"Second Revolution" is Said To Be Brewing in Germany; Overthrow of Hitler Seen

BERLIN, June 22:-Increasing political turmoil in Germany, accentuated by the apparent crisis in the Nazi administration and the defection between President Paul von Hindenburg and Vice-Chancellor Franz von Papen on the one hand and Chancellor Adolf Hitler on the other, has led to the prediction that a "second revolution" is brewing and may break in autumn.

The nation is said to be drifting back towards a monarchy.

If Chancellor Hitler is overthrown, it is declared by some observers that von Papen will be responsible for his downfall and may emerge as the outstanding power in the country from the crisis.

Both von Hindenburg and von Papen are said to be sympathetic to the monarchist movement.

A good working majority is preferable to a Parliament made up almost wholly of members of one party.






