CHICAGO, May 8:-Samuel Insull's long flight from justice following his indictment here over a year ago on embezzlement and grand larceny charges in connection with the collapse of his utilities enterprises ended at 8 o'clock this morning with the arrival of the aged capitalist by train from Fort Hancock, N.J., where he was landed yesterday by the steamer Exilona from Turkey. Insull was taken into federal court at once for arraignment on charges of using the mails fraudulently and violating the Bankruptcy Act. He was placed under \$200,000 bond and went to jail until he is able to put it up.

Still Going On

Action of Savory Man Against Rail Company Expected to Conclude This Afternoon

Conclusion of evidence for the plaintiff was reached yesterday in the Supreme Court action before Mr. Justice H. B. Robertson of P. J. The program was quite varied in character and gave the singer ample opportunity to display his versality. Space does not permit of describing each number in detail but some of the numbers deserve special mention. "In Questa Tomba" (Beethoven) was given in fine style and the interpretation was excellent. The number from "The Creation" was very well done, particularly the shading. Some of the runs, however, were slightly blurred.

Of the second group of songs the first two numbers were by far the best, "The Two Grenadiers" was given with a dramatic effect that left little to be desired. "From Grief I Cannot Measure" was beautiful and was sung with a simplicity that was very effective. The two Schubert numbers in this group were very well done but, in both of them, the pianissimo passages were inclined to be indistinct. Throughout "Love's Message" and the quiet passages of "Omnipotence" the accompaniment was somewhat heavy and the effectiveness of the pianissimo singing, therefore, could not be appreciated.

The singer was probably at his best in "Konig Heinrich's Gebet" as this type of song gives him the opportunity to use those long crescendos and diminuendos which he does so well. 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


