Upton Sinclair Heavy Favorite

Straw Vote is Predominantly For Socialist-Democrat In California

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 3.—A straw vote on the gubernatorial contest taken by a local radio station closed at the week-end, showing preponderance of ballots in favor of Upton Sinclair, the Socialist-Democrat candidate. Sinclair received 29,248 votes, Governor Merriam, Republican, 7,541 votes, and Haight, the Progressive Commonwealth candidate, 3,682 votes.

New Deal to Have Test of Its Strength Tuesday When Several Million Americans Go to Polls

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 5.—Many millions of people of the United States will go to the polls throughout the country tomorrow in the congressional elections to render their first expression of opinion on the New Deal. While there are 34 senators in as many states, 33 governors, a new House of Representatives and hundreds of other less important state officials to be elected, general interest will centre in the test of public opinion on the policies of the administration as indicated by the fate of its sponsored candidates at the polls.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCK FELT

SEATTLE, Nov. 5: (CP)—An earthquake shock was felt throughout northwestern Washington at 7 o'clock Saturday morning but no serious damage was reported. Mount Vernon, Tacoma, Bellingham and other points reported the shock which was preceded by a heavy thunderstorm accompanied by heavy rain.

Last Stage of Ocean Flight Was Completed Without Incident in Fifteen Hours, Considerably Faster Than Expected—Now Proceeding to New York After Selling Plane

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 5.—Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith and his navigator, Capt. P. G. Taylor, rested here last night following completion yesterday of their epochal eastward trans-Pacific flight from Australia to the United States, having arrived at Oakland at 7:44 yesterday morning following a hop of fourteen hours and fifty-nine minutes from Honolulu. After spending a few hours at Oakland, the pair of intrepid Australian airmen took off for Los Angeles, arriving here at 3:23 in the afternoon after a flight of two hours and forty-five minutes. Kingsford-Smith intends to sell his plane here and proceed in a few days to New York.

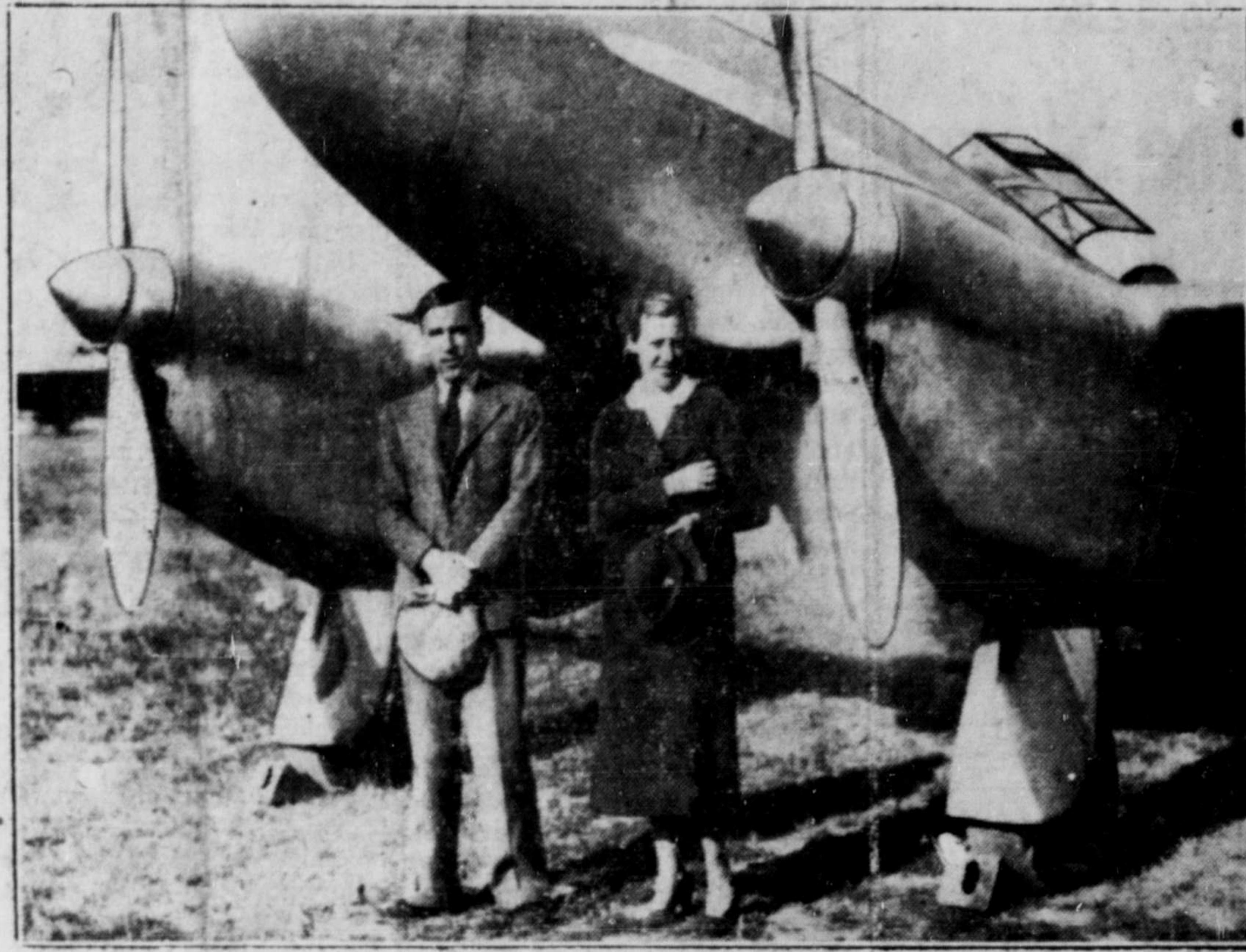
KILLED AT KETCHIKAN

Capt. Conrad Casperson, Skipper of Halibut Boat Radio, Victim Of Accident

Reporting the death of her skipper, Capt. Conrad Casperson, in an accident at Ketchikan last night, the well known American halibut boat radio arrived in port this morning with her final catch of the season. It appears that Capt. Casperson, who was one of the best known skippers of the American fleet, fell off a dock at Ketchikan to the boat below and sustained injuries to the back of his head which, according to word brought here by other members of the crew, made him unconscious. Capt. Casperson fell into the water and died today.

Murder and Suicide In Cariboo Is Reported to Police Headquarters

VICTORIA, Nov. 5: (CP)—A provincial police report from Williams Lake today indicates a murder and suicide case at Spring House, twelve miles from here. Early Sunday Mrs. Laurence R. Roberts was shot dead in her home. Indications are that the woman was shot presumably by her husband who was found outside the house with a bullet wound through the chest, apparently self-inflicted. He died a few hours later. A letter which was found referred to family differences and jealousy.

RUSSIAN WORKING CONDITIONS

So much has been written and said of the condition of Russia, much of it biased one way or the other, that it is difficult to get a clear picture of what things are like. The Christian Science Monitor has a representative going through the country just now and writing of things as he sees and hears them.

The writer talked to one man who was a member of the American Communist Party for many years before he came to Russia. He is a native-born American, a sincere and clear-sighted idealist. For several years he has worked in Soviet factories, refusing offers of "white collar" jobs in order to mingle with the workers and take an active part in their social life. Now, however, he is endeavoring to accumulate the necessary "valuta" to return to America.

"I cannot endure the exploitation of the working man which goes on here as it does in other countries," he declared. "My Russian Communist friends tell me that I am not patient, that I do not understand this is a temporary phase. But Soviet methods of exploitation of their own workers, whatever the avowed purpose of such treatment may be, are more ruthless and crude than any to which I have been accustomed in my own country. There is less consideration for the average working man in Russia, today than in any 'capitalist' country with which I am familiar."

The man was asked if he would rejoin the Communist of Russian Communist leaders who are so ruthlessly exploiting their own workers now in the hope of building a new social order in some distant future. But he is not able to agree that any end, however idealistic, justifies the present methods by which he declares the rights of individual working men are ignored in the allegedly higher interests of the "Workers' State."

I asked this man if he would rejoin the Communist Party when he returned to his own country. He shook his head. "I could not join the party again if I wanted to," he said. "The party would not admit me after I had told them the truth about conditions among working people in the Soviet Union. They would not believe me, and would say that I had become a traitor to my class."

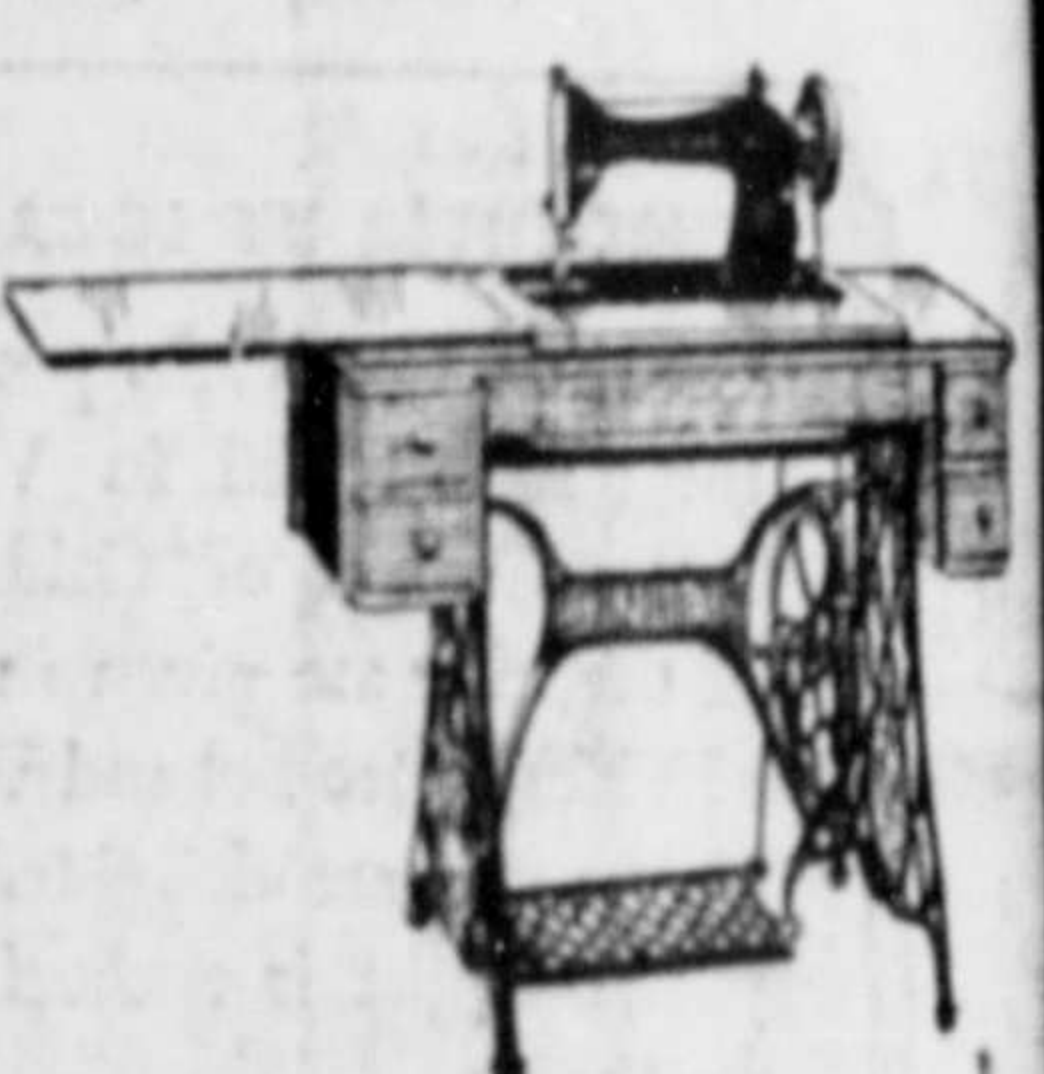
