TOMATOES ARE HURLED AT PREMIER

VICTORIA SAWMILL DESTROYED BY FIRE FRIDAY NIGHT

Unruly Brantford Mob Gives Ontario Prime Minister Rough Time

Huge Crowd Blocks Mr. Henry's Way and He is Forced to Leave Theatre by Back Entrance—Was Accorded Ovation by Large Gathering of Supporters

BRANTFORD, Ont., June 16: (CP)—Premier George S. Henry was spattered with tomatoes when he arrived here for a political meeting last night. An unruly crowd gathered around the Premier's party as he appeared at a theatre. The mob tossed tomatoes as Mr. Henry stepped from his car and his coat was soiled around the collar as he entered the building.

When the Premier attempted to leave the building after his address a huge crowd blocked the way and he was taken out a rear door and driven away in a friend's car. The Premier's chauffeur had arrived with a police escort and the crowd pelled the driver and car with tomatoes and eggs. The Premier's car was driven to the police station as Mr. Henry left the rear entrance in another machine. A huge crowd of followers gave Mr. Henry an ovation.

LADY GIVES C. C. F. TALK

Mrs. R. P. Steeves of Vancouver Gives Pleasing Address Before Large Audience in Moose Hall

Pastor Presides

Capitalistic System Should be Replaced by Socialization of Production, Distribution and Exchange

An exponent of Co-operative Commonwealth Federation doctrine with charming personality and firm conviction addressed a large Prince Rupert audience at the Moose Hall last night in the person of Mrs. R. P. Steeves, wife of a well known Vancouver public school principal and a defeated C. C. F. candidate in one of the ridings of the southern city in the recent provincial election. Mrs. Steeves advanced the claims of the C. C. F. creed as being the salvation of the country from the present economic crisis. Declaring that the capitalistic system was tottering to its fall and, at best, could only be temporarily patched up, Mrs. Steeves advocated the socialization of the machinery of production, distribution and exchange, at the same time encouraging personal initiative and expression in the interests of the common weal rather than from the incentive of profit in a monetary sense. She was a pleasant and lucid speaker and was accorded an attentive hearing by an audience which was appreciative of her talents as a platform speaker. Mrs. Steeves proved herself especially competent during a question period which followed her address.

The chairman of the meeting was Rev. C. D. Clarke, pastor of First United Church, whose first appearance it was on a political platform here although his name has been frequently mentioned of late in connection with political affairs locally. In brief opening remarks, Mr. Clarke said that he supposed he would draw criticism by his action in accepting the chairmanship of the meeting. He considered, however, that a minister had the right just as much as any other person to function as a citizen in public affairs if he saw fit to do so. He referred to many instances today where ministers were active in political life as candidates for all political parties. Mr. Clarke announced that he was a supporter of the C. C. F. movement as being "the nearest attempt to follow the teaching of Jesus in regard to business."

Damage of \$150,000 Is Done By Conflagration In Capital City Plant

Moore Whittington Lumber Co. Suffers Major Disaster—Between Seventy-Five and One Hundred Men Are Thrown Out of Jobs

VICTORIA, June 16: (CP)—The Moore Whittington Lumber Co.'s plant here, including sawmill, planing mill and a million feet of export timber, was destroyed by fire last night. The loss is estimated at \$150,000 on which there is understood to be partial, if not full, insurance protection. Between seventy-five and one hundred men are thrown out of employment at least temporarily.

DOMINION TRADE UP

Forty-One Percent Increase Recorded This May as Compared With Year Ago, Ottawa Announces

OTTAWA, June 16: (CP)—Canada's foreign trade bounded upward forty-one percent in May as compared with the same month a year ago, Minister of National Revenue Matthews announced yesterday. During the month exports and imports had a value of \$110,800,000 as compared with \$78,500,000 a year ago. Revenues for May increased by \$7,300,000, making an April-May increase of \$11,000,000. Both customs duties and excise taxes are up more than \$3,000,000.

AMERICAN GIRLS WIN

British Lasses Lose Four Matches to Two in Wightman Cup Tennis

WIMBLEDON, Eng., June 16: (CP)—Two singles victories today gave the United States the Wightman tennis cup for the fourth straight season. The British girls managed to win one doubles and a singles match against four singles for the Americans. Yesterday Helen Jacobs defeated Helen Scriven and Sarah Palfrey won over Dorothy Round.

ACCORD ON ARMAMENTS

Mussolini and Hitler Said to Have Reached Agreement at Conference in Venice

VENICE, June 16:—Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy and Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany were reported yesterday to have reached an agreement on the question of armaments. It was said that Mussolini was willing to permit equality to Germany.

R. L. Davis of Vancouver Taking Charge at Tranquille Following Recent Investigation

VICTORIA, June 15: (CP)—R. L. Davis, former assistant professor of animal husbandry at the University of British Columbia, has been appointed manager of the farm at Tranquille Sanitarium, succeeding William Jackson. The change follows a recent investigation into the operations of the institution.

PRIMO IN HOSPITAL

Former World's Heavyweight Boxing Champion Badly Messed Up by Max Baer

NEW YORK, June 16:—Primo Carnera, defeated world's heavyweight boxing champion, entered hospital here yesterday for treatment for injuries sustained in the title bout Thursday night when he lost his crown to Max Baer. In addition to cuts, bruises and a general shaking up, Carnera is suffering from sprained ankle tendons as a result of one of his falls.

KILLED IN ACCIDENT

Dennis Snow, Bella Coola Indian, Loses His Life While Hand Logging at Bentinck Arm

District headquarters of the provincial police here have been advised of the death as a result of an accident on the morning of June 9 on the west side of the mouth of South Bentinck Arm where he was engaged in land logging of Dennis Snow, a Bella Coola Indian. Snow and a number of other Indians were working together and were rolling a log down a hill. The point became lodged in the ground and, as the log skidded, deceased was caught between the log and a stump, his chest and shoulders being badly crushed. He died while being taken to the Bella Coola hospital.

An inquest was held by Coroner G. H. Hill of Ocean Falls who determined that death was accidental.

man personality." Mrs. G. W. Rudderham was also on the platform although she did not speak.

Mrs. Steeves

The present, Mrs. Steeves said, was an era of unnecessary fear. Practically all persons were beset by big, bad wolves of fear—phantoms and ideas set up by the vested interests.

There was actually no scarcity in the world today, to the contrary, the world had come to the golden age of plenty which the prophets and the seers of old had foretold. The economic plan, however, was still based on the economy of scarcity. What was needed now was a scientific revolution in the realm of ideas—the plan must be changed to fit in with the new condition of plenty.

The day of the export market was gone, declared Mrs. Steeves. "Today we must think of expanding purchasing power." Economic warfare led to military warfare. The world was again moving in that direction today.

The C. C. F. stood for socialization of the machinery of production, distribution and exchange so that people would be able to throw off their present economic shackles, discontinue paying tribute to the few profit takers of the owning group and have and enjoy more private property.

Opposed to Fascism Mrs. Steeves was no supporter of Fascism under which, she declared, standards of living were the lowest in the world with all democratic rights being lost.

WATERFRONT WHIFFS
 Alaska Fishermen on Strike—Halibut Landings Here—Opening of Salmon Canning Season

Alaska salmon fishermen, following receipt of a communication signed jointly by the principal fish buying companies announcing a reduction to 5c per pound in the minimum price to be paid for white chinook and silver salmon effective June 17, have decided to go on strike, all boats fishing to be put on the unfair list. The Alaska Packers' Association has decided to co-operate by refusing to handle non-union fish. Report was received from a committee at Ketchikan which had interviewed company representatives who announced they had no authority in the matter.

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the 1934 season up to and including yesterday had totalled 6,615,065 pounds as compared with 6,190,600 pounds at a corresponding date last year. Canadian landings for this year had reached a total of 31,151,065 pounds in comparison with last year's 2,736,800 pounds while the American total was 3,464,000 pounds as against 3,453,800 pounds in 1933. For the week ending yesterday landings amounted to 403,000 pounds of which 198,000 pounds was from seventeen Canadian boats and 205,000 pounds from thirteen American vessels. Prices during the week were inclined to the weak side with the top price for Canadian fish 5.9c and 5c which the Kalen was paid for 13,000 pounds and the low 5c and 4c which the Covenant received for 20,000 pounds. For American fish the high price of the week was 9c and 5c, which the Middleton received for 23,000 pounds and the low 6.4c and 4.7c, which the McKinley was paid for 40,000 pounds.

The last week or so has seen the usual migration of Indians from Hazelton, Kitwanga and other villages in the interior of Prince Rupert district to Skeena River cannery points to take up their usual summer work in connection with the salmon packing industry. Thursday night's train alone brought no less than 206 native workers down the river. The outstanding event of the week will, of course, be the opening of the salmon canning season on the Skeena River and elsewhere in this district on Wednesday when fishing with sockeye nets becomes legal. The gill netters are now all poised to start their work and, within a day or so after fishing starts, the canneries should begin to lum. There have been ample indications of a good run of sockeye and an active demand for the better varieties than usual, operations at some of the canneries at least are expected to extend well into the fall.

The city engineering department is engaged in the laying of a new six-inch water main for a distance of about four hundred feet from the vicinity of the Royal Fish Co. plant eastward to the cold storage plant and other adjuncts of the Northern Fishermen's Co-operative establishment. It will ensure adequate fire protection for this valuable new local waterfront property as well as providing necessary water supply for the industry.

Reverting to regular schedule on the local route between Vancouver and Prince Rupert via Ocean Falls and other coast points, after having made special voyages to Alaska during the past two weeks, C.P.R. steamer Princess Adelaide, Capt. S. K. Gray, arrived in port at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon from the south and sailed at 10 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints. Late again on account of having had heavy freights to discharge at cannery points along the coast, Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Ernest Georgeson, arrived in port at 6:30 this morning from the south and sailed at 8 a.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.
