The pilot was attempting to land the machine in an open field

IS NAMED PRESIDENT

Carlos Avia Chosen Head of Cuban Government in Succession To San Martin

HAVANA, Jan. 16: (CP)-Provisional President Grau san Martin, who has ruled Cuba for the past few months, submitted his resignation shortly before midnight last night and Carlos Avia, who has been secretary of agriculture in the san Martin government, was immediately appointed by the revolutionary junta to succeed him.

In his early thirties, Avia is the youngest president that Cuba has ever had.

Rebel and Government Forces Face to Face Near Foochow: Looting and Banditry in City

FOOCHOW, China, Jan. 16: (CP)—Rebel and government forces which have been skirmishing for the past week or so were reported last night to be almost face to face. It was stated that the nationalist army was disposed to give the rebel forces a chance to retire in order although it was realized that the slightest spark might precipitate a state of sanguine warfare.

Meantime government forces were moving to put down looting and banditry which had become widespread in this city. British and United States marines and naval forces were standing on guard to protect national industries and citizens if necessary.
