OTTAWA, March 8: (CP)—Notice that he would move for the appointment of a special committee to investigate the operation of sealing and halibut treaties between Canada and the United States was given in the Senate yesterday by Senator J. D. Taylor of New Westminster. The committee, Senator Taylor said, should be empowered to call witnesses and take evidence on oath.

Small Packing Plants Proposed For Interior Points to Assist Marketing Goods in Pr. Rupert

Speaking before a luncheon of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club yesterday, J. A. Grant, Victoria, markets commissioner for the Province of British Columbia, announced that, during a tour of the central interior upon which he is about to embark, he will propose to the farmers the establishment at various centres of small packing houses which shall be in charge of men experienced in the preparation of agricultural products for market who shall put the products in shape for disposal principally on the market of Prince Rupert and make returns to the producers. By this means, Mr. Grant said that he hoped producers of the central interior could be materially aided in the disposal of their goods to much better advantage than had been the case in the past. After reviewing some difficulties that producers of agricultural goods had in marketing these products, Mr. Grant referred to the necessity, as far as the Prince Rupert market was concerned, of the central interior farmer putting goods on the market of this city of quality, grading and appearance comparing favorably with goods available from other sources. DR. GRANT RESIGNS

Forced By Ill-Health To Relinquish Ecclesiastical Duties At Fort William

Word has just been received in the city of the resignation of Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant, formerly of this city, as pastor of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Fort William, Ontario, after a ministry there of over eight years. Dr. Grant's resignation was due to ill-health.

In accepting the resignation, Dr. Grant's congregation extended him a most appreciative and glowing testimonial and voted him a retiring allowance of \$1,200 per annum. The church has a membership of over 1000 and is one of the most important in the country.

Spain has been restless since a new government came into the saddle of office following the resignation of the former ministry last week.

SEDITION IS DENIED

Smith, secretary of the Canadian Labor Defence League, who is on trial for seditious libel, defending free speech in general and his client's utterances in particular, denied that Smith's words were seditious in fact or in intent.

Smith is alleged to have made seditious utterances concerning Premier Bennett's attitude in regard to the Kingston Penitentiary riots and the participants therein.

NEW EDUCATION BILL

Many people, especially those with sons and daughters who are in their teens, were glad to read that the provincial government was about to make education free up to the age of eighteen years. It goes naturally with the shortening of hours of labor that young people shall not be taken into actual industrial life too early. For the past two or three years there has been nothing for the young men to do and under those conditions it is a crime to keep them out of school and turn them on to the streets.

Evidently under the new School Act the municipalities are to be relieved to some extent in the payment of school teachers and this will undoubtedly mean that the salaries of teachers will be kept at a reasonable standard.

IMPROVEMENT IS GENERAL

There is no doubt in the world about business conditions being generally better. Factories in the east are increasing their output and farm products are being sold at a price that gives some return to the farmer. Almost daily some document comes to the Daily News office which indicates that there is an improvement in conditions. Governmental reports received as late as yesterday show that there is an improvement in employment conditions, in prices and in exports over imports. While wheat stocks in Canada are higher today than they were a year ago, the market is slightly better. The price has been stabilized to some extent by the government and thus speculation in wheat has been greatly lessened.

The difficulty in connection with the improvement is that men who have been or are out of work find themselves forced to pay higher prices than formerly. These men are still looking to the two governments at Ottawa and Victoria to make it possible for them to earn their livings respectably instead of being forced to take the miserable dole. Legislation is promised at Victoria and promises have been made at Ottawa but it is a long time to wait for the men who are wanting work and wages.

Indian Woman of Port Essington Died Last Night

Advice was received at district headquarters of the provincial police this morning of the death at Port Essington last night of Mrs. Rosa Herring, aged Indian resident of the Skeena River village and widow of the late Johnny Herring, for years Indian policeman there, who died some years ago. Mrs. Herring had been ill for some time and her death was due to natural causes. The only known relative is a nephew, George Johnson, son of the gasboat Fox who lives at Digby Island. The funeral will take place at Port Essington on Saturday.

After community singing the party broke up, everybody going home happy.


Walter Johnson refereed the basketball and Bill Bacon was on the sidelines.

Difficulties of marketing, the speaker declared, were largely responsible for the existing state of affairs. There was no encouragement for the farmer to produce goods when returns were below the actual cost of production. Unfortunately, this was the case to a great extent in British Columbia, particularly as far as fruit growers were concerned. The situation must be corrected so that the producer was reimbursed for his cost of production and given a fair margin of profit. Legislation along these lines had been attempted but, so far, it had been difficult to establish such legislation. Holding the volume of production to a point somewhere in keeping with the possibility of consumption was also another important factor. In addition, it was essential that the quality, grading and appearance of goods should be able to meet competition and, as far as marketing of central interior goods in Prince Rupert was concerned, this appeared to be a matter of outstanding importance.

Mr. Grant referred to the interest Ontario farmers were taking in B. C. marketing experiments.
