CANADIAN TRANSACTIONS IN SILVER

AUSTRALIA DEFEATS ENGLAND WINNING CRICKET HONORS

Dominion Government Accepts 48.49c. Bids In White Metal Deal

Is Expected to Have Effect of Stiffening Price of White Metal in Canada—Transaction is Sequel to United States Nationalization

OTTAWA, Aug. 22: (CP)—The Dominion government has accepted tenders for the purchase of 220,000 ounces of silver at an average price of 48.49c per ounce in Canadian funds, the Department of Finance announced today. The transaction is expected to have the tendency of stiffening the price for silver in Canada and is a sequel to the recent move of the United States in nationalizing silver.

Stock Trading Is Very Quiet

Lightest Volume in Ten Years on New York Exchange—No Price Changes

NEW YORK, Aug. 22:—Price movements on the New York Stock Exchange during the past few days have been practically nil and without significance, small gains offsetting equally small losses. Volume of trading has been the lightest in ten years.

British Pound and Canadian Dollar on New York Exchange

NEW YORK, Aug. 22:—The British pound sterling has been trading at \$5.09½ here and the Canadian dollar at \$1.02 9-16.

MONTREAL, Aug. 22:—The British pound sterling has been trading at \$4.96 on the local foreign exchange market and the United States dollar at 97 17-32c.

One of United States Navy Planes Forced Down Because Of Engine Trouble Yesterday

While flying from Sitka to Prince Rupert Tuesday afternoon with the squadron of United States Navy planes returning south after an expedition to the Alaskan Peninsula, one of the twelve amphibian flying boats was forced down with engine trouble and was later alongside the minesweeper Swan, near Coronation Island. Neither Lieutenant G. L. Huff, the pilot in charge, or any of the four men with him aboard the plane, suffered injury.

DARIEN, China, Aug. 22: (CP)—Seven hundred persons are dead, sixty thousand homeless, thirteen hundred homes were destroyed and six hundred junks carried out to sea by a terrific storm that burst over Antung, one of the chief seaports of Manchukuo.

FAIR NOW GOING ON

Formal Opening Last Night of Flower Show and Carnival By Commissioner Alder

On All Week

Sports Program Gets Under Way Today and Home Gas Optimists Will Open Tonight

Brief formalities marked the official opening last night at the Exhibition Hall by City Commissioner W. J. Alder of the Flower Show and Carnival Week proceedings. In declaring the event open, Mr. Alder congratulated the Fair Board as well as exhibitors on the excellence of the flower display. He trusted that the entertainment of Carnival Week would prove enjoyable not only to local people but to the many visitors from outside points who were here for the occasion. F. E. Wermig, president of the Fair Board, acted as chairman and made brief remarks in introducing Mr. Alder.

Completion of Northern Highway And Establishment of Two Model Farms Asked by Convention Here

Number of Resolutions Passed at Afternoon Session of Associated Boards of Trade of Central B.C.

At the afternoon session of the convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia yesterday with L. B. Warner, the president, in the chair, a number of very important resolutions were passed and a few that were submitted were rejected. Of course, the completion of the highway from Prince Rupert to Jasper

was asked for and the experimental farm request was changed this year on the suggestion of Olof Hanson M.P. who said he thought, while a big experimental farm could not be established by the federal government at present, it was most probable appropriations would be obtained for two model farms, one in the Bulkley and the other in the Nechako Valley. A resolution asking for these was adopted unanimously.

Other requests of the convention were that the road from Prince George to Smithers be gravelled; that the Cariboo Road from Clinton to Woodpecker be better maintained; that the Canadian National Railway be asked to give the district its full quota of ties and at a reasonable price. The federal department of agriculture was asked to inspect and buy, when available, local registered bulls instead of importing; the attention of the provincial government will be drawn to the discrimination in the matter of timber royalties against the north in favor of the south and redress asked; that investigation be made into the price of gasoline and, if necessary, regulations passed; that a deposit be asked from mining companies coming into a district and employing men sufficient to cover their wages for two weeks; that lower freight rates be asked from the railway on very low grade ores; that an assistant resident mining engineer be appointed to assist Douglas Lay in the Omineca mining district; that the possibilities of providing a portable milling plant for the use of the small miners be investigated; that the prices on meals on railway dining cars be reduced and the service improved to make it correspond with other sections of the railway.

The suggestion that the headquarters of the game department be removed from Vancouver to Prince Rupert was not endorsed and neither was that for compulsory teaching of agriculture in the public schools.

The resolutions committee in several cases consolidated resolutions sent in from different districts and refused to endorse others. A number of the requests were fully discussed.

Fifth and Deciding Test Match Finished By Staggering Margin

Players From Down Under Built Up Insuperable Lead Almost From Start and Maintained Supremacy Almost Throughout Play

LONDON, Aug. 22: (CP)—The Australians won the fifth and deciding test cricket match against England by the staggering margin of 563 runs today. The scores were: Australia, 701 and 327; England, 321 and 145. At the commencement of play this morning, England's bowlers made short shrift of the remaining Australian batsmen and England took the wickets for the second innings needing 708 runs to stave off defeat but the first two wickets fell for only three runs, leaving the crowd stunned by England's collapse as one after another of the Australians mopped up the remainder.

The Australians maintained an almost insuperable lead over England at the conclusion of the third day's play yesterday. Scores in the match, which was fought to a finish, were then: Australia, 701 and 186 for two wickets; England, 321. Fighting with their backs to the wall, England Monday scored 90 runs for no wickets at the close of the second day of the crucial match. Earlier Australia was finally dismissed for a near record, a first innings total of 701 runs after resuming from Saturday with 475 for only two wickets. Ponsford completed a gallant inning by reaching 266. After Ponsford fell, the English attack got an upper hand.

More Products of Interior Are Being Shipped to Prince Rupert And Supply Steadily Increasing

Great progress has already been made in the effort to secure the marketing of Central British Columbia produce in Prince Rupert and farmers of the interior are planning to play a much larger part in supplying that market in the future, according to L. B. Warner, who mentioned the matter today in his valedictory address to the convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia which completed its work at noon today.

According to Mr. Warner one of the big features in connection with the work has been the action of the Canadian National Railways in bringing the freight rates on farm products in conformity with the rates in the south and by allowing freight to be carried in small lots on the mixed trains coming into Prince Rupert. Reduction had been really substantial. They were now on a firm basis for future development. During the past year the movement initiated by Commissioner Alder at the Associated Boards convention had been very successful.

Mr. Warner outlined the various other matters that had been taken up by the associated boards, some of which had met with success and others of which had not. He was glad to see the advent of better times and believed conditions would continue to improve.

Addresses were made by Captain Colthurst, M. P. McCaffery, W. L. Armstrong, George Ogston and Commissioner W. J. Alder. Officers chosen for next year were President J. W. H. Day of Vanderhoof and Vice-President W. L. Armstrong of Prince George and it was decided tentatively that the next meeting should be in Prince George.

HIGHWAY TO ALASKA

The United States has been turning attention of late to Alaska. That territory is closer to Asia than any other American territory and it is wholly without defences. Also it is cut off from the United States by a big chunk of Canadian territory in the province of British Columbia. To connect Fairbanks with the States by road would mean the building of a thousand miles through British Columbia and the Yukon Territory of Canada and two hundred miles in Alaska. The cost of the Canadian part would be more than five times that in Alaska because it is more difficult to build.

Canada would like to build the Alaska highway but cannot afford to do so. Many other highways are more important to Canada and its treasury is empty. It is suggested that the United States should build the road through Canada but that would give them a vested interest in Canada which is considered objectionable. Must we then let Alaska go without highway connection with the country of which she is a part?

Here is a case where statesmen of the two neighboring countries ought to be able to get together and overcome all trivial difficulties. Alaska wants the road. There is no doubt about that. It has been intimated that the United States authorities would like to have the road built and would be willing to pay for it. Canada would like the road to be built but cannot afford to put so much money in a project primarily to benefit a neighboring country. The United States President and the Prime Minister of Canada ought to be able to get together on this project and make some arrangement which would enable the road to be built without crippling Canada or the province of British Columbia financially and without endangering the territorial integrity of Canada. The highway is needed as a defence measure for the United States and for the development of the territory and undoubtedly it would also benefit Canada.

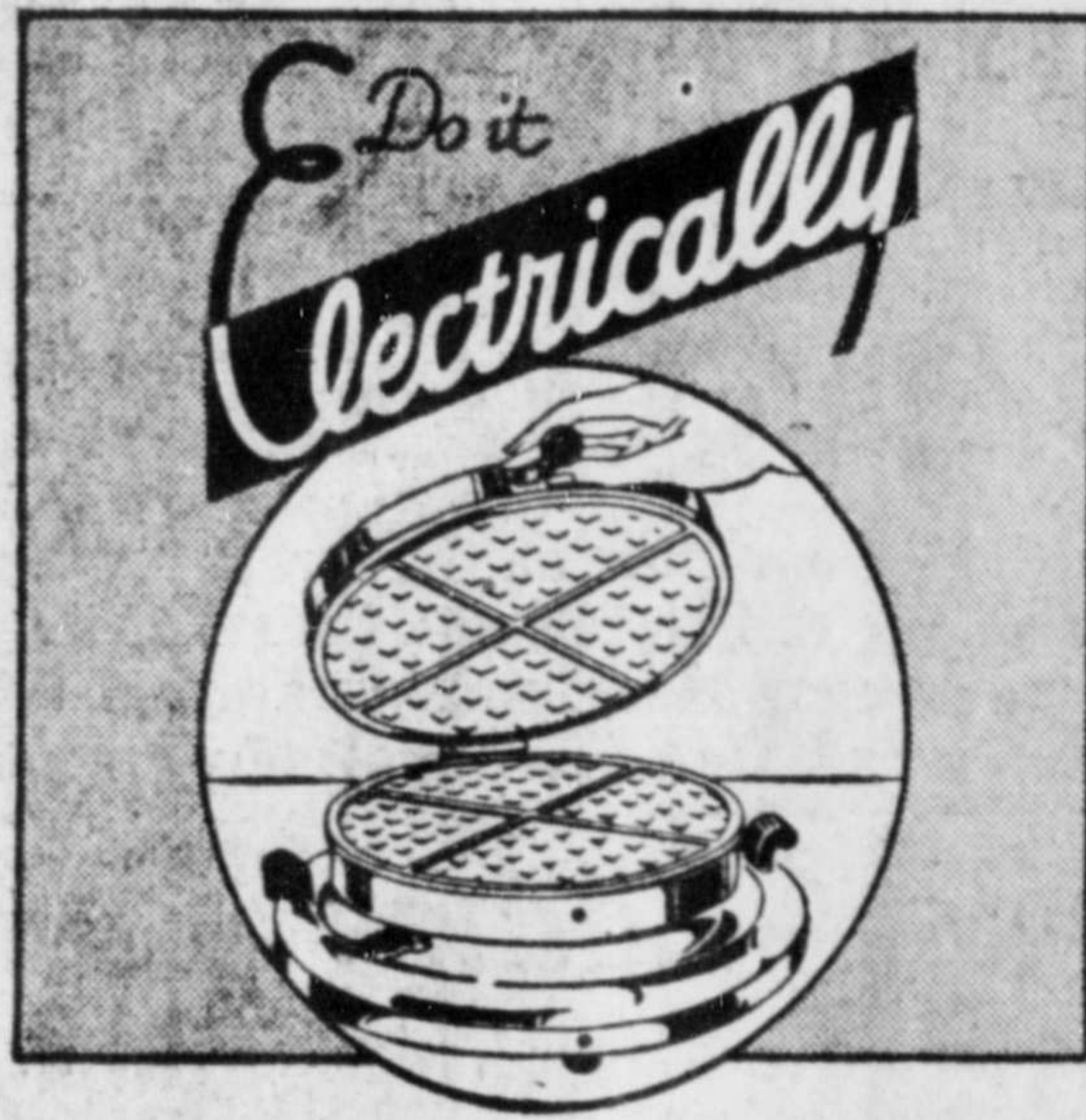

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

The United States Navy mine sweepers Avocet and Sandpiper, now in port, each carries four officers and sixty men. The Avocet was at Seal Cove yesterday planting buoys to be used in the mooring of the visiting United States aircraft. The mine sweepers are also on their way south, the Avocet being bound for Portland and the Sandpiper for Seattle. Capt. Robbins and Lieut. Blodgett paid an official call yesterday morning on City Commissioner W. J. Alder who returned the amenity this morning following the arrival here with the planes yesterday afternoon of Lieut. Commander Shoemaker, ranking officer of the entire expedition.

Delayed by having had to load canned salmon in the Naas River, Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, returned to port at 6:15 last evening from Anyox. Stewart and other northern points and sailed about an hour later for Vancouver and waypoints.

A marked falling off in the run of cohoes at North Island is reported during the past week. Trollers are commencing to drift away from there after one of the best fishing seasons in recent years. The Skidegate native fleet is leaving for Skidegate Inlet. Few, if any, pinks are running in Massett Inlet and it is beginning to appear that the run there is going to be a failure this year despite the fact that it had been expected there would be a good run and all preparations had been made for it.

The second salmon cannery in the northern part of Prince Rupert district to close down for the 1934 season, the Anglo-British Columbia Packing Co.'s plant at Arrandale on the Naas River ceased operations at the end of the week, a large number of crew members passing through Prince Rupert aboard the steamer Catala last evening bound for Vancouver. The B. C. Packers plant at Mill Bay is to close down this week-end. The Canadian Fishing Co.'s cannery at Wales Island will be the last plant in the Naas River area to remain in operation this year.
