KETCHIKAN FISH PLANT DESTROYED TENSION IN SAN FRANCISCO REGION SOMEWHAT EASIER

Reduction Factory At "First City" is Wiped Out by \$30,000 Fire

Salmoil Corporation Suffers Heavy Loss as Result of Disastrous Conflagration on Sunday—Barge of Oil Saved

KETCHIKAN, July 17: (CP)—Fire on Sunday razed the Salmoil Corporation's reduction plant at Ward's Cove near here, damage being estimated at from \$25,000 to \$30,000. A barge containing one thousand barrels of salmon oil was saved. The fire occurred on the anniversary to the day of a previous fire which wiped out a similar plant on the same site some years ago.

VIEW OF PREMIER

Province Cannot Operate With Reduced Federal Contribution on Relief, Says Pattullo

Going to Ottawa

Will Take up Better Terms and Pacific Great Eastern Matter Same Time

VICTORIA, July 17: (CP)—"It simply can't be done," said Premier Pattullo commenting on the announcement that Dominion contribution to direct relief would be reduced to twenty-five percent for the period July 15 to August 15.

The Premier, on receiving this notification and also an invitation to attend a Dominion-provincial conference on July 30, wired: "So far as British Columbia is concerned, it will be necessary for the Dominion government to make a larger contribution than suggested in your message for a considerably longer period. However, that can be discussed further on July 30."

Other Matters Too Also on July 30 British Columbia, it is expected, will present its plea for better terms under the Confederation pact. At the same time the Dominion will again be asked to take over the Pacific Great Eastern Railway.

Premier Pattullo and Attorney General Gordon Sloan will be going to Ottawa, it is expected.

An Eastman flying boat, one of a fleet of five aircraft, which went into the Atlin district from Detroit a couple of years ago, was being taken south from Ketchikan to Vancouver on the deck of the steamer Prince George yesterday.

VANCOUVER, July 17: (CP)—"Task accomplished" was the message received yesterday from an Alpine Club party which ascended Mount Waddington to bury Alec Dalgleish who fell to his death on June 26 while engaged with a party of companions, including Dr. Neal Carter of Prince Rupert, in an attempt to scale the so far unconquered peak.

M'MURRAY HAS FIRE

Damage of \$150,000 Done in Business Section of Northern Alberta Town

FORT McMURRAY, Alta., July 17: (CP)—Fire here early yesterday destroyed two hotels, the Government Telegraph station and six business establishments. The loss is estimated at \$150,000.

Fall Session of Parliament Is Likely to Ratify Possible Treaty With United States, Says Hanson

A fall session for the purpose of ratifying a proposed reciprocity treaty with the United States and to receive and act on a report to be made by the Stevens Commission on price spreads is quite possible, according to Olof Hanson, federal member for this district, who arrived in the city yesterday for the first time since going to Ottawa early in the year.

OUTLOOK IMPROVED

Old Forest Products Stocks Being Cleaned Up and Future Looks Better

Old stocks of poles and piling in the central interior are now pretty well cleaned up, stated Olof Hanson, M. P. for Skeena and head of the Hanson Timber & Lumber Co., this morning and the outlook for the forest products industry is better than it has been for two or three years.

The Hanson Timber & Lumber Co. now has some one hundred men employed in its various activities in the interior.

CLASSIFY WORKLESS

Further Details of Provincial Government Plan For Dealing With Situation

VICTORIA, July 17: (CP)—Registration of British Columbia's unemployed will start July 25. Premier T. D. Pattullo announced yesterday.

VICTORIA, July 17: (CP)—Another feature of the new unemployed re-registration plan which the provincial government is contemplating putting into effect in the near future will be the classification of all unemployed according to the positions they are able to fill. This will be the foundation for an employment stimulating policy fostered by a contact man working through the relief department and surveying opportunities for jobs in the various industries.

The minister of labor, Hon. G. S. Pearson, is satisfied that the province can never solve its unemployment problem until it tackles the transient question seriously and reaches a different understanding with the Dominion.

One Hundred Thousand Workers Now Striking; Food and Cars Move

Union Ferry and Harbor Railway Employees Join Walk-out—National Guards Hold Strategic Points With Walls of Steel

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17: (CP)—While the tension was somewhat easier this morning, the general strike still clutched the trans-bay district with National Guards holding strategic points with walls of steel. Forty thousand union ferry and harbor railway workers joined the walk-out, swelling the number of strikers to more than one hundred thousand.

STRIKE IS SPREADING

General Walk-Out in Oakland Becomes Effective Today

KETCHIKAN ACTION KETCHIKAN, July 17: (CP)—Apparently fearful of another tie-up of Alaska shipping if they worked cargo on ships labelled "unfair" by United States strikers, Ketchikan longshoremen yesterday refused to work on the Standard Oil tanker Alaska Standard loading oil for southeastern Alaska canneries.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17: (CP)—The general strike of all union workers extended to Oakland today when a general walk-out there went into effect.

The general strike in San Francisco, which started yesterday following the casting of the general strike vote late Saturday by the labor committee representing all unions, entered its second day today with little sign of an immediate settlement.

Irregularity In New York Mart

Renewed Selling in Rail Issues—Some Specialties in Demand

NEW YORK, July 17:—Renewed selling of rail issues turned Saturday's trading session on the New York Stock Exchange into an irregular affair. Sugar stocks were in demand and some specialties showed strength.

Rise of wheat to the \$1 a bushel mark for the first time in several months and a campaign for a freight rate boost caused stock prices to rally somewhat over the week-end after having been dull for some time.

FLYERS ON WAY AGAIN

Fairbanks Plane Resumes Trip to Kansas City After Forced Landing at Atiyansh

AIYANSH, July 17.—The Gillman Airways of Alaska airplane, which was forced down here last Thursday night on account of rain and fog, has resumed its interrupted flight from Fairbanks to Kansas City following the making of repairs to minor damage which the machine sustained in its emergency descent.

Aboard the plane which was piloted by Howard Gillman were Mr. and Mrs. Charles Fowler of Fairbanks and T. M. Donohoe of Cordova bound for an Elks' convention in Kansas City.

The landing was made on a gravel bar in the river one mile below the telegraph office. Pilot Gillman showing considerable skill and resourcefulness in bringing the ship down under difficult conditions. A punctured tire on one of the landing wheels was the extent of the damage.

Price of Wheat Shows Strength

Moves Back in Winnipeg and Vancouver Following Lower Marks Last Week

WINNIPEG, July 17: (CP)—The wheat price had been gradually receding here since last Friday when the market advanced to 81 1/2c for July futures, 83 3/4c for October and 81 1/2c for December but it showed renewed strength today.

VANCOUVER, July 17: (CP)—Wheat was quoted at 79 5/8c on the local exchange yesterday as compared with 80 1/2c on Saturday and 79 3/4c on Friday. Today it stiffened to 81 3/8c.

EYES ON GERMANY

European Capitals Disappointed at Hitler's Failure to Discuss Foreign Affairs

LONDON, July 17.—The eyes of Europe's diplomats are now focused on Germany watching to see what the Reich will do about joining the group of security pacts which France and Russia have drafted and which Great Britain and Italy have approved.

Disappointment at Chancellor Hitler's failure to discuss the German nation's foreign policy in his speech to the Reich at the weekend was the general reaction in European capitals to his utterances.

### FEELING ENCOURAGED

The Co-operative Commonwealth Federation will feel encouraged by the result of the election at North Vancouver last week. While it is not a gain in the number of C. C. F. seats in the Legislature it is an indication that the Federation is holding its own and that the people are not satisfied with the progress made by the present administration so far.

The results of recent elections in Ontario and Saskatchewan indicate that the C. C. F. had little strength there and they evidently had little in the Maritimes. The recent election seems to show that the movement was something more than a flash in the pan in British Columbia. It indicates that people are willing to take extreme measures to let our statesmen know that they are not satisfied with conditions. It does not necessarily mean that they endorse all the policies of the C. C. F. but that they are not satisfied and have no other way of expressing their dissatisfaction.

As long as there are people out of work, businessmen struggling ineffectually against adverse conditions and workmen working part time or at very reduced wages, there is bound to be dissatisfaction. As conditions improve, there will be less of a tendency to vote for extreme parties and the C. C. F. will vanish if present day statesmen take effective steps to meet the depressions which periodically oppress us. If no effective steps are taken, and the political parties continue to carry on as in the past, the power of the C. C. F. or some similar group will increase until the present system is upset. Bold policies are necessary today. We are in a new age with a new outlook on life and we must have new political policies in keeping with the spirit of the times.

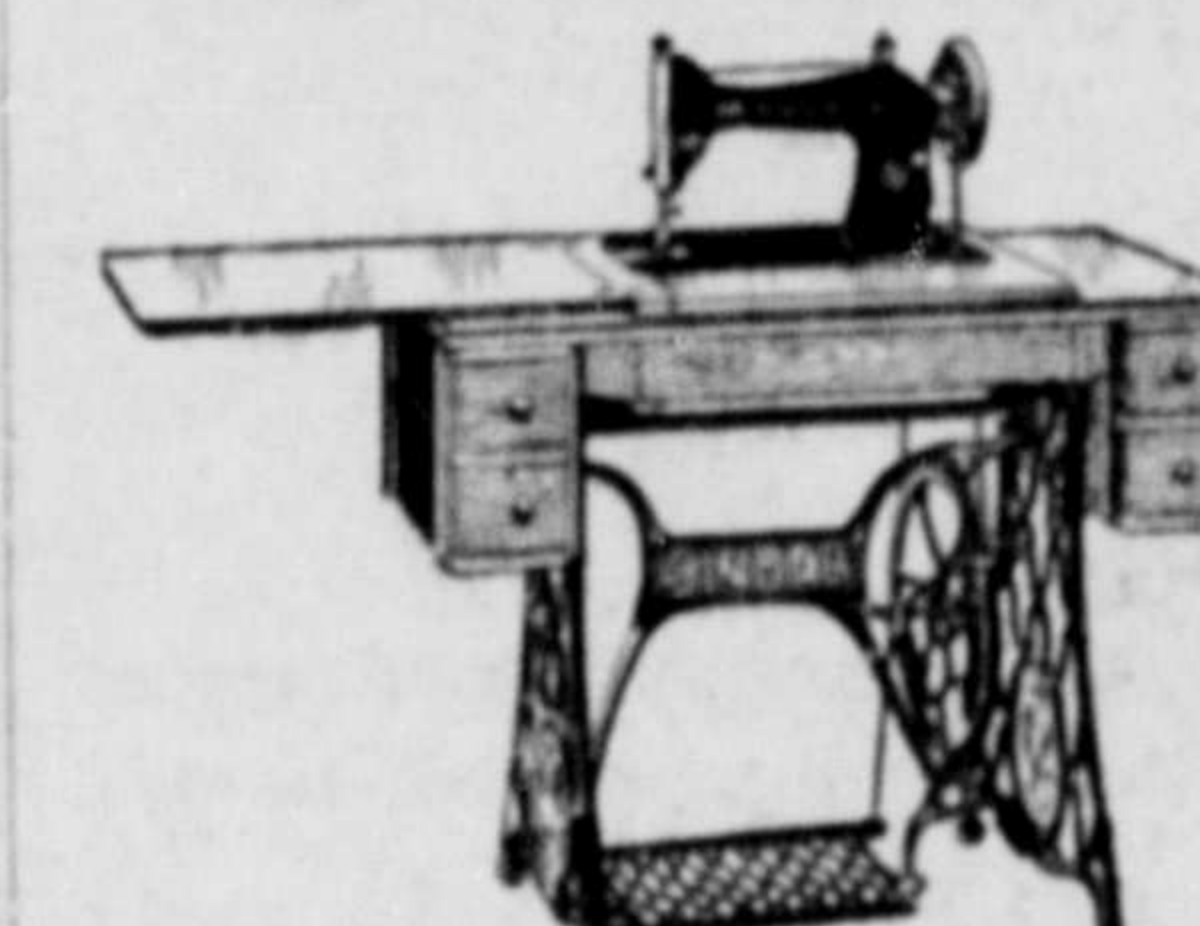
