulp will find a ready market in the United States. Industrially Swanson Bay will be good for some long time to come.

ECHOES INSTEAD OF COMPASS

Lost Steamer Balcarres Wrecked in Agammemnon Channel was Navigated by Noise. Revealed at Investigation Today.

(Canadian Press Despatch) Vancouver, Aug. 19.—A marine investigation into the loss of the steamer Balcarres formerly owned by the Sechelt Navigation Company and which was wrecked in Agammemnon Channel on September 17 last, was held here today.

Evidence adduced showed that the vessel was navigated chiefly by means of echoes from the constant blasts of the whistle instead of by the compass. The instrument was a spirit compass of Ritchie pattern and was sluggish in acting. A new one was provided but as it would not fit the binnacle it was laid away.

Captain Fulton testified that there was no light on the float at Dempsey's Camp as usual and that this was in his opinion what caused the disaster which occurred at four a.m. in the midst of fog and heavy smoke.

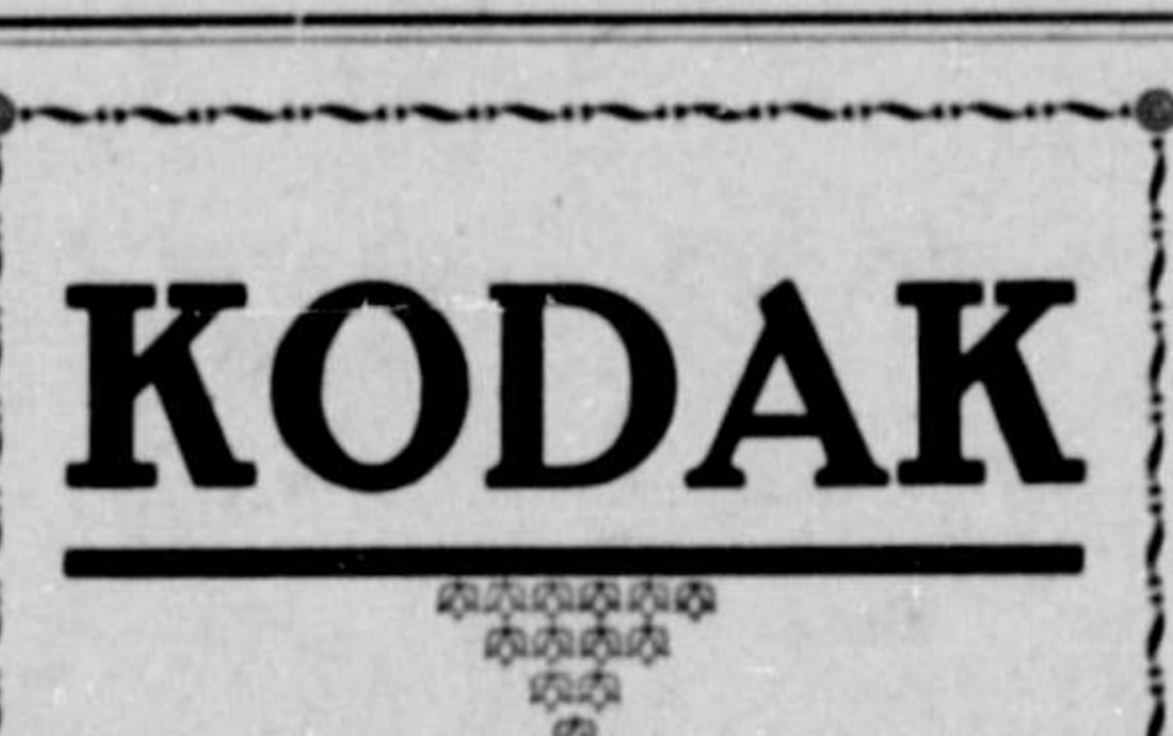
