

Giant New Air-Liner Planned For Long Flights



Here is illustrated an artist's conception of the proposed 100-ton metal-clad airship, for mail and passengers, and a perspective view of the ship's main cabin, with the metal hull removed. Construction plans for the huge all-metal craft have been submitted by the United States department of commerce, to the public works administration for consideration. If approved, the ship wil be built at an estimated cost of \$4,500,000 and will provide work for 2,500 men for one year. Looking at the cabin we find the control rooms forward, followed by the radio and meteorology rooms. Then come the cabins of the captain and officers, followed by those of the passengers. Then come, in order, the galley, lavatories, mess hall, and observation lounge, in rear. Crew quarters, and mail and express rooms are contained in the upper hull. The greater part of the cost of building the air liner would be self liquidating, as it is proposed to lease the craft to private operators for South American and African traffic. The ship will require a fairly large hangar—its proposed dimensions being 547 feet length, and maximum beam of 119 feet; or a trifle larger than the Graf Zeppelin. It would travel at 100 miles an hour; accommodate 30 passengers, and carry 6 tons of mail and express.

Political Honeymoon of U.S. President is Ended; Veto On Veterans' Bonus Overridden

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 29: (CP)-The Senate yesterday voted 63 to 27 to override President Franklin D. Roosevelt's veto of more liberal veterans and federal pay legislation and thereby put the legislation on the statute books.

The House of Representatives had voted 310 to 72 on Tuesday to override the veto.

The action of Congress in overriding the veto will add some \$228,000,000 to the budget and, in the opinion of political observers, terminates the President's political honeymoon.

THE SUPREME TRAGEDY

A glance at the front page of almost any newspaper will Reid. Vancouver; Bert McDonald make it clear that tragedies are very common today. Two North Vancouver; Mr. and Mrs thousand years ago they were much more common. It was McCartney. Porcher island. nothing to see criminals or suspected criminals nailed to a cross dying the death of degradation.

Approximately 1934 years ago there was such a tragedy enacted on the outskirts of Jerusalem. Two of the men were thieves and the other was a problem best settled by getting Him out of the way. So they crucified Him with the thieves, thus showing their contempt for Him and His teachings.

Nearly two thousand years have passed and tomorrow we keep holiday because of the tragedy of Golgotha. Many keep it as a day of mourning but that should not be. The only reason for mourning would be that we have failed to live up to the Christ standard. The supreme tragedy was not the slaying of the Christ on the cross but the fact that even today after two thousand years of preaching and teaching men are still dying deaths of degradation without the halo of the cross.

"On the one side we have the physical evidence of a world overflowing with wealth. But the only picturemaking process we are accustomed to recognize reflects decadence, distress, destruction."




