## "WORK AND WAGES" STILL LIVE ISSUE

## ROOSEVELT NOW REFUSES TO LET WATERWAY PLAN DIE

### Want of Confidence Motion In Pattullo Government Rejected In Legislature by Big Margin

If Dominion Fails to Lend Aid to Allay Unemployment Situation, Province Will Adopt Other Ways and Means, Premier Declares Before House

VICTORIA, March 15: (CP)—A C. C. F. motion of want of confidence in the Pattullo government regretting failure of the budget to give due consideration to the promise of "work and wages" was beaten by a vote of 34 to 11 in the Legislature yesterday. The motion was moved by Rev. Robert Connell, Leader of the Opposition. H. E. Winch, Vancouver East, and R. B. Swales, Delta, both C. C. F. members, led the attack upon the government for its alleged failure to provide adequate relief for the unemployed.

### APPEAL IS DISMISSED

Assessed Valuation of Important City Corner Sustained By Judge Fisher in County Court

Judge W. E. Fisher, in County Court this morning, dismissed the appeal of Ex-Mayor C. H. Orme against a valuation of \$13,380 placed in the civic assessment roll on the double corner of Third Avenue and Fulton Street (land only), allowing the valuation to stand. Hearing of this appeal had taken up the entire time of the court on Tuesday and Wednesday, argument of counsel being heard yesterday afternoon following the conclusion of evidence.

After the Orme appeal had been disposed of, the court proceeded with the hearing of an appeal of Emerson & Hyde.

T. W. Brown is acting as counsel for the various appellants. City Solicitor E. F. Jones and L. W. Patmore are appearing for the city.

### Parliament Dissolution Soon Is Seen

OTTAWA, March 15:—Action of the United States Senate yesterday in rejecting the St. Lawrence seaway treaty which had been negotiated by Premier R. B. Bennett with the United States was entirely out of line with diplomatic advice; it is stated here, and the position now is that the government is headed for an earlier dissolution of Parliament than had been contemplated. It is not expected now that Parliament will take immediate steps to ratify the treaty. The next move, it is felt, is up to the United States.

Premier Pattullo reiterated a previous declaration that the government was moving to make good its pledge in regard to work and wages and stated that important plans in this regard would be announced in the near future.

"If this province controlled credit and currency I assure you we would not be waiting around," said Premier Pattullo. "We would go right ahead now. If the time comes when we are not able to make arrangements with the Dominion government we will have to adopt other ways and means and this government will present measures to meet this situation."

The program of "work and wages" was already in progress, the Premier declared, instancing legislation now before the House.

Members of the C. C. F., Mr. Pattullo asserted, were dropping their utopian ideas and, after a few weeks in the Legislature, were making moves purely for the purpose of gaining party kudos. He advised the Leader of the Opposition to remain calm and not get excited.

McGeer in Opposition In the division, G. G. McGeer, Liberal, Vancouver-Burrard, joined with the C. C. F. members and Independents in voting against the government.

C. S. Leary, Liberal member for Kaslo-Slocan, in a fighting speech denounced socialism but called upon the government to institute drastic economic and social reforms.

### REQUEST OF MERCHANTS

Protection Against Chain Stores Sought by Big Delegation at Victoria

VICTORIA, March 15: (CP)—Legislation to impose heavy licence fees on chain stores on a graduated scale reaching as high as \$1000 per store per year depending on the number of stores operated by any single organization was sought yesterday from the government by a delegation of fifty retail merchants.

Premier Pattullo stated that the matter of chain store competition was already under consideration and the government was in sympathy with the position of the merchants.

### In Spain Too, Spirit of Unrest is Abroad In The Land

### Seaway Project Will Be Brought Up Again By President of U.S.

Incensed at Failure of Senate to Ratify Agreement—Fight Has Only Begun, Declares Senator Robert LaFollette

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 15:—Incensed at the action of the Senate, particularly its Democratic members, in failing to ratify the St. Lawrence waterways treaty with Canada, President Franklin D. Roosevelt declared last night that he intended to bring the matter up again. Senator Robert LaFollette of Wisconsin, one of the principal proponents of the treaty, declared that the fight was only beginning. He expressed the hope that some generally acceptable plan would be devised to bring the project to fruition.

### Ontario Women Seriously Hurt In Motor Smash

BOWMANVILLE, Ont., March 15:—Mrs. E. James and Mrs. P. C. McGuire have been taken to hospital here as a result of serious injuries sustained in a motor crash.

### Moving Picture House In Far North of B.C.

HUDSON'S HOPE, Peace River Block, March 15:—The first moving picture theatre here has been opened and is getting good patronage.

### BIG JAPANESE DEFENCE PROGRAM IS APPROVED

TOKYO, March 15:—The House of Peers in the Imperial Japanese Diet has approved unconditionally the \$612,000,000 government budget including the largest peacetime appropriations ever made for national defence.

### SAYS BEEF PRICE LOW

Ashcroft Ranchers Request Government to Protect Product From That of Alberta

VICTORIA, March 15: (CP)—G. H. Chataway, on behalf of the Ashcroft Ranchers' Association, charged yesterday that "dumping" of low grade Alberta beef in British Columbia had depressed prices of British Columbia beef below figures profitable to the growers. He asked the select committee of the Legislature on agriculture to support a meat tax to protect British Columbia producers.

### Budget After Easter Recess

OTTAWA, March 15:—Premier R. B. Bennett announced that the budget will be brought down immediately after the Easter recess.

### TITLES ARE APPROVED

House of Commons Rejects Resolution Opposing Them

OTTAWA, March 15: (CP)—By a vote of 130 to 94, the House of Commons yesterday defeated a motion which would have restrained Premier Bennett from continuing the practice of recommending to the King the granting of titles and honors to Canadians.

Two Conservatives joined with Liberals, Progressives and United Farmers in supporting the motion, the division on which was, otherwise, largely along straight party lines.

Premier Bennett defended titles on the ground that they were a recognition by the state of public services. Why the people should fear creation of class distinction by this means he failed to understand. To say that all people were equal was to say something that was not true. Equal ability had not been given to all people.

### Another Dull Day On Stock Exchange

NEW YORK, March 15:—Railway, utilities and specialty shares rallied quietly on the New York Stock Exchange yesterday but the general list remained little changed in dull trading at the close.

### PLANNING BIG PACK

Pacific American Fisheries to Operate on Larger Scale in Alaska This Year

BELLINGHAM, Wash., March 15: (CP)—The Pacific American Fisheries will exceed its 1933 activities by operating nine salmon canneries in Alaska and its Bellingham plant during the 1934 salmon canning season. The company expects a pack of between 600,000 and 700,000 cases.

### MANY DIE IN BLAST

At Least 150 Men Killed in Explosion at La Libertad in Salvador

NEW YORK, March 15: (CP)—At least 150 men were killed in a dynamite explosion at La Libertad, San Salvador, according to a message received here yesterday afternoon. Two hundred and fifty boxes of dynamite blew up on the dock of the All American Cable Co. Many others were injured and the entire town was virtually destroyed. 250 houses being wrecked.

### TO PROBE TOBACCO

Scope of Price Spreads Committee To Be Increased—Alberta Witness Is Heard

OTTAWA, March 15—Hon. H. H. Stevens, minister of trade and commerce, intimated yesterday that the Parliamentary investigation into price spreads and mass buying over which he is presiding will be enlarged to include the tobacco situation and the rubber industry.

A. C. MacKay, secretary of the Alberta Retail Merchants' Association, told the committee yesterday that large packing companies are compelled to make rebate to chain stores on the basis of yearly business. A "prepared list" of rubber companies was alleged by Mr. MacKay.

### BANDIT TO BE LASHED

Hamilton Man, Who Started Out as Chicken Thief, Gets Five Years And Ten Strokes

HAMILTON, Ont., March 15:—John Hurst, who started his criminal career as a chicken thief, was sentenced yesterday by Magistrate Burbridge to five years in penitentiary and ten lashes for two armed robberies.

### BOARD HAS OVERDRAWN

Million Dollar Check For Ontario Government Leaves Liquor Administration Short

TORONTO, March 15:—The comptroller of the Liquor Control Board of Ontario has informed the Legislature that, at the end of the fiscal year when a \$1,525,000 check was drawn in favor of the province, the board had an overdraft of \$434,508 at the Canadian Bank of Commerce.

### Exchange Rates at New York-Montreal

MONTREAL, March 15:—The British pound sterling was trading at \$3 10 1-4 on the local Foreign Exchange market yesterday while the American dollar was quoted at \$1.00 1-32.

NEW YORK, March 15:—The price of the British pound sterling here yesterday afternoon was \$5.10 1-4 and the Canadian dollar for the third day was at \$1.00 even.

### DOES NOT MEAN MUCH

Premier Bennett Critical of Wheat Agreement—Russian Signature Is Essential

OTTAWA, March 15:—Premier R. B. Bennett told the House of Commons yesterday that the international wheat agreement reached at London last summer does not mean what it says and, unless and until Russia becomes a signatory, it may not mean anything at all.

#### A WEAK EXCUSE

Because men are not equal it is our duty and privilege to accentuate the inequality. Those were not the words used by Premier Bennett in defending the granting of titles but it was the only inference to be taken from his weak excuse offered to the members of the House of Commons and the people of the country yesterday.

Premier Bennett has many admirable qualities. He was the right man in the right place at the right time, according to those who believe in the old method of letting nature take its course. He has been an able exponent of the primitive law of the survival of the fittest.

In spite of any protests that are made to the contrary the mass of the people will believe that the Premier's motive in bringing back titles is that he may get his reward from his grateful King and country when he decides to hand over the reins of office to his successor. Perhaps it is unfair to impute motives but they are being imputed by the man on the street every day.

It is true that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Robert Borden, two former Premiers, accepted titular honors but Sir Wilfrid was something of an aristocrat and leader of a Liberalism which would be out of date today, while Sir Robert was a Liberal by nature but a Conservative by education and the whimsicality of fate. He took the title because it was the custom to do so. Neither Sir Wilfrid or Sir Robert were adorned by the knighthoods they accepted. They needed no adornment.

Mr. Bennett, it is whispered, will not be satisfied with any mere knighthood. He is said to aspire to some hereditary honor such as that of baron, earl, marquis or possibly count. His enemies say he will "take the count" all right, but they are Liberals who say that or possibly "those horrid C. C. F.'s."

#### ADOPTING PARTY METHODS

During the last election there was a great deal of talk about non-party candidates and non-party methods. A number of members were elected to the Legislature on a non-party ticket. Yesterday they made a concerted attack on the government for not instituting a work and wages program although only the previous day the Premier had announced that the administration was still planning to carry out a work and wages policy. The action of the C. C. F. and the Independents in the House was of the very essence of party government. It was not an attempt to help the government but to embarrass it. It illustrates the futility, under our present system, of trying to get away from party government.

## PARLEY ON AIR MAIL

Drastic Order Made by President Roosevelt Pending Holding of Safety Conference

### Halt Called

Col. Lindbergh Again in Limelight Following Chief Executive's Action

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 15: (CP)—After moving again with characteristic abruptness by ordering the entire suspension of all air mail service by United States Army planes, President Roosevelt is now working to put the service on a less risky basis. It is expected that the service may be resumed on a limited scale, possibly on about one-quarter of the previous basis, within forty-eight hours. Meanwhile at a conference between officials of the United States Army and postal departments on the whole subject of air mail service it was decided to call in expert advice with a view to arranging a system which will reduce the risk of fliers' lives.

During the past three weeks since the air mail service of the country was turned over to the Army following the suspension of the contracts of private companies, no less than ten fliers have lost their lives, this having actuated the President on Saturday to reduce the scope of the service which was followed by the order suspending it entirely for the time being.

#### Lindbergh Declines

Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, who has been looming prominently recently in the discussion of air mail service following his criticism of the administration's action in cancelling the contracts of private companies, had no comment to make to newspapermen in regard to the order of President Roosevelt entirely suspending the service but he is understood to be in agreement with the wisdom of the order until such time as there has been a revision of routes in the interest of safety of the fliers.

Col. Lindbergh was to be called in by the government as a technical adviser in connection with the resumption of the air mail service but it was announced yesterday that he had refused to serve on a special committee to inquire into the capacity of the United States Army planes and fliers to fly the mails.

"I believe that the use of the Army Air Corps to carry air mail is unwarranted and contrary to American principles," Col. Lindbergh telegraphed to Secretary of War Dern from New York.

#### SILVER AND COPPER ON NEW YORK MART

NEW YORK, March 15: (CP)—Bar silver closed at 46 3/4c per ounce on the local metal market yesterday. Copper closed at 8c per pound. Today's silver price was 45 1/2c.

## BONUS BILL IS PASSED

Greenback Measure Gets Through U. S. House But May Not Get By Senate

### GETS THIRTY DAYS

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 15:—Over the opposition of administration leaders, the House of Representatives has passed the bill providing for the issuance of \$2,400,000,000 of greenback currency for the payment of soldiers' bonuses by a vote of 295 to 125. It is doubtful, however, whether the veterans will ever receive the money as it is believed that the bill will be rejected by the Senate and, in any case, President Franklin D. Roosevelt has already announced that he will veto it in the event of it reaching him for signature.

## PRESIDENT OF LEGION

General Alex Ross of Yorkton, Sask., Succeeds Major J. S. Roper

OTTAWA, March 15: (CP)—Brigadier Alex Ross of Yorkton, Sask., was elected Dominion president of the Canadian Legion last night succeeding Major J. S. Roper of Halifax.

Lieutenant General Sir Percy Lake becomes Grand President, filling the vacancy caused by the death of Sir Arthur Currie.

Col. W. W. Foster of Vancouver is first vice-president.

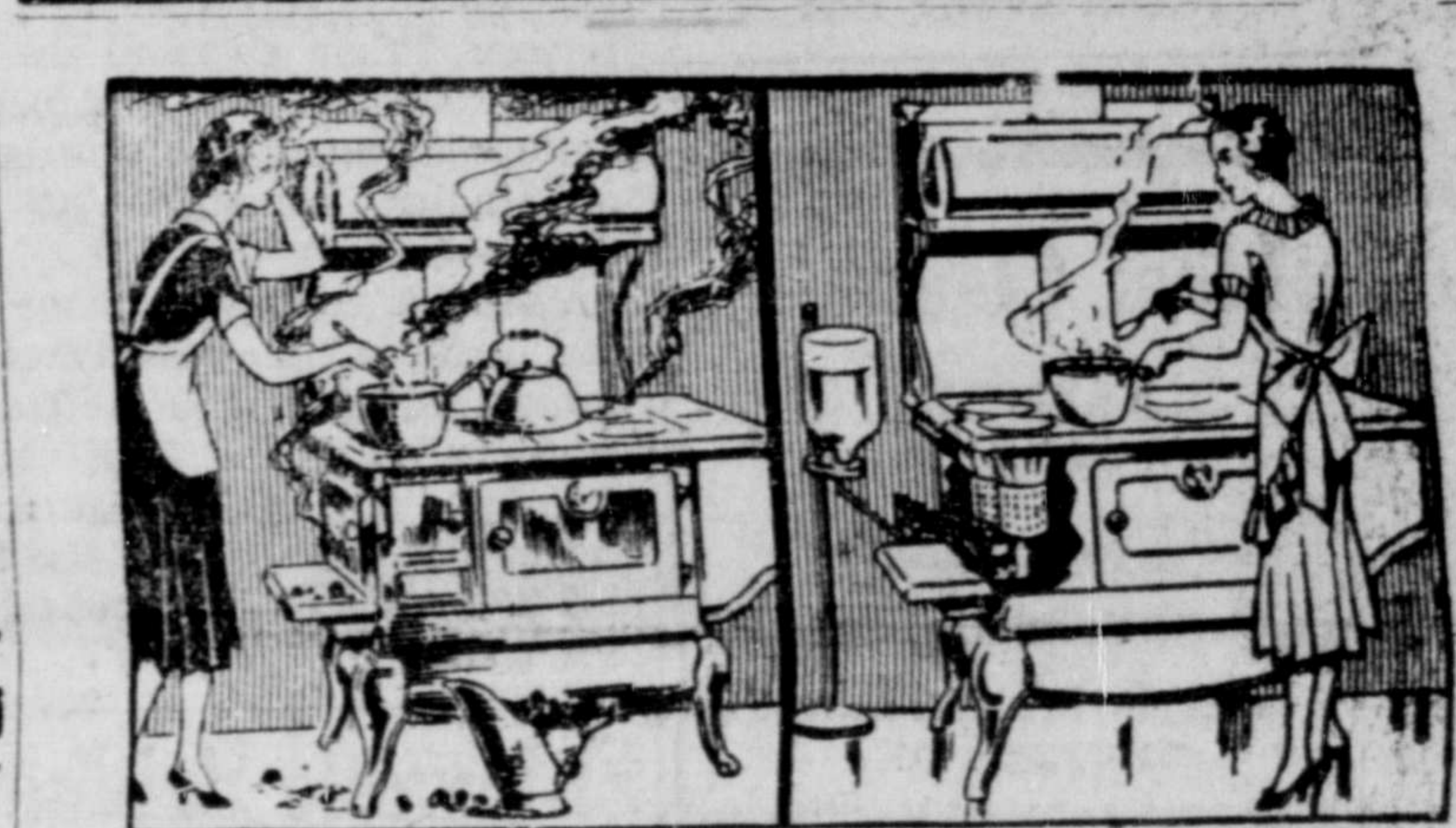

**SON NEW MARQUE**

Lord Aberdeen, Former Governor-General of Canada, Was a Turquoise Member of Parliament

**Held High Office**

With His Wife Was Known for Most Democratic Nobility

**EDINBURGH, Scotland.**

The Marquis of Aberdeen, the Earl of Aberdeen, was the first of his name to hold the office of Governor-General of Canada, who died at the age of eighty-seven years. He was succeeded in the title by the Earl of Haddo.

Nearly six decades of public life, including several high offices, marked the long life of Campbell Hamilton-Gordon, the first Marquis of Aberdeen and Earl of Aberdeen, who was a former Governor-General of Canada, twice Lord Lieutenant of Ireland and twice High Commissioner of the Church of Scotland.

A contemporary of Gladstone, who clung tenaciously to the idealism of the great Victorian age and it was his second appointment as Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, confirmed by King Edward only after misgivings.

Lord Aberdeen was a liberal in daily life. Twice his domestic tendencies and those of his wife were the subject of court intrigues, the first by Queen Victoria and the second at the suggestion of King Edward, both for court etiquette and maintenance of "position," particularly by peers who acted in regal or capricious.

To Please The King Queen Victoria had Lord Aberdeen ascertain whether or not the Aberdeens could be made a week in the servants' hall. The report was negative but he persisted into King Edward's reign and the latter also had to ensure that viceregal dinner parties were carried out in the most correct manner and that the chamberlain's rigid discipline while mingling with the servants was confined to daily blazes for family worship.

Lord Aberdeen was born on 3, 1847. He was not in the line for the earldom which was created in 1682. Instead, he went first to a brother, but a family tradition to seek a sixth earl chose to ship as a common sailor. He was drowned in the American coast in 1873, his brother John succeeding to the title.

In 1877 the earl married Isabel Maria Majoribanks, the eldest daughter of the first Duke of Tweedmouth. Their marriage was life-long and notable for interdependence and harmony. Two sons, the Earl of Haddo, succeeded to the title, and Lord Dundee, commander of a battalion of Gordon Highlanders in the First World War, and a daughter, who was the first Lord Pentlands, were born to them.

**WHAT IS HOME WITHOUT A GARDEN?**

**BUY SEEDS NOW**

The local stores are full of vegetable and flower seeds and a good many stores also carry standard lines of fertilizer, all of which are useful for this season of the year. Seeds should be purchased as soon as possible in order to make sure of getting exactly what is needed. Garden tools are on display in most of the hardware stores and there is plenty of variety. Every gardener needs a spade or shovel suitable for digging, a rake for taking off weeds and making the soil fine before sowing and a hoe for weeding and also for loosening up the soil. Many other tools are very handy and help the gardener in his work. People with lawns will require some kind of clipper for keeping the edges neat. Mowers need overhauling and grinding. If the mower cuts well the mowing is much lighter and the lawn looks much neater.

**SOW FLOWER SEEDS**

Those not planning to buy their seedlings this year should sow in boxes within the next week or two. This should insure strong plants before the middle or end of May when they are planted outside in the beds. Only a few varieties such as pansies should be planted out before that time. Frost or even snow is liable to come at any time in April. People who want only a dozen seedlings of one kind would be better advised to purchase them when needed. Some seeds can be sown in the open in April but it is usually a great advantage to sow

indoors. The growing season is not very long and it is well to get off to a good start.

**MANY STANDARD VARIETIES**

Some one asks what seeds they should sow in order to get best results in Prince Rupert. In reply it is suggested that stocks and asters usually do well. Marigolds, Scotch, French and African, usually give good fall bloom. For edges of beds there is nothing like the old fashioned blue lobelia. Such flowers as Canterbury bells, forget-me-nots, foxglove, honesty and in fact all the perennials and biennials have to be sown a year ahead. No gardener depends wholly on annuals.

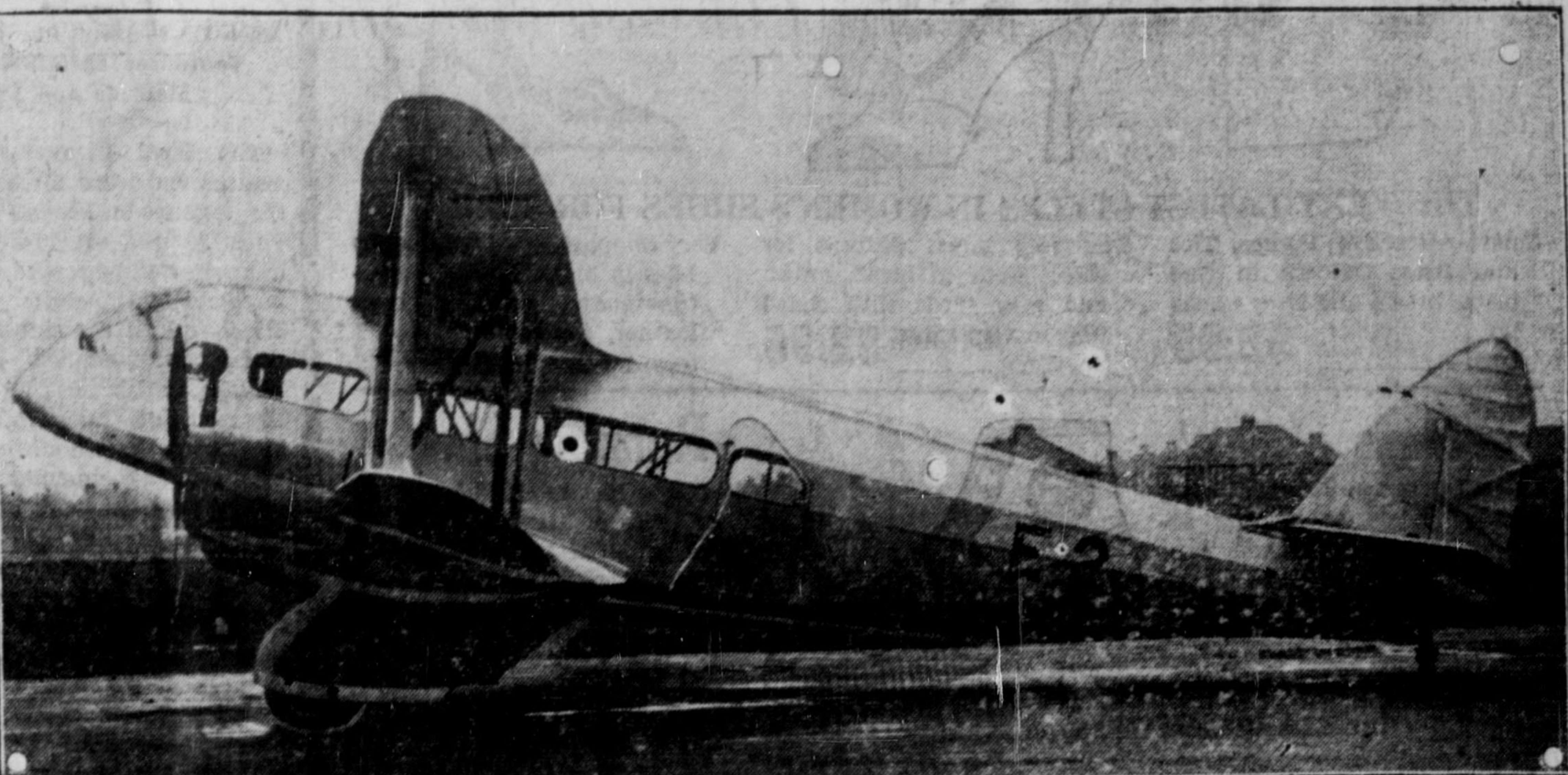
