Washington Has Latest British Note Regarding Obligations in Review

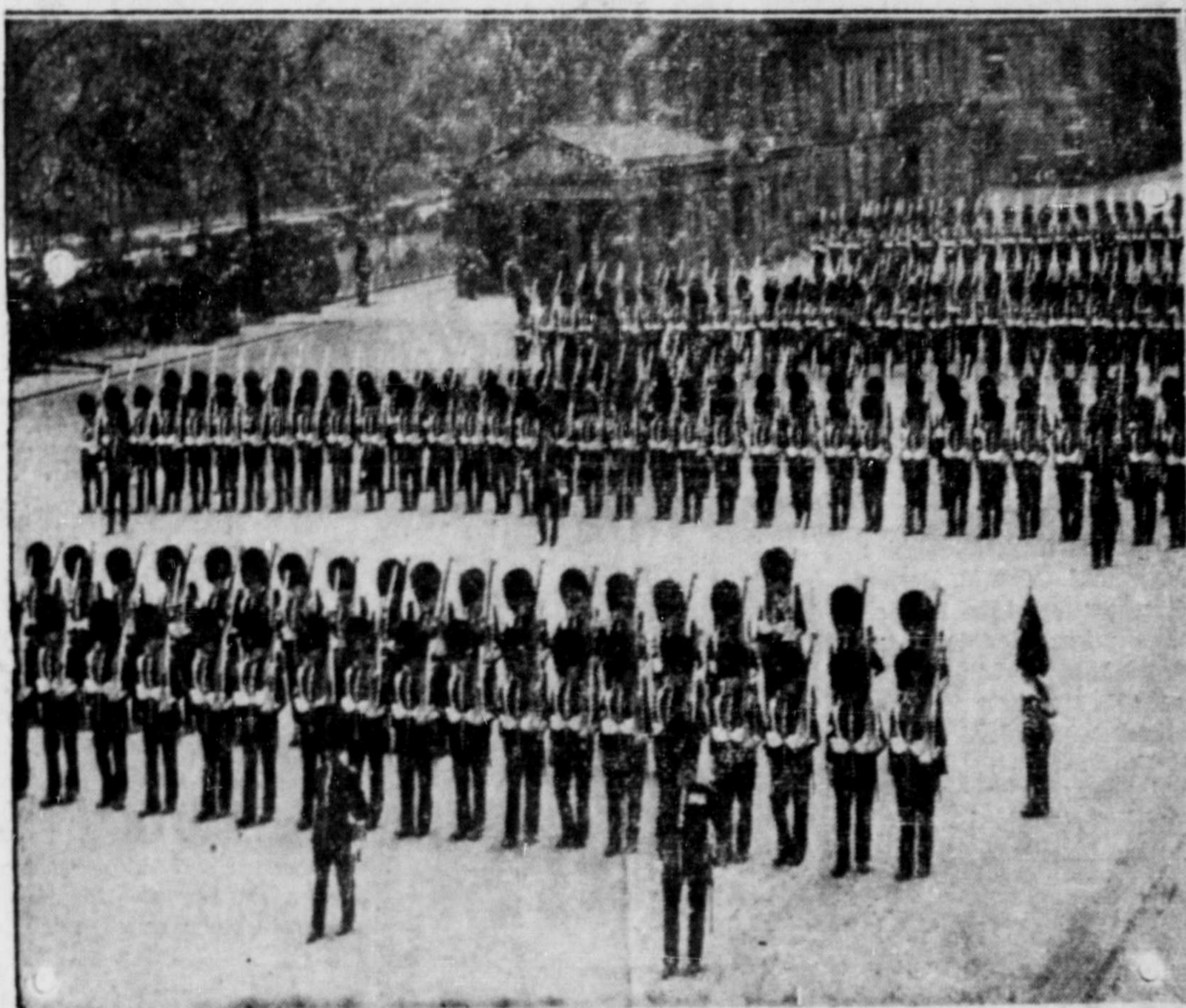
No New Developments Owing to Absence From Capitol of Cabinet Members—London Places Situation Squarely Before Uncle Sam

WASHINGTON, D.C., July 5: (CP)—There have been no new developments during the past few days in connection with the international debt situation owing to the absence from the Capitol of practically all members of the administration. For a while yesterday, Miss Frances Perkins, secretary of labor, was the only member of the cabinet in Washington, it being the first time in the history of the United States that a woman was the only principal executive of the land to be left in charge.

Sockeye Run Off To Good Start and Pack Expected To Be Big

R. G. Cunningham of Port Essington Very Optimistic—All Depends Now Upon Weather Which is Expected to be Good

Cunningham, prominent pioneer business man of Port Essington, who is a business visitor in Prince Rupert today. "The start has been the best in years and all depends now upon the weather which I believe should be good."

ELIMINATE VON PAPEN

Hitler Government Being Reorganized—Belgium on Guard

BERLIN, July 5.—Latest outstanding developments in the German situation include a plan to reorganize the Hitler government by eliminating Vice-Chancellor Franz von Papen and reiteration of the announcement by the Chancellor that summary trials and firing squads by which the attempted revolt of storm troop leaders was crushed are no longer in effect although the country is under a virtual state of military dictatorship.

Interest attached to the dramatic meeting at Neudeck in East Prussia between President Paul von Hindenburg and his former lance-corporal, Chancellor Hitler, but the real object of the meeting was not disclosed.

Belgium on Guard
BRUSSELS, Belgium, July 5.—Owing to the tense situation in international Germany, the Belgian government has ordered reinforcements into the two provinces on the border awarded her under the Treaty of Versailles.

POLICE AND REDS CLASH

Trouble in Toronto Following Release of Sam Carr From Penitentiary

TORONTO, July 5.—The return to this city of Sam Carr, one of eight Communist leaders who were sent to Portsmouth Penitentiary several years ago, was the direct cause of a brief but violent clash between police and 1500 Communist sympathizers here.

Carr, whose real name is Sam Cohen, and Matthew Popovitch were released at the end of last week from the penitentiary at Kingston on ticket of leave after serving half of five year sentences for being members of an unlawful assembly.

Theatres Are Being Closed

Seventy-Five Houses in Philadelphia Area to Quit Under Church Boycott

PHILADELPHIA, July 5.—The manager of Warner Bros' theatres here announces that his company has joined the group of theatres which plans the closing of seventy-five theatres in this area within two weeks unless a church boycott against so-called indecent pictures is lifted. Twenty thousand employees would be thrown out of work.

WAR TAKES HEAVY TOLL

Seventy-Five Hundred Paraguayans Killed or Wounded in Gran Chaco Fighting

LAPAZ, Bolivia, July 5.—An official communique issued by the Gran Chaco news office reports that 7700 Paraguayans have been killed or wounded during the last 45 days of fighting.

OPENING UP OF 'FRISCO

Excitement Still Prevails—Portland Loads Flour and Lumber—Alaska Ships to Tacoma

SAN FRANCISCO, July 5: (CP)—Rioting broke out again on the waterfront here today. Police charged a group of two hundred strike pickets, hurling tear gas at them.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 5.—With the atmosphere still charged with tenseness and special precautions being taken against disorders, business interests of San Francisco, following the holiday, resumed the move today to open forcibly the strike-paralyzed port to commerce. With strikebreakers working under special police guard, loading of flour and lumber for export continued at Portland yesterday.

From Seattle comes word that, in view of the threatening attitude of the strikers there, work of loading cargo on Alaska ships might be transferred to Tacoma.

New York Stock Mart Unsettled

One Day Up and Next Down Seems To Be Rule in Erratic and Irregular Trading

NEW YORK, July 5.—Stock movements continue to be erratic on the New York Stock Exchange. In yesterday's session values were irregularly lower with losses running to more than one point in some sections of the list following the week-end collapse when prices closed from fractions to two points lower in very dull trading. During the previous couple of days, values had rallied for good gains with industrial showing the widest advances. On the whole, the market appears to be still very unsettled.

Rev. Dr. G. A. Wells of Toronto Successor of Rt. Rev. W. R. Adams in Cariboo

KEMLOOPS, July 5: (CP)—Dr. G. A. Wells of Winnipeg was elected Bishop of Cariboo at a diocesan meeting here yesterday, succeeding Rt. Rev. W. R. Adams, who has become Bishop of Kootenay.

CONFERENCE CHALLENGED

Acting Premier Baldwin Says Argument Parley Must Do Something

LONDON, July 5.—Acting Premier Stanley Baldwin caused a stir in naval conference circles when he informed the House of Commons that the forthcoming naval conference must achieve some end in view of distressed economic and political conditions.

BAR SILVER

NEW YORK, July 5: (CP)—Bar silver has been selling at 46 3/4c to 46 1/2c, showing firmness since late last week when the price was 46 1/2c. Copper remains steady at 9c per ounce.

EDMONTON, July 5:—A sequel to the civil action launched against Premier J. E. Brownlee was written in a government caucus here when members of the United Farmers of Alberta party met in private session to consider the resignation of the Premier who has announced his intention of quitting public life. No announcement was made following the caucus but it was made known today that Hon. R. G. Reid, minister of lands and mines, would be the new premier with a reconstructed ministry.

FISHERMAN'S BODY HERE

Remains of Lewis Sande, Drowned at Goat Harbor, Arrive in City Following Recovery

Provincial Constable Victor Bond returned last evening from Goat Harbor, down the coast from here, bringing in the body of Lewis Sande, 45-year old troll fisherman, who was accidentally drowned in falling from his boat while it was tied up alongside a float at Goat Harbor on Monday night of last week. An inquiry was held this morning by Deputy Coroner A. J. Lancaster at which it was determined that death was due to accidental drowning. Witness were Albert Lund and Charles Duthie.

On word-being received here that Sande was believed to have drowned, Constable Bond was sent to Goat Harbor and, as a result of his efforts, the body was recovered on Tuesday of this week.

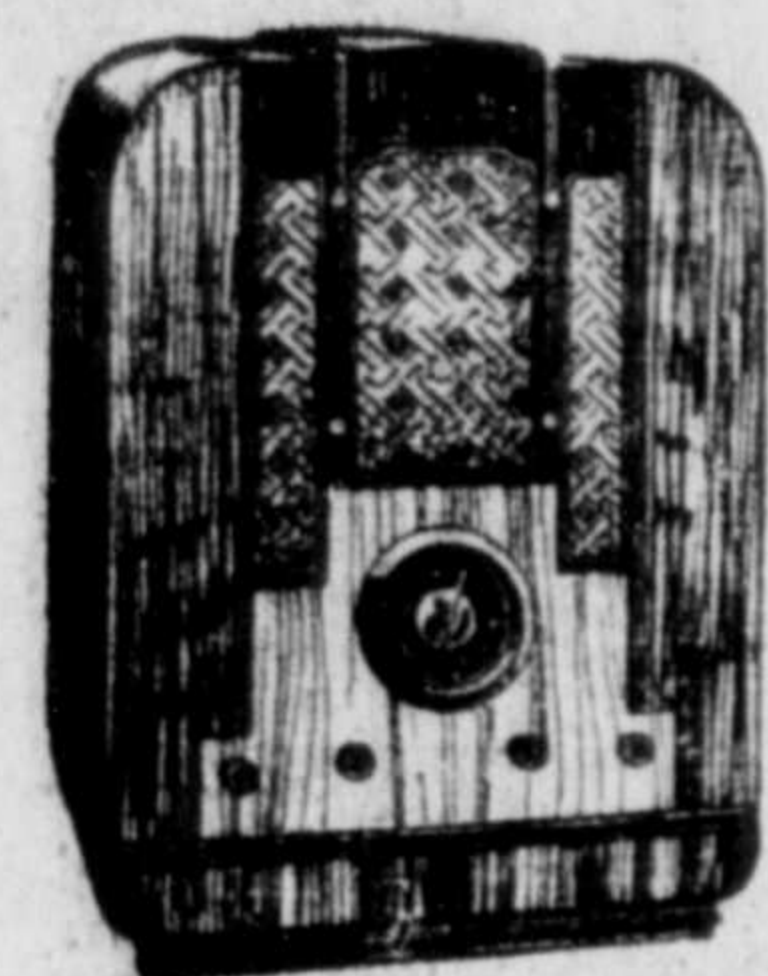

From the Waterfront

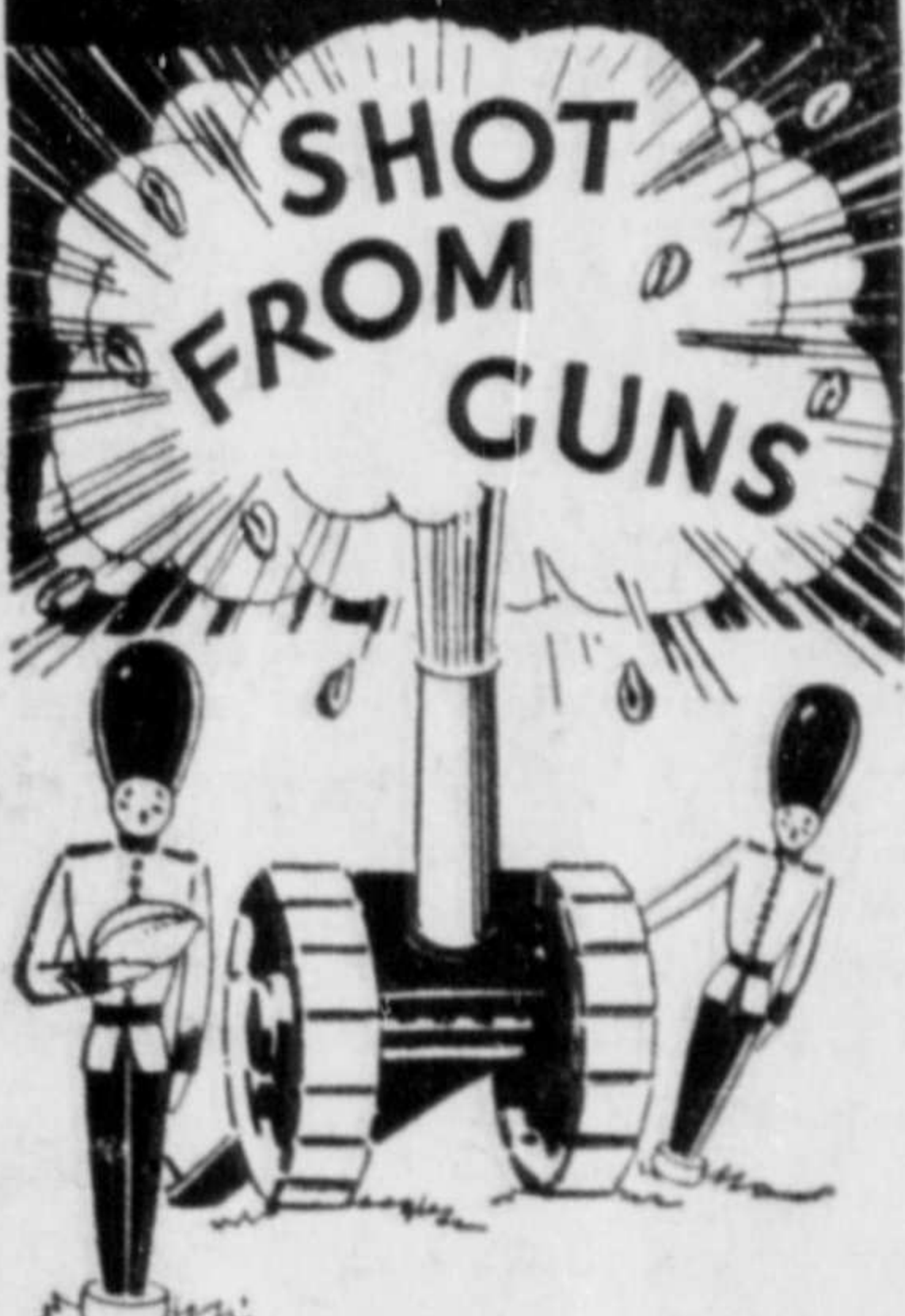
