Insull and Sixteen Others Are Acquitted by Chicago Jury on Mail Fraud Charge

CHICAGO, Nov. 26: (CP)—After deliberating for two hours and two minutes on Saturday, twelve Federal Court jurors brought in a verdict of acquittal in the government's charges of \$100,000,000 mail fraud against Samuel Insull and sixteen business associates who had been cited as co-defendants.

"This is the start of my vindication," exclaimed Insull after hearing the verdict.

Another charge of embezzlement involving the same company—Insull's ill-fated Corporation Securities Company—is still pending against him as well as against his brother, Martin, and son, Samuel jr.

The indications are that a labor administration will follow the present government in England. Since labor has dropped its red proclivities and has adopted a Liberal policy it is probable it may have the confidence of the people of that country and be given an opportunity to administer its affairs for a period. That party is a peace party and the question of restricting the manufacture of munitions would appeal to it strongly.

A DIFFICULT SITUATION

It is unfortunate for Germany and France that they are neighbors. Each one is afraid of the other and with reason. Each has been victor in a great war in which death and destruction followed, and territory was taken away. This disputed territory keeps alive the hot coals of hate which at the first opportunity burst into flames. If these countries were farther apart there would be less danger of war. Possibly if there is another great war it will result in the formation of the United States of Europe.






