





Premier T. D. Pattullo has returned from Ottawa and has made an announcement of what he was able to secure from the Bennett administration. Roughly speaking, he For Anyox and Stewartsecured a promise of the sum of ten million dollars to meet obligations incurred by the late government and to enable the present administration to set its house in order and carry on. In addition to that he made an arrangement by which the federal government should contribute part of which the federal government should contribute part of the cost of building highways under a program to be laid CHURCH NOTICES down which would help to provide trunk highway facilities and at the same time provide work and wages in the province.

In addition to what Mr. Pattullo secured, Premier Bennett is planning to expend between three and four million dollars in the province in public works, mostly public buildings, which will be a valuable aid in the work and wages program. Between the two governments it is aimed to get men off relief as quickly as possible and back to work. Municipalities are to be urged to give relief only in return for work and thus get away entirely from the dole system.

In addition to securing enough cash to enable the province to carry on, Premier Pattullo took up with Premier Bennett the proposal that the federal government should take over the Pacific Great Eastern Railway and suggested that it be taken on a replacement basis. The total cost of the line has been about \$75,000,000 but it is not worth that. If the province was relieved of, say, half that amount, it would materially cut down the overhead and lessen the taxes on the people and enable the province to carry out other financing. The matter is to be discussed again after the present session of the federal parliament.

The success of Premier Pattullo was a surprise to many people, particularly to those who did not know. The trip to Ottawa was looked upon by many as a political bluff. The result shows that they were mistaken. Mr. Bennett has taken Mr. Pattullo seriously and is showing a very commendable spirit of co-operation. It could hardly be expected that Mr. Pattullo would get everything he asked but he has secured much more than even his friends and admirers expected.
