OTTAWA, Feb. 20: (CP)-Canada stands ready to negotiate a reciprocity treaty with the United States along lines that will be fair to both countries, Premier R. B. Bennett announced last night in the House of Commons. For the past nine months informal negotiations had been carried on in Washington, the Prime Minister stated, and, when President Roosevelt was clothed with tariff bargaining power, they would continue in more concrete form.



Pennsylvania Memorial Home Scene of Pitiful Early Morning Tragedy

Elderly Invalids Had No Chance of Escaping From Blazing Institution-All Firemen Could Do Was Stand Helplessly By and Watch

BROOKVILLE, Penn., Feb. 20: (CP)-Trapped in their beds by a raging fire, ten women, ranging in age from sixty-four to ninety years, were burned to death when the infirmary of Pennsylvania Memorial Home was destroyed by fire early this morning. The victims, all widows, daughters or relatives of Civil War veterans, had no chance of escape while firemen and attendants stood helplessly by in eighteen below zero weather as flames raged through the frame building.



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

A CHANCE FOR WELSH SETTLERS

Editor, Daily News:-

Recently numerous paragraphs. have appeared in the newspapers referring to settlers coming from the Old Country as well as from various parts of Canada who have made good in the fertile valleys of British Columbia. There is a very good chance of raising sheep along the Canadian National Railway in the district between Skeena Crossing and Hazelton. Our mountainous and hilly country is most suitable for them. It is a well known fact that the Welsh farmer excels many in his special knowledge and well tried methods required for this branch of farming.

Personally, I would yery much like to see a Welsh settlement in this valley. They make splendid homesteaders. There is plenty of good land to be had on reasonable terms in the Skeena Crossing, Carnaby and South Hazelton districts. People who are here at present are doing well at ranching, gardening and cattle raising while some are raising goats. They put by plenty of garden produce which has provided them successfully with plenty of food every winter and there is every chance of continuing to do so.

The settlers in the above mentioned places are kindly and helpful to each other and would welcome newcomers. Here anyone can be sure of a good livelihood. There is every intention of making this a thriving district. There is an abundant of timber, etc., in fact, every facility for energetic men to establish comfortable homes, also barns and storehouses.

There are good schools here, also general stores and places of amusement within easy access. The villages are linked up by the main highway as well as by railroad. This neighborhood is worthy of a lengthy visit. We need more Welsh people in this part of British Co-

lumbia and we need sheep. Here indeed is plenty of room as well as a bright future.


