DEFENSIVE ALLIANCE NOW DISCUSSED

FRISCO'S GORY WATERFRONT BRISTLING WITH BAYONETS

Two Men Killed and Thirty-Four Wounded Yesterday in Fighting Between Strikers and Guardsmen

Strenuous Debate Preceded House Rising This Week

OTTAWA, July 6.—A strenuous all-day debate preceded the formal prorogation this week of the fifth session of the Seventeenth Parliament since Confederation by His Excellency, Earl Bessborough, Governor General.

Threats of General Strike Heard at Golden Gate City and Portland—Sympathetic Walk-Out on Atlantic Coast Reported Under Consideration

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6: (CP)—San Francisco's blood-stained waterfront bristled with bayonets today as National Guardsmen patrolled the battleground on which two men were killed and thirty-four wounded by police fire yesterday. Threats of a general strike were heard here and at Portland. The tense situation was reported to be re-echoed on the Atlantic Coast where a sympathetic strike of east coast workers was under consideration.

Paris Asks London for Guarantee of Help If Belgium Were Invaded

Great Britain Has no Intention of Making Straight Treaty, Says Acting Premier Baldwin, Although Associated Press Hears That Agreement May be Reached

LONDON, July 6: (CP)—Great Britain has no intention of making a defensive alliance with France, Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, Acting Prime Minister, told the House of Commons today. Technical collaboration from Great Britain in the event Belgium is ever invaded is all that France is asking of Britain, it was stated in other quarters, and indications are that she might get it, the Associated Press was informed today. The negotiations looking toward a defensive alliance were opened by France in view of the serious internal situation in Germany.

Log scaling in Prince Rupert district for 1934 continues to show a spectacular increase over 1933. The scale for June this year is announced by the Forest Branch as having been 14,544,772 board feet as compared with 1,987,056 board feet in June 1933. For the present year to date the scale has reached a total of 35,980,555 board feet in comparison with 2,992,694 board feet in the first six months of last year.

Forest Products

Output of forest products in the interior also shows an increase over last year. Production of poles and piling this June was placed at 87,663 lineal feet—41,130 feet cedar and 16,553 feet hemlock—as compared with 55,348 feet last year.

A total of 43,763 jackpine ties was recorded this June as against 33,757 last June.

Cordwood production this June amounted to 530 as compared with 551 in the same month last year.

BUILDING IS AHEAD

Construction Work in City in 1934 Shows Big Lead Over Last Year

Building permits for the year to date in Prince Rupert continue to show a marked increase over last year. The list for this June represented a total value of \$7030 as compared with \$225 in the same month last year, the total for 1934 to date being \$56,230 in comparison with \$7,575 in the first six months of last year. Principal items on the list for this June included a brick veneer residence at the corner of Ninth Avenue and McBride Street being built by John Currie at a cost of \$2300 and a warehouse for the Atlin Fisheries being constructed by the Northern Fishermen's Cold Storage Ltd. at cost of \$3000.

HOW TO MAKE ICED TEA

WHIFFLETS
From the Waterfront

Having on board an American yachting party, the Campbell Church charter yacht Westward arrived in port at 11 o'clock yesterday morning from Seattle in the course of a coast cruise and left this morning for Alaska. While here the vessel tied up at the floats of the Armour Salvage Co.

C. N. R. steamer Prince John, Capt. Edward Mabbs, arrived in port at 10 o'clock last night from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands, bringing passengers, mail and freight. The Prince John is now being withdrawn from service for overhaul and repair work and her place will be taken by the steamer Prince Charles, sailing at 10 o'clock tomorrow night for Vancouver via the islands. It is expected the Charles will continue on the run for several weeks.

With a good sized list of passengers, C. N. R. steamer Prince George, Capt. H. E. Nedden, arrived in port on time at 10 o'clock this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and sailed at 3 o'clock this afternoon for Anxox and Stewart whence she will return here southbound tomorrow evening.

The salmon pack for the Skeena River for the first three days of the 1934 season was 2,796 cases, of which 1,795 cases was sockeye, according to an official bulletin of the Dominion Fisheries. This was a marked increase over the opening three days of the 1933 season when 718 cases, of which 680 were sockeye, were recorded. The Naas River pack for the first three days of this season was 1,069 cases as against 705 cases last year. The whole coast for the first three days of this year showed a marked increase over last year, the 1934 figure being 22,348 cases while that for 1933 was 13,893 cases. Good fishing is still reported this week from the Skeena River.

The regular monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, scheduled for this evening, has been cancelled owing to the absence from the city of many members. Any business requiring immediate attention will be dealt with by the council of the chamber.
