UNION CLUB IS SOLD UP

Palatial Old Victoria Resort Goes Under Hammer For Defaulting On Its Bonds

VICTORIA, Jan. 12: (CP)—The Union Club, one of the oldest and most palatial on the Pacific Coast, went under the sheriff's hammer at auction here under a court order as a result of the club having defaulted on \$250,000 worth of bonds.

The property, which originally cost \$500,000, was sold for \$60,000 to the Royal Trust Co., representing parties unknown.

German Pastors To Defy Bishop

BERLIN, Germany, Jan. 12:—Four thousand Evangelical Church pastors are prepared to read from their pulpits, it is announced, in defiance of the pro-Nazi Bishop Mueller's order, their protests against efforts to centralize.

BRITISH FORCES IN ORIENT REINFORCED

TOKYO, Jan. 12:—Strong British reinforcements for Singapore and Hong Kong are reported in Japanese Army information published by the newspaper Asahi. The assumption is that the reinforcements have been ordered against the possibility of imminent hostilities breaking out in the Orient.

Trip, For Which Elaborate Preparations Had Been Made, Accomplished Without Mishap—One of Greatest Mass Expeditions

HONOLULU, Jan. 12: (CP)—The greatest overseas non-stop mass flight in United States aviation history was completed yesterday at 12:30 Honolulu time (3:30 Pacific Standard time) when six United States naval planes, carrying a total of thirty men under Lieutenant Commander McGinnis, completed a 2400-mile flight from San Francisco to Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, in 24 hours and 45 minutes. The previous record for the flight was 25 hours and 36 minutes made by Ernest Smith in July 1927 when ten planes essayed the flight in the tragic Dole race, only five completing it and two being lost without trace.

Vessel Nellie Torrey And Crew of Five Not Seen Since Dec. First

Coastguard Cutter Alert, After Long Search, Abandons Hope of Safety—Were on Trip From Wrangell To Marsh Island

KETCHIKAN, Jan. 12: (CP)—Five men aboard the gasboat Nellie Torrey, missing since the craft left Wrangell for a fox ranch on Marsh Island on December 1, have been given up for lost, a message from the coastguard cutter Alert stated yesterday. The missing men are: Robert McCracken, owner of the boat and ranch; C. A. Darrow, Ed. Smith, Fred Kester and C. W. Field.

McCracken's wife, left alone on the island, was badly in need of food, the cutter reported.

WARSHIP REFLOATS

H. M. S. Nelson Strikes Rocks at Entrance of Portsmouth Harbor But Is Little Damaged

PORTSMOUTH, Eng., Jan. 12: (CP)—H. M. S. Nelson, "wonder ship of the British Navy" and flagship of Sir William Boyle, commander-in-chief of the home fleet, went on the rocks at the entrance of the harbor this morning and, after holding fast for several hours, was safely refloated early this evening and is believed to have not been seriously damaged.

The stranding occurred when the ship was on its way to join the fleet on a cruise to the West Indies.

H. M. S. Nelson is reputedly almost unsinkable and has been described as the "oddest and ugliest ship ever built."

Passengers will be carried in cabins within the wings of a giant airplane being built in Germany.

BASKETBALL DIED AT STEWART

Louis Kasum Found on Steps of Own Home, Victim of Sudden Pulmonary Hemorrhage

District headquarters of the provincial police here have been advised of the sudden death at Stewart on Monday night of this week of Louis Kasum, 48-year old miner, who had been a resident of the Portland Canal camp for seven years. Kasum's body was found on the steps of his house lying in a pool of blood at 12:30 a.m. January 9.

Dr. J. W. Vosburgh, coroner, reported that he had been attending the man and that his death had been due to a sudden large pulmonary hemorrhage originating from a tubercular lung condition.

Kasum was born in Serbia in 1885 but was a naturalized Canadian. He is survived by a widow and two children. Burial was made in Stewart yesterday under the auspices of the Moose Lodge of which deceased was a member.

tar to prevent the shark seeing them. When they dived with knife in hand and ripped the shark up while under water. After the creature had been killed the fins and tails were salted and sent to China or Japan for making shark fin soup, one of the Oriental delicacies. Trapping sharks at Norfolk Island was also described, a native pig being used for bait.

The speaker took his auditors with him on a tour around the coast of Australia and on to Ceylon. At this beautiful island Mr. van der Sluys spent six months in the town of Kandy. He compared the beauty of the place with its cheerful, intelligent people with the fifth, squalor and poverty of the people of India. The temple of the Tooth of Buddha came in for mention. The elephants and turtles and other creatures were seen and the speaker told of lying in bed when sojourning there and listening to the shrill cries of the cheta and leopard.

Much of the tea sold by Sir Thomas Lipton was raised in Ceylon and, in fact, most of the plantations on the island were owned by the Lipton firm.

Proceeding to the Red Sea, Suez Canal, Cairo and Port Said, the latter was often described as the home of vice and iniquity. The Arabs, the speaker described, as different from any other people and less reliable. Nothing could hurt their consciences and they were inveterate thieves.

Coming to the West Indies calls were made at Bermuda, St. Christopher, where the monkeys stole the beer from the table, and rum was sold at 40c a bottle. Antigua was noted for being the place where Lord Nelson was married. Montserrat, the place where the lime juice is made, was an interesting point. Barbadoes was noted because of its intense population, 1600 to the square mile, the most thickly inhabited place in the world.

The last place described was the Island of Trinidad where the speaker took his hearers to the lake of pitch from which shipments had been made for fifty to sixty years without any apparent diminution of the supply.
