## PUBLIC TO TAKE CONTROL OF COMMUNICATIONS IN U.S.

## One Million Germans Pledge Obedience To Chancellor of Reich

Ceremony of Allegiance Conducted on Sunday as Pompous As Ancient Roman Triumph-Nation-Wide Communication Hook-Up

MUNICH, Germany, Feb. 26: (CP)-Adolf Hitler became defacto sovereign of Germany yesterday when, in a ceremony equal in pomp to the ancient Roman triumph, more than a million Nazis throughout the reich swore obedience to him personally. The whole reich was connected with Munich in a nation-wide hook-up. Reich leaders



Invented The Death Ray



Won't this be a nice instrument in the hands of an army in the next war? It is the Death Ray, invented by a British scientist, C. R. Chadfield, who is shown here with a working model of his new and terrible invention. Actual experiments have shown that insects, mice and flies which have come in contact with the ray were killed instantly without so much as leaving a mark of violence on their bodies. Chadfield claims the ray shatters the nervous system. A nice thing to wipe out an army if made strong enough, and the inventor has secured permission to increase its present strength to about 500 times its present effectiveness. The apparatus produces a high frequency electrical oscillation of 300 million cycles between two copper plates. Chaofield is a lecturer at Leicester College of Technology.

## President Roosevelt Plans Commission To Govern Wires and Air

Would Operate in Conjunction With National Industrial Recovery Act and Formulate Code For **Entire System** 

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 26: (CP)-President Franklin D. Foosevelt, in a special message to Congress today, recommended the creation of a federal communications commission to take authority over wires, cables and radio. The proposed commission would operate in connection with the National Industrial Recovery Act program and a code would be formulated to govern the entire system of communications in the country.


