PRINCE RUPERT DISTRICT PASSED UP IN RELIEF PROGRAM

Conservatives Are Swept Out Of Power Both In Ontario and Saskatchewan At Polls Tuesday

Liberals Elected Sixty-Five Out of Ninety Members in Traditionally Tory Province.

Eight Members Of Cabinet Beaten

Premier G. S. Henry Saves His Seat in Rout; Conservatives Elect Seventeen.

TORONTO, June 20: (CP)—Eight of the Conservative cabinet ministers suffering personal defeat although Premier George S. Henry was successful in being re-elected, the Liberal party, under leadership of Mitchell Hepburn, until very recently a member of the federal House, decisively overthrew the Conservative government in the traditionally Tory province of Ontario yesterday.

The Liberal victory was largely in the nature of a rout, the party winning sixty-five seats while the Conservatives were successful in seventeen, leaving eight for other parties—Liberal-Progressives, 4; C. C. F., 1; Independents, 1; Liberal-Labor, 1; United Farmer, 1.

Liberal Leader Mitchell Hepburn, aged 38, was personally elected. The only members of Premier Henry's cabinet to survive the landslide, besides the Premier, were Provincial Secretary Chalmers, Minister of Highways Macaulay and Attorney General Price.

It is almost thirty years since the Liberals have been in power in Ontario.

Traditionally Tory Toronto that had not returned any but Conservatives for many elections almost split even, electing seven Conservatives and six Liberals.

REPORT ON EUGENICS

Sterilization of Three Hundred Germans as Being Unfit is Recommended

BERLIN, June 20: (CP)—The Berlin eugenics court, making its first report yesterday, announced that it had ordered the sterilization of three hundred of 325 persons appearing before it as being congenitally unfit.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT SIGNS SILVER BILL

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 20: (CP)—President Roosevelt today signed the Pittman silver purchase bill which directs the buying of silver by the treasury until it comprises 25% of the national metallic monetary stock. There will be purchases estimated at about 1,300,000,000 ounces at a price not to exceed fifty cents an ounce.

FRANCE ALSO HAVING DROUGHT; PARIS BAKES WITH 94 TEMPERATURE

PARIS, June 20:—As forest fires were raging in various parts of France while many power plants in the country, on account of the low level of rivers and streams, were forced to use steam instead of water in developing energy, Paris sweltered yesterday in temperature of 94, the day being the hottest the city has had in thirty years. Crops are reported to have not suffered greatly as yet from the drought.

TO ISSUE CURRENCY

Important Measure Given First Reading in Canadian House Of Commons

OTTAWA, June 20: (CP)—A bill authorizing the government to increase the total note issue for which gold coverage of 25% is required from the present statutory amount of \$55,000,000 to \$125,000,000 received first reading in the House of Commons yesterday.

Anderson Government Completely Wiped Out of Existence in Prairie Province Yesterday.

Premier and All Cabinet Defeated

Grits Win 49 Out of Fifty-Four Seats in House; Farmer-Laborites do Poorly.

REGINA, June 20: (CP)—With Premier J. T. M. Anderson and all ministers suffering personal defeat, the Conservative government, which has ruled the province of Saskatchewan for the past five years, was wiped out of existence at the polls yesterday, the Liberals having so far elected forty-nine members out of a house of fifty-five seats in the biggest political upset in the history of the province. The Farmer-Laborites, whom it was expected would make at least a fair showing in this key province of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation movement, proved a great disappointment as far as the general results were concerned, being successful in electing only five members. Not one Conservative survived the landslide.

At 10:30 last night, the following had been elected:
Liberals, 33.
Farmer-Laborites, one.
Liberals were leading in seven seats, Conservatives in one and Farmer-Laborites in two.

Soon after the polls closed, the result of the contest was apparent, an early summary showing the Liberals to have elected six members while they were leading in twenty-eight seats, the Conservatives leading in ten at that time. The rural results were strongly Liberal.

C. C. F. Leader Beaten
M. J. Coldwell, leader of the Farmer-Labor party, which supported C. C. F. principles, was defeated in Regina.

The Liberals were led by Former Premier J. G. Gardiner.

One deferred election in Athabasca makes up the Legislature of fifty-five members.

Final returns today showed that not a single Conservative had been elected.

Big Doings Planned For Prince Rupert During Week in August While Warship is Visiting Port

Convention of Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia to Convene in City and Fall Fair Planned

There is every indication that Prince Rupert will be having a big fete week from August 20 to 25 judging from developments at a meeting of the council of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce yesterday afternoon, John Dybhavn presiding. The council decided to accept a suggestion that the convention of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia and the visitors generally.

The Associated Boards of Trade convention had been arranged to take place at Vanderhoof but a letter received from the secretary of the Associated Boards at Smithers stated that the Vanderhoof people acquiesced in the change and it was thought the meeting should be held at Prince Rupert this year. If the date set proves acceptable to the delegates generally, as it probably will, delegates will arrive in the city on the Monday afternoon and leave Wednesday evening.

It developed at the meeting that the Danae would arrive at Prince Rupert August 17 and remain for a week. This, it was thought, would prove an attraction for visitors, not only delegates to the convention but possibly others.

It also was announced that it was proposed to hold the fall fair that same week and it was thought it would be generally beneficial to have the delegates in Prince Rupert at the time of the fall fair. It was suggested that, possibly, the railway company would run an excursion to Prince Rupert that week which would bring a great many visitors from the interior and this would enable the city to hold a general fete for the entertainment of the delegates to the convention, the officers and crew of the warship \$0.000.

Vancouver and Victoria Gets Lion's Share from Bennett's Public Works

Two Million Dollars is Allocated British Columbia While Ten Million is Appropriated to Ontario—Public Buildings to be Erected in South

OTTAWA, June 20: (CP)—No vote for Prince Rupert district was included in the \$40,000,000 public works relief program which was presented to the House of Commons yesterday by Prime Minister R. B. Bennett. Ontario led in the awarding of appropriations with a total of \$10,000,000 while British Columbia secured \$2,000,000, the large bulk being for public buildings generally, harbor and river improvements, Indian Department and Department of the Interior.

EMPLOYING SWEATED LABOR

At a recent meeting of the Trades and Labor Council cognizance was taken of a firm employing non-union labor and it was hinted that action might be taken detrimental to the firm mentioned. There was no suggestion in the published report that sweated labor was employed.

The Parliamentary Commission at Ottawa inquiring into the activities of the chain and mail order stores a few days ago elicited the information that the T. Eaton Company employed girls in their factories who earned only eight cents an hour. Here we suggest is an opportunity for the activities of organized labor. By means of sweated labor and mass buying, the mail order houses can outsell firms doing business in a legitimate manner, people who buy from them are encouraging the employment of girls at eight cents an hour. They are the people who are responsible for the conditions which exist in these factories because they refuse to deal with local firms who are trying to do business in an honest way, giving good service and good values but instead send away their money to fill the coffers of the merchant princes in the east who fatten on the sweated labor in their factories and on the union workers who support them.

This is not mentioned in any spirit of hostility to the local Trades and Labor Council which is, doubtless, doing its best to protect labor conditions in the west but, when members of that council or the people they represent send orders to the mail order houses which employ sweated labor, they are injuring the cause of honest labor and weakening their own influence in the community.

TINY DEER IS RESCUED

Week-Old Fawn Picked Up On Railway Track and Is Now In Town—Mother Had Disappeared

Walking along the railroad track about a mile this side of Kaien station on Monday afternoon a guest at the Royal Hotel here noticed in a culvert a tiny fawn, believed to be not over a week old, which he carried into town and which is now being kept at the hotel prior to being turned over to the authorities. The pedestrian saw no sign of the doe which it is believed might have been chased or killed by wolves. The tiny animal was quite helpless and, no doubt, would have perished had it been left there.

With only partial measure of success, it is now being coaxed to take nourishment in the form of cow's milk from a nipple-attached bottle.

Local nimrods who are interested in the stocking of Dundas Island with deer have been informed and it is possible that the fawn—a doe—may be liberated there when it is large enough to fend for itself. A buck, which has been kept for the past year or so at the Knox Hotel, has already been secured for this purpose and, indeed, a mate had been sought. This may be the solution.

RATE CASE PRESENTED

Chamber of Commerce Committee Tells Railway Commission Official Why Auto Charge Should be Cut

A memorandum setting forth Prince Rupert's case for a reduction in the rates for shipment of automobiles between Prince Rupert and Terrace and Hazelton on the Canadian National Railways was presented to A. LeSage of Calgary, inspector of transportation, of the Board of Railway Commissioners, by the highway committee of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce consisting of S. E. Parker, chairman, C. H. Orme, W. O. Fulton and V. S. Moore at a conference this morning between Mr. LeSage and the committee.

Mr. LeSage, who came to Prince Rupert especially to go into this matter, arrived from Calgary on last night's train. He will leave this evening for Hazelton and will come back to visit Terrace before returning to Calgary.

'FRISCO TO OPEN SOON

Mayor Rossi Expects Shipping Tie-Up To End Very Shortly Under Arbitration Arrangement

SAN FRANCISCO, June 20—Under an arrangement for arbitration of the dispute between longshoremen and the shipping interests, Mayor Angelo Rossi stated yesterday that he hoped to have the port of San Francisco open for shipping again very soon. The announcement of the mayor followed a conference with longshore and shipping representatives.

Re-opening of the Port of Portland is expected within forty-eight hours with five hundred special police protecting strike-breakers.

Seattle also expected to be handling shipping again on a normal basis in the very near future, two hundred extra police having been sworn in for waterfront patrol service there.

STRIKE OF INTERNES

Montreal House Doctors Go Back to Work After Jewish Colleague Resigns His Post

MONTREAL, June 20: (CP)—The storm centre of a strike of seventy-five internes in five Montreal French-Canadian hospitals, Dr. Sam Rabinovitch has resigned as an interne at Notre Dame Hospital and the striking house doctors immediately re-applied for their positions and got them. The internes had refused to work as long as Rabinovitch, who is a Jew, was employed.

PYRAMID PROPHECY

Mathematical Deductions From Great Egyptian Structure Give Key to Future Events

One of the interesting features of an address before the Prince Rupert Gyro Club yesterday by Robert Bartlett on the subject of the Great Pyramid of Gizeh were mathematical deductions based on measurements of passages within the pyramid on which predictions of future events are based. It is claimed by students of these matters that the commencement of the present depression was set by mathematical measurements of the principal passage as being May 29, 1928, and that the end would come on September 15-16, 1936. Later there would ensue another world catastrophe of some kind such as economic chaos or Armageddon and on August 19-20, 1933, there would be the second coming of Christ who would be sent to re-establish on earth again God's law instead of man's.

Other events which Pyramid authorities had asserted might have been foretold by the markings of the main passage had included the exodus of the people of Israel from Egypt in 1486 B.C., the life of Christ, the destruction of Jerusalem in 70 A.D., the end of the Dark Ages in 1518, the beginning of the present greatness of Britain in 1558, the beginning of the modern age of speed in communication, trade and industry in 1944, the era of mass production from 1909, Britain's entry into the Great War on August 4, 1914, the end of the War for Britain on November 11, 1918, the commencement of the first post-war depression on July 11, 1920, and the ending of same on November 10, 1921.

Mr. Bartlett showed how mathematical deductions from the measurements of the Great Pyramid supported theories of the British-Israelite belief. According to Davidson, the Pyramid had been built by direct command of God in 2625 B.C. by Enoch, the only man in Biblical history who had not actually died but had "walked with God." This had been before the Flood which history fixed as being in 2344 B.C. Mr. Bartlett gave measurements and architectural details of the Pyramid which had been listed by the ancient Greeks as being one of the seven Wonders of the World, the real wonders of which, however, had not been revealed until the last seventy-five years or so. The vast structure was 464 feet high, covered some thirteen acres and weighed ninety million tons. It was an architectural marvel which, in some of its details, could not be duplicated by man today. The measurements were precise to a minuteness almost incomprehensible. Mr. Bartlett revealed many details of the Pyramid, all of which proved both interesting and instructive.

The Dawes loan, the note points out, was an unconditional obligation and the international bank will expect Germany to honor its payments thereunder.
