PROBE INTO ARMAMENTS

British Labor Party to Demand Investigation of Washington Revelations

LONDON, Sept. 13.—The British Labor Party announces that the United States Senate's commission of inquiry into the activities of armament firms is producing a mass of evidence which no government, least of all the British government, can ignore.

GENEVA TO INVESTIGATE GENEVA, Sept. 13.—Revelations of the United States Senate investigation of private manufacture of armaments are expected to induce Rt. Hon. Arthur Henderson, president of the disarmament conference, to call a meeting in October of the disarmament committee on private manufacture of war materials.

SECRET BUREAU IN SPAIN MADRID, Spain, Sept. 13.—Discovery of a secret munitions depot, comprising over 176,000 cartridges in Oviedo-Provence, is announced by the minister of the interior.

PROFITS IN MUNITIONS WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 13: (CP)—It was revealed at the Senate investigation into armament manufacture yesterday that between the years 1914 and 1918 during the Great War the business of the Dupont Co. had amounted to a billion and a quarter dollars, being \$265,000,000 in 1914 alone.

While on its way from Alaska to Seattle, the small American cannery tender Slaven struck a reef off Kumeleon Inlet in Grenville Channel, south of Prince Rupert, early Wednesday morning and sank, according to word reaching here today.

Capt. W. P. Armour, manager of the Pacific Salvage Co., left here this morning with the power tug Pachena for Kumeleon Inlet to investigate the possibility of salvage.

GOING TO DRY DOCK

Steamer Prince John to be Overhauled at Local Yard Before Resuming Service

C. N. R. steamer Prince John, Capt. William Gleeson, which arrived in port Tuesday morning from the south, having called at Jedway and Atli Inlet, Queen Charlotte Islands, on the way north to discharge freight, unloaded a cargo of lumber for the dry dock and Albert & McCaffery here and, unless orders to proceed out on further freighting come, will move into the local dry dock to undergo overhaul preparatory to resuming regular service towards the end of this month on the Queen Charlotte Island run between here and Vancouver in place of the Prince Charles which has been on the route during the summer.

ASSIZE IS IN SESSION

Smithers Case, in Which Sowing of Noxious Weeds is Charged, Now Proceeding

With two criminal cases and one divorce petition comprising the list, the fall session of the Supreme Court Assizes in Prince Rupert opened this morning with Mr. Justice J. A. McDonald presiding. Immediately following the opening of the court, trial of Shannon von Elst of Evelyn on a charge of willfully damaging by night on May 12 the farm of a neighbor, James Owen, to the amount of about \$150 by sowing noxious weeds thereon commenced and is proceeding this afternoon.

In summarizing the case for the crown at the opening of the trial, Mr. Patmore told the jury that evidence would be adduced to show that Owen had ploughed and harrowed his land and a couple of days later had started to seed it.

Both Grit and Tory Leaders Concentrate On Five By-elections

Mackenzie King Will Speak in All Ridings, Starting With Kenora-Rainy River—Manion and Stevens Leading Government Forces

OTTAWA, Sept. 13: (CP)—Outstanding leaders of the two major political parties will concentrate on the federal by-elections which will be held a week from next Monday in five Ontario ridings—Kenora-Rainy River, Elgin West, Toronto East, North York and Frontenac-Addington. Starting in Kenora, Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, Liberal leader, will speak in all ridings.

WAGE RATE CRITICIZED

Trades and Labor Congress Feels That Minimum Scales Being Established Are Not Adequate

TORONTO, September 13 (Canadian Press)—Criticism of minimum wage laws was voiced at the annual Canadian Trades and Labor Congress here when John W. Bruce of Toronto declared that labor would be faced with the problem of governments laying down standards "on which you, without any voice in establishing those standards, will have to base your minimum wages."

Recently, said Mr. Bruce, the British Columbia Industrial Relations Board had set a rate of \$15 weekly for barbers, this being fifty per cent lower than the scale established by union men.

Percy R. Bengough, of Vancouver vice-president of the Congress, said he was extremely disappointed in British Columbia where he said the standard of wages had been set too low to stimulate buying power.

SNOWFALL ALL OVER

High Mountain Tops Hereabouts Get First Capping—Low on Interior Mounts—Harvest Interrupted

EDMONTON, Sept. 13: (CP)—Snow was falling here yesterday. There was also snow throughout the Peace River country and at Fort St. John, B.C. harvesting was indefinitely postponed.

First new snow of the season was observed yesterday morning on some of the higher mountains to the north of Prince Rupert. Arrivals from the interior reported snow low down on the slopes of Rocher de Boule Mountain at Hazelton.

KINGSTON, Ont., Sept. 13: (CP)—Rev. Richard Roberts D. D. of Toronto was elected moderator of the United Church of Canada today.

#### PREMIER PATTULLO'S VISIT

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Prime Minister of British Columbia and Member of the Legislative Assembly for Prince Rupert, will be doubly welcome in Prince Rupert tomorrow—from a public standpoint as member for this seat and premier of the province and personally among his numerous friends and admirers. His visit, we understand, will, perforce, be somewhat abbreviated on account of pressure of public duties in the capital which, particularly in these times, are diversified and important. That the day or so he spends here will be busy ones are certain. There are a number of public matters to be taken up with him by various local organizations and he has already accepted two speaking engagements including a Chamber of Commerce dinner tomorrow evening.

Possibly, the premier may have some interesting announcements to make although there has been no official intimation to that effect.

It will be Mr. Pattullo's second visit to the city since becoming premier. However, the first visit, one a few months ago, it will be remembered, was marred by a painful indisposition from which he is now understood to be completely recovered.

At times some may think it would be desirable if the premier could find the time to visit us more frequently. However, it is not likely that very many of us, if it came down to it, would ask him to relinquish the important posts he has held in the affairs of the province ever since we first elected him as our member of the legislature in 1916 in order to come back as a private member and live among us, such as we might like to have him here from the personal standpoint. After all, we elected him to represent us at Victoria and not in Prince Rupert. The fact that he has been demanded for a provincial rather than a local leader should not hamper our local interests one whit. In fact, many of his friends are convinced that Mr. Pattullo is destined some day to become a national leader. Who knows?

One thing we all know is that Mr. Pattullo, throughout the years he has been our member, has had the affairs of his home riding close at hand and heart and none can say that the riding has suffered through the fact that his important duties in the sphere of provincial affairs, which have led to his now receiving the office of premier, highest in the gift of the province, have made it impossible for him to make his home here.

Technical skill and interpretative genius in measure remarkable for one so young were displayed by Miss Marie Balagno, gifted though youthful local pianiste, in recital last night at First United Church under the auspices of the Prince Rupert Philharmonic Society. The young artist presented an ambitious and diversified program of selections not often attempted by one of such few years and she acquitted herself so splendidly that an ovation was given by an audience which practically filled the auditorium of the church.

While Miss Balagno's remarkable technique and fingering ability was outstanding, her touch, control and tone left nothing to be desired by the more discerning. She, unquestionably, has a great musical career in store. Her attainments are now such that she must turn to the more advanced musical instructors and she leaves tonight for Victoria to take up residence for the coming year at St. Joseph's Academy where she will continue her studies.

Miss Balagno was assisted by Dr. R. Geddes Large, popular local baritone, as guest artist. Dr. Large's first selection was the virile "Toreador Song" from Carmen. The vocalist was in splendid voice and an encore was demanded. "The Fairies" being given in response. In the second section of the program, Dr. Large sang "Leetle Bateese" and, in response to another encore, offered "The Green Eyed Dragon." Charles P. Balagno was accompanist.
