BRITISH AND FRENCH ARE AGREED WELFARE SERVICE OF PROVINCE ON SCIENTIFIC BASIS

French Foreign Minister Pleased With Result Conference in Britain

FOREIGN MINISTER OF FRANCE WELL PLEASED WITH CONVERSATIONS IN LONDON PRIOR TO DEPARTURE FOR PARIS.

LONDON, July 10.—Foreign Minister Louis Barthou of France left here today in a cheerful frame of mind after two days of conversations with the British cabinet and officials regarding the situation in Europe.

It was believed earlier that when the conversations ended Britain was still holding aloof from any new obligations in continental Europe.

VICTORIA, July 10.—The replacement of William Manson as superintendent of welfare for British Columbia by Dr. George M. Davidson of Vancouver is said to be in accordance with the policy of Dr. George M. Weir, provincial secretary, to place the whole of the welfare services of the province on a scientific basis.

ANNOUNCE CABINET

Premier-Designate Hepburn of Ontario to Name Personnel of Administration Today

TORONTO, July 10.—It is reported that Ontario's new cabinet will probably be officially announced today following a meeting between Premier-Designate Mitchell Hepburn and his followers.

One of the first official actions of the new Hepburn government will probably be to set the date for the provincial by-election in Wellington South to fill the vacancy in the legislature caused by the death of D. Paul Munro of Guelph who was killed in an automobile crash near Watertown a few days after having been elected Liberal member for Wellington South in the general election.

Nova Scotia Man Drowned in Lake

Unable to Swim, Wesley Burchell Of Sydney Loses His Life While Bathing

SYDNEY, N.S., July 10.—Wesley Burchell, aged 25, was drowned in Gillis Lake when he ventured beyond his depth. Unable to swim, he sank instantly while companions watched helplessly.

FRANCE IS SKEPTICAL MINISTER ACCUSED

Peace Message Does Not Abate Menace, Paris Feels

PARIS, July 10. (CP)—French officialdom yesterday considered the "menace" presented by Germany as unabated by the gesture for peace in the speech of Rudolph Hess, aide to Chancellor Hitler.

VIENNA, Austria, July 10. (CP)—The Berlin correspondent of the Wiener Echo has telephoned his paper that Chancellor Adolph Hitler has been ordered by his physicians to take a long vacation.

The pro-government newspaper Weltblatter reports from reliable information that Vice-Chancellor Franz von Papen of Germany was slated for assassination at the same time as General Kurt von Schleicher recently but a company with two machine guns prevented his murder.

MINISTER ACCUSED

Member of French Cabinet Faces Criminal Action as Result of Bayonne Pawnshop Scandal

PARIS, July 10. (CP)—Foreign Minister of Colonies Albert Dalimier and two of his subordinates face possible criminal action in connection with the Stavisky "Bayonne Pawnshop" scandal, it was indicated yesterday.

LACHINE, Que., July 10.—Sister Madeleine de Jesus, aged 52, of Quinebaugh, Mass., plunged eighty feet to her death from the fourth storey of the Convent of St. Anne when attempting to kill flies on a window screen.

Patriarch's Body Being Dissected

Medical Scientists Endeavoring to Learn Secret of Zoro Agha's Longevity

ISTANBUL, Turkey, July 10. (CP)—The body of Zoro Agha, Turkey's Methuselah, who died recently here at the asserted age of 160 years, has been turned over to medical scientists for dissection. The vital organs will be thoroughly examined to ascertain if any light may be thrown on the reason of his longevity.

BOTH SIDES CONFIDENT

Liberals and C. C. F. Equally Sure Of Winning in North Vancouver

NORTH VANCOUVER, July 10.—Both Liberals and Co-operative Commonwealth Federation appear to be confident of victory in the provincial by-election this Saturday. The C. C. F. hope is largely based on the result in the general election which was decisively in favor of Mr. Anderson who had a majority of 619 over Jack Loutet, Independent and former Conservative member, H. S. Woods, the official Liberal candidate, coming third in a field of seven.

Since the general election, however, the Liberal fences have, apparently, been mended in the North Shore seat where they were badly broken. In addition, the Liberals expect to get the bulk of the natural Conservative vote of the riding.

Mackenzie Matheson, Liberal candidate, although practising in Vancouver, makes his home in North Vancouver riding at Caulfield.

Mrs. R. P. Steeves, C. C. F. candidate, lives in Vancouver where her husband is a school principal.

SITUATION UNCHANGED

Federal Board Moves in Connection With Longshoremen's Strike—Teamsters Vote to Quit

SAN FRANCISCO, July 10.—There was no change in the longshoremen's strike situation yesterday, both sides, apparently, remaining adamant as the national board delegated to deal with the industrial crisis brought the new federal Labor Disputes Act to its first test. Walk-out votes by the teamsters of San Francisco and Oakland, scheduled to become operative this week, have further intensified general strike threats.

NEW YORK, July 10.—Price changes were almost negligible in Saturday's trading on the New York Stock Exchange, the list continuing firm. Oil stocks were the best performers in apathetic trading. Yesterday volume was small and price changes narrow. United States government bonds were strong and cotton futures higher.

WASHINGTON, July 10. (CP)—The Great Northern Railway has moved to abandon its sixty mile branch railroad from Rexford, Montana, to Fernie.

Famous Atlin Mine is Sold For \$25,000

Acting for interests the identity of which was not disclosed, H. A. Bourne, Vancouver barrister, at a sheriff's sale here, bought in for \$25,000 the famous Engineer mine in the Atlin district which formerly was a rich gold producer and which for many years was the subject of litigation in the courts. Mr. Bourne was the only bidder for the property, the sale of which had been adjourned on several occasions.

AN INTERESTING CONTEST

The political contest in North Vancouver, which culminates with the election on Saturday, will be particularly interesting. In the absence of the Conservatives from the field it leaves the fight a straight one between the government and the official opposition, the C. C. F. In view of the fact that Mrs. Steeves, the opposition candidate, recently lectured in Prince Rupert and made a good impression as a public speaker, many will watch the North Vancouver contest with something akin to personal interest.

SCHOOL FINANCING

A survey is being made by Hon. Dr. G. M. Weir, minister of education, and Hon. John Hart, minister of finance, assisted by committees, with a view to revising the method of school financing. Among the subjects being considered are distribution of the burden of finance, possibility of new sources of revenue, the centralization or decentralization of financial control, the size of administrative units, school fees, cost of text books and the possibility of saving money without the loss of efficiency. It is planned to have the report ready in time to lay before the legislature at its next session with the expectation of implementing it in legislation.

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the month of June, according to figures compiled at local waterfront fish handling houses, totalled 1,778,000 pounds of which 789,000 pounds was from Canadian boats and 987,000 pounds from American. The total for this June was about a stand-off with the same month last year when 1,767,000 pounds was brought in, 914,000 pounds being from Canadian boats and 853,000 pounds from American.

Official pack figures of the Dominion Fisheries reflect the great improvement in sockeye fishing on the Skeena and Naas Rivers this season over last. Up to the end of June the total pack for the Skeena this season was 9,200 cases, of which 7,425 cases were sockeye, as compared with 1,963 cases (1,824 sockeye) in the corresponding period last year. The Naas pack for this year was 4,048 cases as compared with 1,509 cases last year, the Rivers Inlet pack 2,223 cases in comparison with 1,067 cases. Smith's Inlet 729 cases as against 345 cases and the central area 3,371 cases as against 1,737 cases. According to unofficial reports, the improvement in fishing last week was even more marked than the week previous. From the trolling grounds reports of improved fishing are also received.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, returned to port at 11:30 this morning from Anyox, Stewart and other northern points and sailed at 1:30 this afternoon for Vancouver and waypoints.

Having taken an overflow of passengers from the Prince Rupert, C. N. R. steamer Prince Charles, Capt. Edward Mabbs, sailed at 5:30 yesterday afternoon for Vancouver where she will be commissioned in the Queen Charlotte Islands service between here and Vancouver by sailing from the southern port Saturday afternoon. The Prince Charles takes over the run of the Prince John which is to be engaged in freighting with Capt. Dan McKinnon in command.

Announcement was made today of special round trip excursion fares from here to Vancouver which will be run in July, August and September by the steamship companies. The round trip may be made on a one-way fare with stopover allowance of nearly two weeks in Vancouver.

The first special excursion will be leaving here on July 20 aboard the C. P. R. steamer Princess Adelaide and returning from Vancouver on the same steamer leaving Vancouver July 25 or August 1.

The next excursion will be leaving here on August 11 aboard the C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert, leaving Vancouver on the return north on August 15 or 22.

The third and last excursion will be leaving here September 17 aboard the Union steamer Catala and leaving Vancouver on the return north aboard the same steamer September 21 or 28.

VANCOUVER, July 10: (CP)—Francis E. Harrison, who opened the first post office in Vancouver and for many years was postmaster here, is dead at the age of 73 after a brief illness. He had been retired for a number of years. He was a native of Stratford, Ont.
