

Editor, Daily News:-

At the meeting called by Commissioner Alder on Monday night last, a resolution was passed that Grotto Improves a committee be appointed by the commissioner to raise money which is badly needed for buying new upto-the-minute books as well as rebinding old ones.

It was brought out at the meeting that the library is not receiving the usual government grant and that the city cannot appropriate this year more than it did last, i.e. \$1924, which is just enough to cover current expenses.

Outside of a few private cash donations received and the Gyro Book Campaign, the library received no assistance last year. Yet, while the library was working under these hardships, its usefulness increased until today the number of persons using this wonderful institution stands at 3.769.

The committee was appointed on Wednesday. It held its first meeting Thursday and laid plans to raise at least one thousand dollars. While several proposals were submitted for consideration, two will be used at the present time-viz; private donations and sale of patron's tickets through the various organizations. Every organization will be asked to appoint a representative to assist the "Library Patron's Committee" to act as a connecting link. Every organization will be allotted so many tickets to

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

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
