House of Commons Rejects Resolution Opposing Them

OTTAWA, March 15: (CP)-By a vote of 130 to 94, the House of Commons yesterday defeated a motion which would have restrained Premier Bennett from continuing the practice of recommending to the King the granting of titles and honors to Canadians.

Two Conservatives joined with Liberals, Progressives and United Farmers in supporting the motion, the division on which was, otherwise, largely along straight party lines.
